The Methodist Prayer Handbook 2023/2024

The theme this year is 'Hidden Treasures' based on Isaiah Ch 45 v 3.

I will give you the treasures of darkness and riches hidden in secret places, so that you may know that it is I, the Lord, the God of Israel, who calls you by your name.

This was chosen by the Methodist & Vice President of the Methodist Conference as these words were spoken to people experiencing huge disruption, conflict and challenge. They say, 'God is with <u>us</u> in our challenging times. Even in the midst of uncertainty, we hear stories about how people have encountered God at work in unexpected places and amongst unexpected people. Finding these hidden treasures and riches in our churches and communities can help us to rediscover a sense of hope about what lies ahead and find a renewed calling to see where God is at work and to join in. '

As you are aware, Rev. Andrew Charlesworth and family have now moved to Cardiff as he takes up his new role as joint-chair of the Wales Synod, in the Methodist Church in Wales.

Here is Andrews's prayer in the Handbook for Day 8

Heavenly Father,

In the darkness of grief, may the light of Christ Shine. In the darkness of suffering, may the light of Christ Shine. In the darkness of oppression, may the light of Christ Shine. In the darkness of captivity, may the light of Christ Shine. In the darkness of our lives, may the light of Christ Shine.
