


OUR SERVICE STRUCTURE



- The GSC Conference Inventory that was done at the 75th GSC will be included in summary-form in the Final Report, with a more detailed overview coming in the future
- The deadline to submit PAIs (proposed agenda items) for consideration at next year's GSC is 09/30, so it is right around the corner. I'm happy to help you, your group, or your district if you need it
- Lastly, the SWR Forum is coming up in November in Albuquerque. I will be there and I know some of you will be as well. It is a ton of fun and great opportunity to meet, interact with and ask questions directly to members of the GSB and the AA staff, who all work tirelessly for all of us, so I hope if you are in a position to attend, you consider doing so

It is hard to believe that this year is already more than halfway done. I'm going to continue to enjoy the time I have left as your delegate, doing my best to serve you and AA as a whole in the best way that I can. As your Public Information (PI) representative, I'm excited to share updates on our efforts to carry the message of Alcoholics Anonymous to those who need it most. Here's what's been happening:

- Meeting Guide/Hotline Stickers a Success!
- We've distributed nearly 100 meeting guide and hotline stickers, and they've been a big hit! These stickers are helping spread the word about AA meetings and our 24/7 hotline, making it easier for alcoholics to find the support they need. Keep an eye out for them in your community, and let me know if you'd like more to share!
- Collaboration with Salvation Army
- I'm working closely with the Salvation Army to place AA literature in their facilities and ensure hotline stickers are visible outside. This partnership will help reach individuals seeking recovery by providing access to AA resources in a supportive environment.
- Outreach to Community Organizations

I've reached out to organizations like Empowered Voices to explore opportunities for placing AA literature in their facilities. These efforts aim to connect with diverse communities and ensure our message of hope and recovery is accessible to all.

CORRECTIONS

Carrying the Message: AA Outreach at Oklahoma Corrections Reentry Fairs

The recent agency-wide restriction on outside paper and paper products significantly impacts Alcoholics Anonymous' efforts to provide support during meetings and reentry resource fairs. With the prohibition on bringing in books, literature, and any printed materials, AA representatives face challenges in sharing essential resources and information with participants. This limitation also extends to promotional materials, flyers, handouts, brochures, and even business cards, which are not allowed in the facilities.

As we adapt to these changes, we are actively exploring the potential use of agency-wide tablets distributed to inmates as a means of conveying information and resources. This could help bridge the gap left by the restrictions, enabling us to continue supporting individuals in their recovery journeys while complying with the new regulations.

STEP SEVEN

"Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings."

It means recognizing we can't overcome defects of character on our own. By asking a Higher Power for help, we open ourselves to change, growth, and freedom from old destructive patterns.

STEP EIGHT

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed and became willing to make amends to them all."

Step Eight is about accountability and healing. We make a list of those we harmed and become willing to make amends. This step prepares us for action by fostering honesty, humility, and readiness to repair relationships, opening the path toward forgiveness, econciliation, and freedom in recovery.

STEP NINE

""Made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others."

It means taking responsibility, making things right when we can, and exercising wisdom to ensure amends bring healing without causing further harm.

TRADITION SEVEN

"Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions."

This tradition protects A.A.'s independence and integrity.
By funding our own activities through members' voluntary contributions, we avoid outside influence or control. It emphasizes responsibility, unity, and the spiritual principle of giving back to sustain the fellowship.

TRADITION EIGHT

"Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers."

It means A.A. members freely share their experience, strength, and hope without payment, keeping recovery based on service, not profit. Paid staff may handle necessary tasks, but Twelfth Step work remains voluntary.

TRADITION NINE

"A.A., as such, ought never be organized; but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve."

It means A.A. relies on trusted servants, not rulers. Our fellowship stays simple, flexible, and guided by group conscience rather than rigid organization or authority.

CONCEPT SEVEN

"The Charter and Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness."

A.A.'s trustees hold legal authority to manage world services, but real power comes from the Fellowship's conscience and financial support. This balance ensures trustees can act responsibly, while ultimate authority remains with the groups through trust, tradition, and voluntary contributions.

