



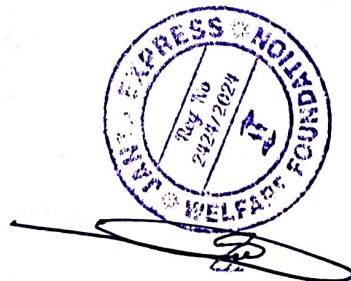

The organization works to prevent child marriage, empower women and adolescent girls through skill development and livelihood opportunities, re-enroll out-of-school children, and ensure access to government welfare schemes and justice for those in need.

We work in close coordination with the community, local administration, and committed volunteers. Our efforts are focused on empowering the most marginalized sections of society by connecting them to dignity, equality, and opportunities for self-reliance.

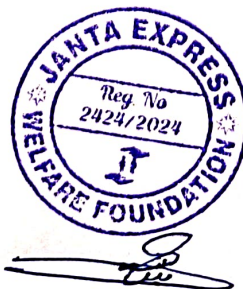
Mission and Vision

Vision:

Our vision is to utilize all available human and material resources effectively to uphold the dignity of oppressed communities despite all challenges. We aim to prioritize every aspect of their holistic development, guided by their unique needs and circumstances.

Mission:

Our mission is to empower underprivileged women and children by providing them a platform to realize their dreams and aspirations—a safe space where they can claim their rights, justice, freedom, and dignity. We are committed to relentlessly working until discrimination and inequality are eradicated.



Key Achievements of 2024-25

Prevention of Child Marriage

In 2024–25, we successfully intervened in and prevented **5 cases of child marriage**. These interventions were carried out through community engagement and coordination with families and local stakeholders. Our efforts ensured that girls at risk were protected and encouraged to continue their education.



A child marriage was prevented through timely community awareness and intervention.

Justice for Domestic Violence Survivors

We provided support to **12 women** facing domestic violence through basic guidance, community support, and referral assistance. These efforts helped women move towards safety and dignity.




Support and guidance helped women overcome difficult situations.

Re-enrollment of Dropout Children

A total of **28 children** were identified and supported to re-enroll in school through community outreach and family counseling. These efforts ensured that children received another opportunity to continue their education.

Connecting People with Government Schemes

We facilitated access to government welfare schemes for **25 individuals**, supporting them in documentation, application, and follow-up processes to ensure timely benefits.



Support was provided to help individuals access government welfare schemes.

Women's Empowerment

More than **350 women and adolescent girls** were reached through awareness programs and community-based initiatives focused on empowerment and self-reliance.



Women and girls were reached through awareness and empowerment programs.



This year, 43+ awareness programs were conducted. Key highlights include:

1. May 16, 2024 — A community-level awareness meeting was conducted on fundamental rights and women's dignity with adolescent girls in Maheshbathna Harijan Tola (Ward 4) under Teusa Panchayat, Kishanganj. A total of 18 adolescent girls participated in the program. They were informed about constitutional rights, domestic violence, and child marriage. Most of the girls heard this information for the first time and, at the end of the program, shared that they want to understand their rights and raise their voices for themselves.
2. May 20, 2024 — A discussion was held with women in Ward 2 of Simalbari Panchayat on child marriage and the legal remedies available against it. A total of 22 women participated. During the conversation, some women shared that they had witnessed such incidents around them but remained silent due to lack of information. The program gave them the confidence that they are now capable of seeking legal help.
3. May 25, 2024 — A one-day workshop on child labor and the right to education was organized at Gachhpara Middle School. A total of 30 students and 4 teachers participated. Through videos, posters, and storytelling sessions focused on the harmful effects of child labor and the importance of education, the children learned a lot. Some students shared that they sometimes engage in labor work, but now they will focus more on their schooling.
4. May 29, 2024 — A special session on gender equality and self-defense was organized at Maheshbathna Middle School, Teusa Panchayat. Basic self-defense techniques were taught to 20 adolescent girls, and they were guided on how to respond bravely in times of crisis. The participants took part in the practice sessions with enthusiasm and said that this knowledge would be very useful for them.
5. June 3, 2024 — A workshop on freedom and its social significance was organized at Simalbri Middle School, Kishanganj. A total of 26 children participated. They were introduced to stories of freedom fighters and connected with current issues related to social freedom. The children expressed their understanding of freedom through posters and poetry.
6. June 7, 2024 — An information-sharing session was conducted with Anganwadi workers at ICDS Center No. 195, Teusa Panchayat. Eight workers were informed about government schemes related to nutrition, education, and maternity benefits. The workers also shared their field experiences, creating an environment of mutual learning during the session.
7. June 10, 2024 — A special session on the Janani Suraksha Yojana and maternity benefits for pregnant women was organized at ICDS Center No. 50, Teusa Panchayat. Twelve women participated. They were informed about the documents and procedures required for a safe delivery in the hospital. Some women shared that they were previously unaware of these schemes.



