This entails promoting climate-resilient practices like conservation tillage, integration of agroforestry, improved water management, and the thoughtful use of organic inputs. Healthy soils and biodiverse ecosystems are not ideas; they are requirements for sustained productivity.

Ensuring quality and sufficient food is accessible to all the families is our key concern. We give importance to diversification of crops, storage and processing facilities, local food systems and local resilience to shocks. Local food security begins at the beginning with empowered farmers feeding their communities.

Economic sustainability is what actual sustainability requires. Farmers must not only grow food, but also have successful businesses. This is where our innovative strategies

come into play.

There is no area where our holistic strategy is more visibly in action than in our trailblazing efforts in River Gee County. Here, we are implementing key strategies with the goal of creating long-term change:

The Mini-Bank Revolution: Seeds of **Financial Freedom: Equitable** access to credit is typically the missing link for smallholder farmers. They are typically out of reach for conventional banks. UFA's Mini-Bank System is turning the page. These community-controlled and owned financial outlets are a source of promise. Farmers are able to obtain small, convenient loans for seeds, instruments, or processing equipment without being taken advantage of by moneylenders. Savings are encouraged and shielded, developing personal and collective capital. The "goodness" in the mini-bank is that it is simple, locally owned, and has a direct impact:

Spurred on by the awareness of the need for diversified incomes and caring for the planet, UFA is at the forefront of honey bee keeping in River Gee and beyond. The business is a sweet spot for sustainability.

Bees are valuable pollinators, boosting yields for an array of crops, enhancing biodiversity.

Honey, beeswax, propolis, and royal jelly are desirable products of high value. UFA-facilitated processing centers allow farmers to process locally at higher profit.

Beekeeping takes relatively less initial investment and land, thus within reach of most, including women and youth.

Honey production tends to be less vulnerable to the same climatic

shocks that occur with annual crops. We train in innovative, ecologically sustainable hive management, honey harvesting techniques, and basic processing and packaging. Our vision is to establish a successful, marketoriented apiculture industry that complements subsistence agriculture.

Mini-bank loans and diversified activities like beekeeping and cassava cultivation are putting more money directly into farmers' pockets.

Diversified farming and sustainable agriculture lead to more reliable harvests and more varieties of food. Financial savings, diversified income, and sustainable agriculture make families more resilient to shocks.

Our work is never done. We keep learning, changing, and striving for improvement. Scaling up successful mini-bank model and apiculture activities to greater numbers of villages.

UFA Empowers Farmers Groups in Soap Making Sweaken River Gee County



Swaken, River Gee County, Liberia: In a major step toward improving food security and economic resiliency, the agricultural cooperatives and nutrition experts, taught farmers



Universal Farmers Association (UFA) has recently put a final stamp on a highly transformational Soup Making Training program at Swaken Farm

stall facility, River Gee County, Liberia. The program involved 60 farmers' groups, consisting of hundreds of smallholder farmers, profiting them with skills in processing locally grown crops into nutritious soups for income generation and community nutrition.

The two days long training, in collaboration with various local

to transform their staple crops such as cassava, sweet potatoes, leafy greens, and proteinrich legumes into shelf-stable and market-ready soups. Processes were taught on how to efficiently handle

production, preservation, packaging, and food safety so that all considered health legal

standards, while low-cost approaches were emphasized so that these techniques can be adopted by rural communities. "This program is about turning abundance into opportunity," said UFA Project Coordinator Victor S. Kaie. "Many farmers here grow nutritious crops but face post-harvest losses or limited markets. By adding value through soup production, we're tackling food waste, improving diets, and creating pathways to economic independence."

UFA and Ministry of Agriculture Team Up to Boost Farming in **River Gee County**

River Gee County, Liberia - In an exciting move to promote agricultural growth, Mr. Semeh Roberts, the Executive Director of the Universal Farmers Association (UFA) Liberia, recently sat down with Mr. Sherrif B. Weah, the County Agriculture Coordinator for Liberia's Ministry of Agriculture, right here in River Gee County on [insert date]. Their important conversation focused on building a partnership to tackle urgent challenges and create new

opportunities for local farmers.

Agriculture is the heart of Liberia's economy, providing jobs for over 60% of the population and contributing around 26% to the national GDP. Yet. farmers in rural areas like River Gee County often face obstacles like limited access to modern farming

techniques, quality supplies, and market connections. Aware of these challenges, UFA-a non-profit committed to supporting smallholder farmers-and the Ministry of Agriculture came together to explore ways to foster sustainable growth.

During their meeting, Mr. Roberts shared UFA's grassroots efforts, which include training programs for farmers, seed distribution initiatives, and advocacy for climate-smart practices. "Our goal is to empower farmers with the skills and resources they need to succeed," he said. "Working

alongside the Ministry will help us make a bigger difference, ensuring that every farmer has a chance to thrive."

Mr. Weah agreed, highlighting the government's dedication to aligning local initiatives with national agricultural strategies. "The fertile lands of River Gee are full of potential. By collaborating with UFA,

we can fill the gaps in resources, technology, and infrastructure," he noted.

Their discussion pinpointed several key focus areas:

Capacity Building: Joint workshops aimed at training farmers in sustainable practices, pest management, and post-harvest techniques NCLUDING Honey beekeeping.

Resource Access: Improving the distribution of high-yield seeds, fertilizers, and other essential inputs to enhance productivity.
