<u>Racial Justice Sunday</u>-This is on the second Sunday in February. 9th February. This special day was established by the Methodist church 30years ago in response to the murder of Stephen Lawrence, who had died two years earlier. This year's theme; 'Coat of Many Colours' is designed to help us reflect on the increasing diversity that exists in the Churches of Britain and Ireland. It is an opportunity for all Christians to join together in: -

- Reflecting on the importance of racial justice.
- Thanksgiving for an end to misunderstanding, racism and injustice.
- Action that truly makes a difference.
- Fundraising for national and local racial justice initiatives.

Here are some scripture verses relevant to the theme for us to reflect on.

Acts Ch 10 v 34-35

Then Peter began to speak, 'I now realise how true it is that God does not show favouritism but accept people from every nation who fear him and do what is right'

• Proverbs Ch 31 v 8-9

Timothy Dudley-Smith 1926-2024

The Rev. Timothy was born in Manchester and died last year in Cambridge aged 97. He was Archdeacon of Norwich along with many other positions in the Church of England.

Why are we celebrating his life? Well amongst many things, he wrote over 400 hymns, many of which we sing regularly in our services.

Hymns such as StF 186, 'Tell out my Soul' based on Mary's song – The Magnificat. StF 509 'Safe in the shadow of the Lord' is based on Psalm 91. The first verse says: -

Safe in the shadow of the Lord,

Beneath his hand and power

I trust in him,

I trust in him,

My fortress and my tower

Another beautiful hymn is StF 43, 'Come let us praise the Lord', based on Psalm 95, and the tune is a Chilean Folle melody. The third verse is: -

In worship bow the knee,
Our glorious God confess;
The great Creator, he,
The Lord our righteousness.
He reigns unseen:
his flock he feeds
and gently leads
In pastures green.

A hymn asking Christ to be my leader, my teacher, my saviour is StF 492 'Christ be my leader by night as by day; In the second verse it reads:

Christ be my teacher in age as in youth, drifting or doubting for he is the truth.

Grant me to trust him; though shifting as sand, doubt cannot daunt me; in Jesus I stand.

One of Timothy Dudley-Smith's most loved hymns is StF 470 'Lord, for the years' where we give thanks for our journey with God. The five verses each start

- Lord for the years your love has kept and guided
- Lord for that word, the word of life which fires us
- Lord for our land, in this our generation
- Lord for our world, when we disown and doubt him
- Lord for ourselves; in living power remake us.

The whole hymn is a prayer of thanksgiving and intercession-just beautiful poetry.

We thank the Lord for hymn-writers both from long ago and in our own generation who contribute so much to our worship and faith.

Particularly today, we give thanks for the life and work of the Rev. Timothy Dudley-Smith and the legacy he has left us.

More about the hymn writer, John Newton, who was born 300years ago this year, in another edition of the magazine.

Here is a prayer from one of the weekly written circuit services

God of all our days

Our beginning and our end,

Help us to walk with you;