8. June 14, 2024 — An awareness meeting was held with adolescents in Bagalbari Panchayat on the social and legal harms of child marriage. Sixteen youths participated. The discussion took place in an interactive format, and a pledge was taken to take a firm stand against child marriage.
9. June 18, 2024 — A session was organized in Daula Panchayat to provide information about the Women's Helpline, One-Stop Center, and Shelter Home for women affected by domestic violence. Twenty women participated. Many women said that for the first time, they felt that their voices would be heard.
10. June 21, 2024 — An inspirational session on children's rights, education, and health was organized at Middle School, Daula Panchayat. 25 children participated. They were given information on topics such as child labor, the importance of education, vaccination, and hygiene. At the end, the children shared their thoughts.
11. July 1, 2024 Ward No. 6, Pichla Panchayat, District-Kishanganj, Bihar A meeting was held to provide information about educational schemes and scholarships for adolescent girls. A total of 18 girls participated. They were informed about schemes such as the Bicycle Scheme, Dress Scheme, and scholarships. Some girls shared that they were not previously aware of these schemes. At the end of the program, a form was filled out to identify those who had not yet benefited from the schemes.
12. July 9, 2024 Ward No. 2, Pichla . A drawing competition was organized here for children, in which a total of 22 children participated. The children were first explained about child labor and the right to education. After that, they were asked to draw pictures on the topic I Want to Go to School. The children created very beautiful drawings and openly shared their experiences during the program.
13. July 18, 2024 — A joint session on child marriage, child labor, and self-defense was held for adolescent girls and students at Uchch Madhyamik Vidyalaya Chakla. Approximately 28 students participated. They were taught legal information along with some simple self-defense techniques. After the program, some adolescent girls said that they would now raise their voices against child marriage.
14. July 25, 2024 — In Ward No. 4, Chakla, a discussion was held for women on domestic violence, women's safety, and self-employment. A total of 16 women participated. They were informed about the women's helpline number, One-Stop Center, and the Domestic Violence Act. Additionally, they were introduced to self-employment opportunities such as tailoring and the spice industry.
15. August 4, 2024 — In Ward No. 8, Belwa, this program was organized for children and their parents. A total of 24 participants were present. The importance of education and government schemes such as the Dress, Bicycle, and Scholarship schemes were discussed. Some parents admitted that they were unaware of these schemes. Now, they have decided to send their children to school.



