- This weekend marks the beginning of "Respect Life Month" in the Church.
- **Since 1972**, the *United States Conference of Catholic Bishops* has designated the month of October to be the month we place a special focus on the *dignity* of all human life.
- It does not matter our condition in life, the creed of our religion, or the color of our skin—<u>ALL</u> human life has dignity!
- As Catholics, we respect human life from its <u>conception</u> to <u>natural death</u>,

whether it's an *elderly person* on their death bed, a *criminal* behind bars or an *embryo* in the womb...

- It does not matter <u>HOW</u> that embryo was conceived in the womb—whether through rape, incest, or unwanted pregnancy,
  - the fact remains, according to the American College of Pediatricians, human life begins at the <u>moment</u> of conception!<sup>1</sup>

- And that tiny <u>human</u> life has just as many <u>God-given rights</u> as you and I. In fact, it should have <u>more</u> since it cannot defend itself!
- Laws are supposed to protect the innocent, not kill them.
  - You cannot get any more *innocent* or *defenseless* then a baby in the womb of its mother.
- Before *Rowe vs. Wade* in 1973, there were laws to protect those who could not protect themselves.
- If America claims to be a "defender of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" why did our *Supreme Court* allow this to change?...
- The theme for this year's Respect Life Month is "Moved by Mercy."
- The Church wants people to know that if we have helped end the life of another human being—no matter their situation or ours,
  - God wants us to <u>heal</u> us from <u>remorse</u> and <u>regret</u> of ending that life.

- When it comes to understanding the DIGNITY of life, it helps to understand the value of life through God's eye's.
- The world tells us that if we are not yet born, have a disease, have grown too old, or are unattractive by society's standards,
  - o then our life is not worth *living*, or *protecting*.
- This is the same mind-set the *Nazi's*, the *Communists* and countless *terrorist groups* have had over the centuries—
  - and even our own Government when we once said that "slavery" was okay...
- However, God and the Catholic Church tells us that <u>ALL</u> human life—
  - no matter how disordered, deformed, poor, uneducated, or repulsive to society's standards is still precious in the eyes of God!
- Why? Because every human being is given a Soul made in the image and likeness of God—which means we have the capacity to know and love our Creator. (Genesis 1:27)

- Apes, dolphins, elephants, pigs, dogs, squirrels, crows, rats and octopuses—are ranked as some of the most intelligent creatures on earth.
  - And "YES," I said, "octopuses." In every GOOGLE search
     I did on this topic octopuses were listed!
- Yet <u>none</u> of them, **NONE** of them, have ever built an *altar*, drawn an *image* or created a *ritual*, to honor and worship their Creator!
- God chose us—You and Me—to have the capacity to explore the Mind of God and then reflect His abilities and greatness by what we can know and create.
- **Respecting Life** does not only mean *respecting* the life of another, it means respecting our *OWN LIFE* as well.
- We live in a culture where the human body is constantly depicted as an object of sexual pleasure, an object of violence or an object of disdain and loathing.
- This "disordered image" of human life deteriorates and suffocates the dignity and respect bestowed on every person who was "wonderfully made in their mother's womb" by God... (Ps 139:13-14).

- **Respecting Life** also means respecting the *self-esteem* of others by being mature enough to say "I'm sorry for hurting you," or "I forgive you."
- This is the message that Jesus is trying to get through to his Apostles in today's Gospel. (Lk 17:5-10)
- In order to really understand today's Reading, we have to look at the *preceding* verses which say:
  - "Take heed to yourselves; if your brother sins, rebuke him, and if he repents, forgive him; and if he sins against you seven times in the day, and turns to you seven times, and says, "I repent," you must forgive him..." (vs 3-4)
- When the Apostles ask Jesus to help them "increase their faith..." they are asking for Jesus to help them understand how they could continually forgive someone who continually sins against them.
- This is when Jesus tells the Apostles:
  - "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to this mulberry tree, 'be uprooted and planted in the sea' and it would obey you."

- The type of "faith" Jesus is referring to here, is not that the Apostles believe in God—they already do.
- The type of "faith" Jesus is referring to has more to do with seeking his *GRACE* to help them do what they feel they can't do themselves.
- He is saying, "I know you're not strong enough to do what I
  am instructing you to do, but if you come to me and ask me
  to help you—if you have just a <u>little faith</u> in me—
  - I will give you the *Graces* to forgive the person who has wronged you time and time again...
- The mulberry tree would have been one of the largest trees in all of Israel.
- The roots of this kind of tree were thought to be extraordinarily strong; it was thought that this tree could stay rooted for hundreds of years.
- We may have *unforgiveness* and *bitterness* in our hearts that that is also deeply rooted,
  - but through our faith in Christ, he will help us dig down deep and rip out those roots of "unforgiveness."

- At the end of today's Gospel, Jesus says that even after you have forgiven someone repeatedly, don't expect me to jump up and down and say, "Thank you, thank you, thank you!"
- Your forgiveness is its own reward because if you do not forgive someone, then you are the one who is really suffering due to the "hardness" it creates in your heart.
- That "hardness," is the *tension* and *disharmony* we feel in our heart by not forgiving someone.
- Jesus wants to **FREE** us of this *inner-tension* and restore *inner-peace* through our *never-ending* forgiveness of others.
- Btw, we expect GOD to forgive us each and every time we ask for <u>His</u> forgiveness. If we want to be considered a *true* child of God, He expects us to do the same!
- Treating each other with the same kind of *Dignity* and
   Forgiveness that we expect from God is all part of having
   Respect for Life.
- It's not just about sustaining and preserving our PHYSICAL life, but our Spiritual life as well—and the Spiritual life of others.

- In our 2nd Reading today, St. Paul says to Timothy:
  - o "I remind you to stir into flame the gift of God that you have... for God did not give us a *Spirit* of cowardice, but rather the *power* and *love* of *self-control... with the* <u>strength</u> that comes from God. (1 Tim 1:6-8, 13-14)
- Again... God knows we are not spiritually strong enough at times to tell someone, "I forgive you" or "I am sorry I hurt you"—but the Holy Spirit is.
- This is why we must always remember to turn to Him and ask Him to do what <u>we</u> cannot do for ourselves...