CONCEPT EIGHT

"The trustees are the principal planners and administrators of over-all policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, exercising this through their ability to elect all the directors of these entities."

Trustees delegate daily service responsibilities to A.A.'s corporate boards, staff, committees, and executives. While trustees hold final responsibility, these trusted servants carry out the work. This balance allows effective operations while ensuring accountability, preserving both efficiency and A.A.'s spiritual principles in world service.

CONCEPT NINE

"Good service leadership at all levels is indispensable for our future functioning and safety.
Primary world service leadership, once exercised by the founders, must necessarily be assumed by the trustees."

Concept Nine emphasizes good leadership at all levels of A.A.

Trusted servants need vision, integrity, and the ability to guide with humility. While authority rests with the groups, effective leaders help carry out A.A.'s mission, balancing responsibility with accountability to ensure unity and faithful service.

Your Seventh Tradition Contributions Help Carry the Message

1 Our public service announcements (PSAs) offer powerful messages of hope to the suffering alreadylic. The Dublic



Information desk coordinates production and availability of TV and radio PSAs for GSO and local campaigns in English, French, and Spanish. Our TV PSAs have reached close to 600 million viewers, airing on more than 71,000 stations across the U.S. and Canada and on our YouTube channel. aa.org/resources/media.



2 In response to many correctional facilities going paperless, Crapevine and AAWS Publishing collaborated on a multi-year project to make A.A. literature available on more than 400,000 tablets in jails and prisons. For more information on tablets and the A.A. literature available please contact corrections@aa.org. aa.org/corrections-committees.

3 In 2023 the Corrections Correspondence Service (CCS) database created 1,355 matches presenting 2,710 members with the opportunity to engage in Twelve Step work. In addition to coordinating thousands of CCS participants, the Corrections

Coordinator continues to answer 300 letters each month from members.



4 Your contributions help make the A.A. message accessible to all. The Accessibilities desk continually updates service material such as the accessibilities check list for groups. This desk also has produced ASL versions of the Big Book and Twelve & Twelve, now available on our YouTube page and on aa.org. For members with vision loss, audio versions of the entire Big Book and Twelve & Twelve are available on aa.org. aa.org/accessibilities-workbook.



5 The Technology Department is always looking for ways to streamline workflows. The contribution portal has been updated to make it easier for groups and individual members to contribute online.



6 Regional Forums are an opportunity to bring the General Service Board, AA Grapevine and GSO office staff to the fellowship to foster communication and trust. There are also Local and Special Forums available upon request. These are intended to provide a Forum experience to AA. members while meeting cultural, accessibility and population considerations for those unlikely to be able to attend Regional Forums due to geographical location, sparsely populated or urban areas. Please contact regionalforums@aa.org for more information.





7 The Publishing Department is always hard at work. They manage literature revisions and keep A.A. books and pamphlets available so the message of recovery can be carried to the sick and suffering alcoholic.

8 With a half-million monthly users throughout the U.S., Canada, and the world, the A.A. Meeting Guide app has transformed how people find meetings. The app is managed by the Communication Services department, which continues enhance the app's functionality to optimize the user experience.





9 In 2023 the Staff Services department received approximately 165,000 emails and 1,700 phones calls from A.A. members, professional the media, and alcoholics needing help. The Member Services department continues to respond to inquiries from members covering everything from ordering literature to listing groups.

10 Member contributions made possible the complete redesign of our website aa.org in 2021 and the ongoing updating of the site to make our life-saving information easier to find, view, and share. Today, the site sees more



than 800,000 visitors per quarter with consistent growth in both the number of visitors and engagement with the site content.

Archive preservation activities help to ensure that the Fellowship's records are safely preserved and accessible to members. In 2023, GSO Archivists preserved thousands of vital historical documents and photographs, utilizing archival quality housing enclosures that provide physical support, protection and handling. Archival materials are housed for long-term preservation based on size, format and composition and contributions make this all possible. aa.org/aa-archives.


If each member sent in \$1 per year...