16. August 12, 2024 — In Ward No. 1, Maheshbathna, Teusa Panchayat, a sewing training center was inaugurated for young women. On the first day, a total of 15 young women participated. They were taught how to operate the machine, take measurements, and sew simple clothes. Some of the young women said that they are now seriously considering self-employment.
17. August 18, 2024 — In Ward No. 3, Simlabari Panchayat, a session on health and hygiene was organized for adolescent girls, with 20 girls participating. Discussions were held on menstruation, hygiene, nutrition, and home remedies. This session was very useful for the girls as they spoke openly about the topic for the first time.
18. August 24, 2024 — A workshop on environment and climate change was held at Gachhpara Middle School, Gachhpara. A total of 26 children participated. They were informed about how to reduce plastic use and the importance of planting trees. At the end, the children planted saplings within the school premises.
19. September 1, 2024 — A session on digital safety and safe use of social media was held at Maheshbathna Middle School, Teusa Panchayat. A total of 18 adolescents participated. They were informed about how to use the internet safely, create strong passwords, and protect themselves from cyberbullying.
20. September 10, 2024 — A sports competition and health check-up camp on the theme “Sports and Health” was organized at Shimlabari Middle School, Shimlabari. A total of 22 children participated in games such as running and rope skipping. Afterwards, a health check-up was conducted, which revealed weakness and anemia in 3 children. They were advised to follow a nutritious diet.
21. September 17, 2024 — A meeting was organized in Ward No. 5, Gachhpada Panchayat, to discuss child marriage and domestic violence. A total of 12 women participated. During the session, several women openly shared that they often remain silent due to fear of societal judgment. They were informed about how to seek help from the One Stop Center, Helpline 181, and the women’s police.
22. September 23, 2024 — A career counseling session was organized for adolescents in Ward No. 7, Belwa Panchayat. A total of 19 adolescents participated. They were informed about opportunities in government jobs, ITI, polytechnic courses, and self-employment. Many participants later shared that it was the first time they had received such information and that they now feel more serious about their future.
23. September 29, 2024 — In Ward No. 2, Pichhla Panchayat, Block-Kochadhaman, awareness on child marriage and the right to education was spread through a street play. Fifteen adolescent girls participated, and more than 20 villagers attended as the audience. After the performance, feedback was collected from the villagers, who shared that they found this method very engaging and effective.



24. October 6, 2024 — In Ward No. 4, Chakla Panchayat, a self-defense training session was organized for adolescent girls. A total of 18 girls participated. They were taught basic self-defense techniques, including how to protect themselves in dangerous situations. Many of the participants shared that this was a very important session, something they had never received before.

25. October 13, 2024 — In Ward No. 1, Teusa Panchayat, A meeting was held with women on the topic of increasing household income. A total of 15 women participated. They were informed about how they could start small home-based businesses such as making pickles, spices, incense sticks, and tailoring by forming groups. They were also provided information about bank loans and self-help groups (SHGs).

26. 20 October 2024 — In Higher Secondary School, Pichhla Panchayat, a session on “Healthy Lifestyle” was conducted at the school. A total of 25 students participated. They were given information on nutrition, physical exercise, and mental health. Some students shared that they spend most of their day on mobile phones, and now they will try to reduce their screen time.

27. 28 October 2024 In Ward No. 6, Shimlabari, A discussion session on climate change and plastic pollution was organized for adolescents. A total of 20 adolescents participated. They were informed about how small actions—such as reducing plastic use, planting trees, and conserving water—can help mitigate the climate crisis.

28. 5 November 2024 In Middle School, Belwa Panchayat A “My Dream” competition was organized for children at the school. A total of 22 children participated and expressed their dreams through drawings and stories. Many shared their aspirations of becoming doctors, teachers, and police officers. The program helped boost the children's confidence.

29. 11 November 2024 — In Ward No. 3, Chakla Panchayat (on the occasion of International Day of the Girl Child) On this special day, a session on leadership and rights was organized for adolescent girls. A total of 18 girls participated. They were informed about how they can voice their opinions even at the panchayat level. Some girls pledged that they would now speak up in every meeting.

30. 17 November 2024 In Ward No. 4, Gachhpada Panchayat A session on nutrition was held for children. Twenty children were informed about the importance of a balanced diet, iron, and green vegetables. They were given khichdi, fruits, and jaggery so they could understand what nutrients are. The children expressed happiness and said that they would now go home and share this information with their mothers.

