3. Introduction to the Committee

The Metropolitan Police Service, commonly known as the Metropolitan Police, Met Police, or the "Met", is the territorial police force responsible for law enforcement and crime prevention within Greater London. Greater London is an administrative area in England, coterminous with the London region, containing most of the continuous urban area of London.

4. Metropolitan Police

a. The Organizational Structure of the Met

MPS has four operational functions: Frontline Policing, Met Operations, Trust & Legitimacy, Professionalism and Specialist Operations. Frontline policing leads local policing and specialist investigation across London, responsible for the public facing aspects of 'more trust and less crime'. It leads the delivery of precise community crime-fighting. Met Operations leads the delivery of services that enhance operational effectiveness across the Met, using data and intelligence from across the organisation to drive improved outcomes. Trust and legitimacy leads to the cultural portfolio; diversity & inclusion; approach to community engagement. Professionalism leads the MPS on tackling misconduct and corruption within the organisation and setting, embedding and enforcing professional standards. It holds the organisation to account for creating and maintaining a culture based on the MPS's values, standards and behaviours. Lastly, Specialist Operations continues to deliver counter terrorism and protective services (both in London and nationally).

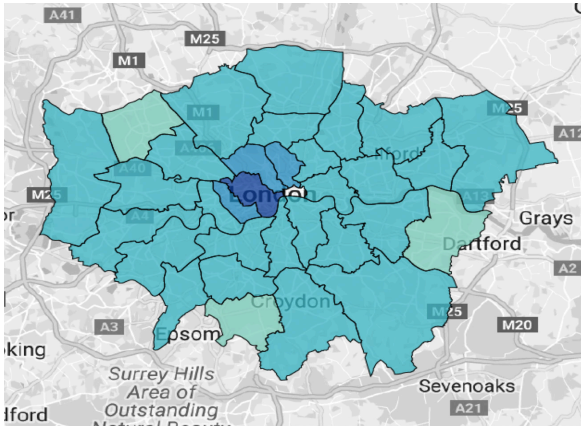
b. Senior Management

c. Jurisdiction

The Met polices 620 square miles and serves more than eight million people across one of the world's most dynamic and diverse cities. The area policed by the Metropolitan



Police District (MPD), consists of 32 boroughs and several additional authorities throughout Greater London, excluding the City of London.

5. The Law Reports

The Incorporated Council of Law Reporting (ICLR) for England and Wales is a registered charity based in London that publishes law reports of English law. The company is widely recognised as a reputable producer of reports, which are used by students, academics, journalists, lawyers, and judges across the country. Published monthly since 1865, The Law Reports are widely regarded as the most authoritative series of law reports for England and Wales. As the official series, they are required to be cited in preference to any other reports of the same case.

Since 1890 The Law Reports have consisted of four subdivisions, respectively covering the **Queen's Bench** (QB) (or King's Bench (KB)), **Chancery** (Ch) and **Family** (Fam) (formerly Probate, Divorce and Admiralty) Divisions of the High Court and Court of Appeal, together with references from those courts to the European Court of Justice; and **Appeal Cases** (AC) heard in the UK Supreme Court (previously the House of Lords) and Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

5.1. Queen's Bench/King's Bench (QB/KB)

Focuses on common law from the High Court's King's/Queen's Bench Division (depending on the monarch). Covers contracts, torts, commercial disputes, crime, administrative law, and judicial review; some Court of Appeal appeals from KB/QB are included. Known for procedural rigor and broad application in civil and criminal matters.

5.2. Chancery Division (Ch)

Specializes in equity and commercial law from the High Court's Chancery Division. Key areas: trusts, estates, mortgages, partnerships, companies, bankruptcy, land law, patents, and intellectual property. Remedies often involve injunctions or specific performance, contrasting with QB's damages focus.

