This young girl brings about a transformation in the life of those she meets, because she realizes that each day is a brand-new day and each new day brings about something new and brings hope of something better. As a Christian and follower of Jesus I am constantly reminded about death and resurrection, not only of Jesus but of each day too. Yesterday (2024) has gone, Today is a gift, Tomorrow is yet to be and bring with it something new.

#### **Epiphany**

The beginning of January is the time we think especially of the three kings who travelled from afar to worship Jesus and bring Him precious gifts.

What are your favourite Epiphany hymns?

We think of, 'As with gladness men of old', 'Brightest and Best of the sons of the morning,' 'We three kings of Orient Are.' A hymn not so familiar was written in the fourth century.

Here are two verses from this ancient hymn:

Eastern sages at His cradle Make oblations rich and rare; See them give, in deep devotion Gold and Frankincense and myrrh.

Sacred gifts of mystic meaning; Incense doth their God disclose Gold the King of Kings proclaimeth, Myrrh his sepulchre foreshows

This was written by Aurelius Clemens Prudentius

He was a Roman Christian poet born in Northern Spain, and he died around 413AD.

Towards the end of his life, he retired and lived a frugal life, writing Christian poems which influenced early Christian authors.

Another hymn we still sing written by him is 'Of the Father's Love forgotten'

Here is a collect for Epiphany

Eternal God, by a star you led wisemen to the worship of your Son, Guide by your light the nations of the earth, that the whole world may see your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, One God, now and forever. Amen.

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At the beginning of a new year, let us celebrate the lives of people who made and created all manner of 'things' that changed the world.