31. On 25 November 2024, in Ward No. 7, Teusa Panchayat, a discussion on “Menstrual Hygiene” was held with adolescent girls. A total of 16 girls attended. They were provided detailed information about the use of sanitary napkins, cleanliness, and health-related aspects. The girls asked questions openly and said that earlier they used to hesitate to talk about this topic

32. On 2 December 2024, at Primary School, Banglabari, a session on "Children's Rights" was held with the students. A total of 20 children participated. They were informed that education, protection, nutrition, and expression are their rights. The children expressed their thoughts by making posters.
33. On 10 December 2024, in Ward No. 1, Belwa Panchayat, a discussion on "Self-Employment" was held with the youth. A total of 15 young participants attended. They were informed about how they can start small businesses such as mobile repairing, beauty parlors, or making papad and pickles, even without a formal job.
34. On 17 December 2024, in Ward No. 2, Teusa Panchayat, a discussion was held with women on protection against domestic violence. A total of 14 women participated. They were informed about the "Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005," Women Helpline 181, and the One Stop Center. Some women also shared their personal experiences.
35. On 25 December 2024, a session on "Protection from Child Sexual Abuse" was conducted at the Middle School, Chakla. A total of 22 children participated. They were informed about "Good Touch – Bad Touch," ways to seek help, and the POCSO Act. At the end of the session, the children were given leaflets and helpline numbers.
36. On 4 January 2024, in Ward No. 5, Belwa, a group of adolescent girls visited the sewing training center. A total of 10 girls participated. They were informed about how learning sewing skills could help them become self-reliant. Some of the girls immediately expressed their interest in enrolling.
37. On 10 January 2024, in Ward No. 3, Pichhla Panchayat, an awareness rally was organized to mark International Human Rights Day. A total of 18 adolescents (boys and girls) participated. Holding posters, they marched through the village chanting slogans like "We are all equal" and "Education is our right." The villagers appreciated the rally.
38. On 18 January 2024, in Ward No. 6, Gachhpada Panchayat, a program on "Drug De-addiction" was conducted. A total of 20 youths were informed about how substance abuse harms their health, family, and future. Some participants shared experiences of people they knew and took a pledge to stay away from any form of addiction.
39. On 29 January 2024, in Ward No. 2, Shimlabari, girls were given legal information about child marriage. A total of 15 adolescent girls were present. They were informed about the minimum legal age for marriage and where they can report if someone tries to force them into marriage.
40. On 3 February 2025, at the Middle School in Teusa Panchayat, a session on "Adolescent Health" was conducted. A total of 25 boys and girls participated. They were informed about physical and mental changes during adolescence, nutrition, hygiene, and building self-confidence. The students shared that they had never received such information before.

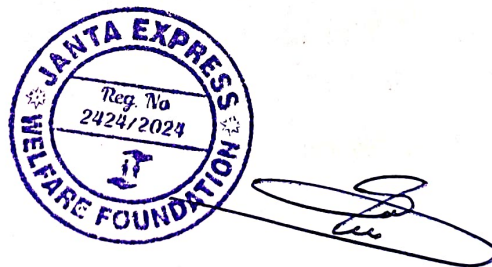


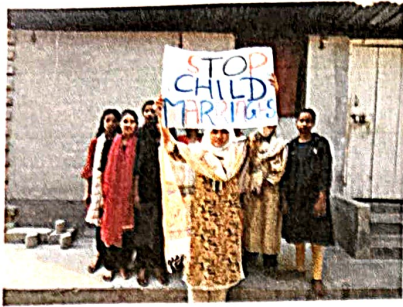
41. On 8 February 2025, in Ward No. 4, Chakla, an information session on "Government Schemes" was held with women. A total of 13 women were present. They were informed about how to avail benefits from schemes such as Widow Pension, Ujjwala Yojana, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, and self-employment programs. Some women expressed interest in filling out applications on the spot.

