Visit of the Legendary Jan Pennings and his Wife Ans

Last year, as a result of a rare plant and bulb plantsman Timothy Clarke and our Trustee Rob Evans, we were given some super pre 1800 bulbs from the nursery of Jan Pennings who lives in Holland. To thank Jan, I sent him a copy of our book on The Cowbridge Physic Garden. The result of this is that Jan and Ans visited Cowbridge on Sunday April 6th before going to see Rob at Pheasant Acre.

Sue Duffield, Gillian Griffiths and I met with them on a gloriously sunny afternoon and we felt so very privileged to be in their company! Jan is truly 'Royalty' in the bulb world, known throughout the world for his extraordinary knowledge and expertise especially in the field of daffodils and hyacinths. He has been on many horticultural committees but earned widespread recognition serving as Chair of the RHS Bulb Committee, where he was awarded The Queen Elizabeth Medal of Honour, was on the Board of the renowned Keukenhof Gardens, and also is a recipient of the Gold Medal from the American Daffodil Society.

Jan's bulb farm in northwestern Holland has been run by three generations, and whilst he still keeps an eye on things and lives on the property, the business is managed by his son and son-in-law. He has travelled all over the world in search of new and rare varieties and talking to him was truly fascinating.

Before leaving us he asked that we dig up a small piece of the Easter Pasque Flower, *Pulsatilla vulgaris*, for his 'Friendship Garden' back home. He said it will remind him of The Cowbridge Physic Garden whenever he sees it. We were truly honoured! *Jo Homfray*




That is what the Physic Garden means to me.



Encounter with the Bushmen in South Africa



On a recent trip to South Africa we returned to !Kwa ttu (don't ask me to pronounce it), a Heritage Centre dedicated to the San (Bushman).

The San are among the world's last living hunter-gatherers and the largest population that remain are in semi-desert areas of South Africa, Namibia and Botswana – the Kalahari.

They have a treasure of knowledge of the environment they live in, as the environment is their pantry, pharmacy, tool shed, shelter, grocery store etc. Plants provide food, medicine, shelter, dyes, fuel, glue, cosmetics and may other important functions in their culture.

Some of the plants they use have unusual names like Beer Root, Kraalbos, Khadi Root, Seaside Stork's Bill as well as many that we are familiar with.

Within a few decades most surviving San had been forced out from the southern reaches of the west coast but there remains a rich body of traditional knowledge alive within modern descendants.

Interestingly, when there was a serious drought in the Cape a few years ago, these people said 'if only the government asked us where the water was, we could tell them!' A simple life but rich in knowledge.

Borage, Borago Officinalis, Tafod y Fuwch

I think of borage as a pretty blue flower but in 2024 I found this white one in the Nerve bed, which got me thinking about the medical uses of the plant, summer and Pimms!

The plant was once believed to have been introduced by the Romans, but now it is thought to be a native plant. It was given to men leaving to fight in the Crusades to give them courage and to keep them going day and night. Gerard wrote that 'Floures in salads to exhilarate and make the minde glad.' The Romans called it 'the plant that cheers'.

In the Physic Garden it is found in many of the beds.

Bones: Used for rheumatism and rheumatoid arthritis.

Childbirth: Taken medicinally to stimulate mother's milk and regulate the hormonal system.

Eyes: Brings relief to sore eyes.

Heart and blood: Taken to reduce swellings and bruises and to slow heart rates and lower blood pressure.

Kidneys: Used to clear urinary problems.

Lungs: Taken to relieve lung and respiratory infections.

Muscles and glands: Stimulates adrenaline glands and regulates the hormonal system.

Nerves: Mild sedative and anti-depressant.

Skin, nails and hair: Soothes irritated and damaged tissues and can be used as an alternative to Evening Primrose oil for dry skin and bruises.

The leaves have a slight taste of cucumber and are used in salads while the flowers are used for decoration, especially in a 'Pimm's'. Pimm's was a gin-based liqueur created by James Pimm, a farmer's son who owned an oyster bar in 19th-century London, who offered to his guests this secret mix of gin, quinine, and a spice blend as a tonic to aid digestion. Today Pimm's No. 1 is 25% alcohol by volume, 50 proof.

To make a classic **Pimm's Fruit Cup**, mix 1 part Pimm's No. 1 with 2 parts lemonade. Add ice and a variety of fruit and garnish with Borage flowers for a refreshing summer drink – AND IT DOES YOU GOOD! Val Caple