5.3. Family Division (Fam)

Addresses personal status and welfare from the High Court's Family Division (evolved from the pre-1972 Probate, Divorce, and Admiralty Division). Includes divorce, child custody, adoption, wardship, inheritance disputes, and some international family law. Prioritizes welfare principles over strict precedent.

5.4. Appeal Cases (AC)

These cases report the most authoritative appellate decisions, binding all lower courts. They include rulings from the Supreme Court (post-2009), the pre-2009 House of Lords, Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, and select Court of Appeal cases on points of law of general public importance. Coverage starts from 1875, emphasizing constitutional, public, and cross-jurisdictional issues.

6. Case: 131126

“Case 131126” is a case the department has been working on for a day. It started with a 999 call on 13th November 2026 23.28 reporting about screams coming from a nearby home of the reporter. After the call, police arrived and they found blood seeping from the

bottom of a garbage bag inside the trash can outside the house. Dismembered body parts have been found inside multiple garbage bags with nothing else inside. The case files are currently transferred to the Criminal Investigation Department.

The inside house was mostly empty but the basement had a meat processing board and bottles of bleach. Rest of the details in hand are stated in the police report:

The main detective assigned to the case is detective Keller and detective Blackwest. Reporting officers Irene Smith and Ted McConnell and the detectives are currently at the house. While detective Keller and

Detail of Event:

On November 13 2026 at 23.28, an anonymous 999 call was made. The person on the line stated “There were loud screams coming from the basement of the house next door and it suddenly stopped. This is the second time this happened.” Officer Smith and officer McConnell arrived at the address five minutes after the call was made. The two floored house with a basement that was reported had two trash cans outside. They found garbage bags that seeped blood inside the trash can. Officers found dismembered body parts inside the garbage bags. The detectives and supervisors have been informed. The house is currently under search and the body parts are taken to test. Officers found bottles of bleach and a stainless steel meat processing board. Case is transferred to the Criminal Investigations Department.

forensics are examining the inside of the house, detective Blackwest and the reporting officers are checking the yard and the surroundings.

7. Characters

Sherlock Wilson: Detective Chief Inspector (DCI) in the MPS. It is a senior rank in the UK police Criminal Investigation Department (CID), ranking above a Detective Inspector and below a Detective Superintendent which act as senior investigating officers (SIOs) for major crimes, manage specialized departments, and supervise detectives, sergeants, and staff.

John T. Watson: He, a detective inspector, is a mid-ranking police officer, primarily in the UK and Commonwealth nations, operating within the Criminal Investigation Department (CID). Positioned above a Detective Sergeant and below a Detective Chief Inspector, they supervise investigations, manage teams, and deploy resources for serious crimes.

Elkin Eaglewood (Detective Sergeant): She ranks above a Detective Constable and below a Detective Inspector. She manages teams of investigators, oversees complex cases, reviews evidence, and ensures legal compliance in investigations.

Hudson E. Ozbourne (Detective): He is one of the most trusted detectives at Scotland Yard and always acts by the book. He has two kids that he talks about a lot.

Alia B. Keller (Detective): She's a hard-working detective who doesn't like to bend rules and works by the book. She got promoted around the same time as Aaron Cauldron, hence they've been partnered in most cases. She can often be heard on a call with her husband, Brooke Keller, whenever she's not working.

Ella R. Blackwest (Detective): She's a renowned detective known for being able to solve complex cases with ease. Even putting a new light on old cases, where most detectives thought there couldn't have been anything else to said case. During breaks, she's seen shittalking to Hudson about this person called "Evan Brookes".

Kerem Blade (Detective): He's a detective who got into the Criminal Investigation Department solely because of his networks. He's strict, rude, and overall an inconvenience to whoever he's partnered up with. Often calling himself a "C E O", he doesn't really get along with anyone in the MPS, especially K. Kaelis.

Aaron Cauldron (Detective): He's a detective who gets away with bending rules and finding legal loopholes in cases. He got promoted around the same time as Alia B. Keller, hence they've been partnered in most cases.