42. On 6 March 2025, a session on waste management and reuse was conducted with adolescents in Ward No. 3, Harijan Tola, Mahesh Bathna under the "Change Looms" initiative. A total of 22 adolescents participated in the program. They were informed about how to segregate plastic and other non-biodegradable waste for reuse or recycling. The aim of the session was to show that small efforts through the "Change Looms" initiative can help reduce the climate crisis and raise environmental awareness in the community.

43. On 13 March 2025, under the "Change Looms" initiative, a session on the topic of "Green Lifestyle" was organized at the Middle School, Shimlabari. A total of 28 students participated. They were informed about adopting environmentally friendly practices in daily life, such as riding bicycles, using cloth bags, and conserving water. The students took a pledge to try to prevent wastage of water and electricity at school and home and to bring positive changes in their behavior through the "Change Looms" initiative.

44. On 20 March 2025, under the "Change Looms" initiative, a discussion on "Climate Change and Our Responsibility" was held with women and youth in Ward No. 6, Teusa Panchayat. A total of 26 participants attended. During the dialogue, issues such as untimely rainfall, extreme heat, and drying water sources were explained in relation to climate change. The participants collectively resolved to conduct a cleanliness campaign in the village and plant a tree in front of every house to contribute to environmental protection and addressing the climate crisis through the "Change Looms" initiative.

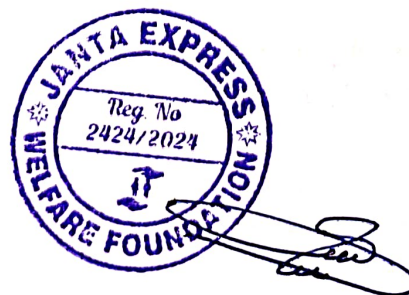

Key Project: "Hum Bhi"

The objective- of the "Hum Bhi" initiative was to empower adolescent girls and young women who were either survivors of child marriage or at risk of it. The project aimed to make them self-reliant by providing skill-based training and raising awareness about their rights.

Under this initiative, three sewing training centers were established in Kishanganj district, specifically in the following locations: 1. Simlabari village 2. Bagalbari Panchayat 3. Maheshbathna Harijan Tola, Tusa Panchayat

Each center formed groups of 25 adolescent girls and young women, many of whom were survivors of child marriage. These groups received technical training in sewing, enabling them to earn a livelihood. Along with the training, they were also supported in building self-confidence, provided guidance for self-employment, and were made aware of their legal and social rights.

The beneficiaries were also linked with various workshops, focused on topics such as legal rights, health, and gender equality, with the aim of strengthening their overall empowerment.

The Hum Bhi program is a holistic effort that not only provides livelihood skills but also nurtures dignity, independence, and leadership abilities among women and girls, helping them to lead a life of safety, respect, and self-reliance.





Funding Sources

This year, approximately ₹67343 was raised through contributions from the local community and youth. Many young individuals actively volunteered with the NGO and provided financial support. The initiative was entirely community-led, reflecting the dedicated involvement of youth and local members.

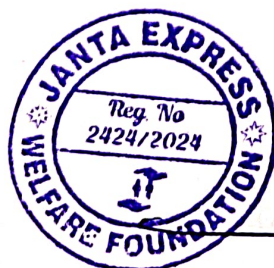

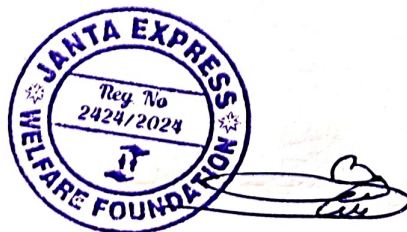

Support Against Domestic Violence:

Providing basic guidance, awareness, and referral support to women facing domestic violence and related issues.

Skill Development & Livelihood Support:

Conducting small-scale skill development programs to support 100+ women in improving livelihood opportunities.

Health and Menstrual Hygiene Awareness:

Reaching 200+ women and girls through awareness sessions in rural and underserved communities.

Women Leadership Development:

Encouraging 5–10 local women leaders/groups through training and community participation.
