## Awards Timeline

The annual Eiffel Awards salute writers who, in the sight of the Board of Members and the General Voters, make unique contributions each year to understanding and appreciating cinema and its makers.

There is no cash prize for winning, and there is no entry fee for entering.

\*Book titles from 2025 will continue to be added to the Eiffel Recommended Reading List at least until February 28, 2026.

\*Following screening of the Eiffel Recommended Reading List (ensuring that Board Members have nominated works that first appeared in 2025 and other eligibility criteria), the eligible works on the Eiffel Recommended Reading List will comprise the Eiffel Award Long List Preliminary Ballot to be Announced on or before April 15, 2026.

\*The Board must finish casting their votes to narrow the Long List to the official Eiffel Award Short List Nominee Ballot by May 1, 2026.

\*The Official List of Nominees in Twelve Categories will be Announced by June 1, 2026.

\*The Winning Titles will be Announced in Autumn 2026.

\*The date and format of the 2026 Award events will be confirmed here so please check back.

## Eligibility

Books are required to meet the following criteria:

- The volume must be published between January 1 - December 31, 2025. The copyright date on the colophon determines the publication year.
  - It must be available to buy (including online) in America.
  - It must have English text (bilingual editions are eligible). English language translations first published within the qualifying period are eligible, as well.
  - It may have a high amount of photography, but exclusively Image-only books are not eligible.
  - It may be published by the Big Five (Penguin Random House, Simon & Schuster, Macmillan, HarperCollins and Hachette), university presses, and independent/small publishers. Self-published titles must have been released in a minimum print run of 100 copies.
  - It may be a revised and enlarged book of an earlier edition, but there has to be at least 15% addition of new material and/or research. The original or earlier editions should not have been previously longlisted for the awards.

How do books feature the yearly Eiffel Recommended Reading List?

Each year, Book titles are invited to the Eiffel Recommended Reading List from approximately 100 international cinema scholars, magazine film staff, historians, journalists, collectives, film societies & film festival administrators/staff, film museum officials, booksellers, film directors, cinematographers, actors, movie editors, and screenwriters.

By number of votes received, there are Bronze, Silver, and Gold winners noted. Rather than the Caretaker and Board of Advisors breaking a tie when two or more books get equal votes (which is not uncommon) the tie is noted and there are several winners within either Bronze, Silver, or Gold.

The Caretaker for the awards and the website is Dr. Danel Olson (in Houston).

The Board of Advisors, who has the List of Voters and who may vote themselves, are either published international film scholars, directors, screenwriters, interviewers, journalists, documentarians, movie festival organizers, media museum curators/educators, or cinema professors:

How will the books be judged?

The Caretaker sorts into ten film-book categories by the Voters' submitted recommendations. Voters have a wide range of criteria, from the book's high production values, the visual design and use of photography, the original angle or fresh reporting, the memorable use of language and argument, and the impact upon readers, including themselves.
