15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The college is gearing up for the NEP 2020 which will usher in a new era of academic transformation through its multi-disciplinary approach. A holistic and multidisciplinary education will ensure the development of students in all areas- intellectually, socially, physically, emotionally and morally.

The college, at the moment, has an Arts and Commerce stream for the undergraduate level. The multiple courses offered by Mount Olive College are a testament to its dedication to meeting the needs of the students. Further, the college also offers compulsory Environmental Education papers at two different levels of undergraduate degree to achieve a comprehensive and holistic education.

The College plans to provide multiple entry and exit points for the convenience of the students. This is particularly important for the college because it draws a substantial amount of students from the economically weaker section with its nominal fees. This particular strategy will benefit the students who need to take a break to source finance. The college is prepared and determined to implement multiple entry and exit because it caters to the specific needs of our students.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Mount Olive College is getting ready for the NEP 2020 by implementing new systems such as Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). The college is equipped with the necessary skills and facilities to comply with the affiliated university's notification.

The students will have access to a digital store of academic credits, providing them with the flexibility to transfer and complement the multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary components of education, which is highly encouraged under NEP2020.

Through these preparations, the institution is equipping itself to seamlessly transition into the new ABC which will make collaborative works, and internationalisation of education by making joint degrees between students of different institutions across the country or even the globe and make the transfer of credit possible.

17.Skill development:

The college has a strong focus on equipping students with skills relevant to the 21st-century world. To this end, a dedicated Skill Development Committee has been established, whose role is to oversee the skilling of students. The college is equipped with a skill development lab, which showcases a range of products developed by students.

Mount Olive College hosts diverse students both geographically and economically. These diverse students prove to be our greatest strength as they bring diverse skills. The Skill Development Committee organises various programs to encourage entrepreneurship.

'Skill Potpourri contest', an online contest was organised where the students were given the platform to showcase their talent and compete in a healthy competition. The college also recognises the need to encourage the entrepreneurial endeavour of the students so, the Skill Development Committee held a 'Skill Fiesta: An Exhibition of Locally Crafted Products', where the students are allowed to showcase their handmade crafts and sell the same.

These activities are a testament to the college's deep commitment to not only skilling the students but also equipping them with practical knowledge of marketing their products. In these ways, the college is set to welcome the policies of NEP2020.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

India not only boasts as a torchbearer of knowledge as the earliest civilisation in the world but it also hosts one of the most diverse knowledge systems. Similarly, the college also hosts diverse groups of people coming from diverse backgrounds.

By the final year, the students, through the history course, are knowledgeable of the diverse cultures and rich civilisation of India.

The college is situated in Kohima Nagaland, a tribal state which hosts one of the most number of languages in India. The students and faculty speak and are knowledgeable of over 20 different languages. These languages are used in our daily communication in the college. The college, in that way, is encouraging the use of multilingualism in the college campus and classrooms.

The college is exploring the possibility of acting as a digital nodal agency by offering online Online Distance Learning (OLD). The college will also help the students in making informed decisions and encourage them to take suitable SWAYAM courses. The credits scored in these courses will then be transferred to their overall academic credit score.

The college is preparing itself to invest in up-to-date technology platforms for virtual learning and also equipping the faculty with technological literacy to effectively use lecture recordings, course materials, tests etc.

Further, the students are also being prepared by providing free ICT courses under the aegis of the National Institute of Electronics and Information Technology (NEILIT). The knowledge gained from this course will ensure a smooth transition to distance/online education and exhaust its advantages.
