Life in the Rainforest of Costa Rica and the Response to Climate Change

Bribri Territories, Costa Rica



Yorkin River, Bribri Territories

On this unique trip we set out on an immersive journey to one of the most beautiful places in the world to learn about the impacts of climate change and explore the relationship between consumption, happiness, and environmental stewardship. We will travel into the heart of the rainforest of Costa Rica to visit and work with a Bribri Indigenous community that straddles Costa Rica's border with Panama. We will share with the people of the village of Yorkín to learn about their struggle to protect their land and way of life and for whom consuming "stuff" has always been less important than other values like community, solidarity, and respect for Nature.

Nowhere on Earth matches the rich biological diversity of the tropical rainforest, and on our journey, we will experience the wonder and beauty of the natural world and our connection to it.

Day 1- Friday March 20: Arrival

You arrive at the Juan Santamaría International Airport just outside the city of Alajuela. You will be picked up at the airport and after a 45-minute ride you arrive at your hotel in the center of San José. Welcome to Costa Rica! Get settled in and, depending on the time of arrival, we'll have lunch and we may take a walk to explore the neighborhood. Tonight, we have our introductory meeting about Costa Rica and what to expect during your Service Expedition!

Lodging and Meals: Boutique Hotel Casa Orquideas, San José

Day 2- Saturday March 21: Poás Volcano

Today we visit the Poás Volcano with Dr. Maria Martínez. María is an expert volcanologist with the National Volcano Observatory, and she's the perfect guide to show us Poás: an impressive, active volcano just north of the city of San José. With luck we'll have a chance to see the fumaroles lofting chemicals from the main crater. After a delicious lunch we will explore San José, visit the Pre-Colombian Gold Museum, and shop for handicrafts.

Lodging and Meals: Boutique Hotel Casa Orquideas, San José

Day 3- Sunday March 22: Travel to Yorkín

We head out early today and travel east to the Caribbean coast. We will pass through the Braulio Carrillo National Park and the port town of Limón on our way to the Bribri Territories. The Bribri are Costa Rica's largest group of Indigenous people and their territory lies primarily in the mountainous rainforests of southern Costa Rica. After arriving in Bribri territory we will travel to the town of Bambú where we will take a dugout canoe up the Yorkín River to the community of the same name.

Once we arrive at Yorkín we'll have an introductory meeting about the community and the STIBRAWPA eco-tourism project, and we'll learn some Bribri vocabulary to speak during our stay! The small village is surrounded by one of the largest remaining areas of untouched rainforest in Costa Rica. During the next few days, we will learn first-hand about life in the Bribri territories of Costa Rica and their deep connection to the rainforest and its creatures.

Lodging and Meals: Stibrawpa Community Lodge, Yorkín

Day 4- Monday March 23: E. Coli Water Testing, Medicinal Plants, and Bribri History

This morning, we do our E. Coli sampling project with members of the community. The goal of the project is to support the community in evaluating the quality of water from different sources. Through this work in solidarity and cooperation with the community, we will experience a bit of what life is like in the Bribri Territories. You are guaranteed to get dirty and sweaty today and we will wash it off in the river that runs near the lodge!

This afternoon our friends in Yorkín will lead us on a hike where we will learn about the medicinal values and properties of the plants in the forest. Afterwards, we will learn about how to make and prepare one of the most important and sacred of all of the plants: cacao! Tonight, we will gather together with the elders in the community to learn about the history of the Bribri people and their struggle to conserve their way of life after 500 years of colonization.

Lodging and Meals: Stibrawpa Community Lodge, Yorkín

Day 5- Tuesday March 24: Microplastics Testing, Bow and Arrow Lessons, and Meeting with a Kékepa (Bribri Elder)

Today we visit various rivers and streams in the community to test for microplastics to compare to results from the seawater testing we will be doing. This afternoon we will be given a lesson on how to make and shoot the traditional Bribri hunting bow and arrow.

Afterward, we gather in an Úsure (a traditional sacred building) to hear Kékepa Rigoberto share the basics of the Bribri beliefs about Sibö (God) and their sacred relationship with the Earth.

Lodging and Meals: Stibrawpa Community Lodge, Yorkín

Day 6- Wednesday March 25: Last Day in Yorkín

Today is our last day with the Bribri people of Yorkín. This morning, we will fish in the local streams in order to carry out our freshwater fish egg sac harvesting. This afternoon we will relax in the nearby swimming hole and play some pick-up soccer with our new friends in the village. Tonight, we gather to celebrate a job well done and discuss how we might apply the new lessons learned from our friends in the ancestral lands of the rainforest of Costa Rica.

Lodging and Meals: Stibrawpa Community Lodge, Yorkín

Day 7- Thursday March 26: Beach Day in Puerto Viejo

This morning, we say goodbye to our friends in Yorkín to travel back down the river to Bambú and then on to the beach town of Puerto Viejo. We will settle in at Cabinas Selvin and spend the day enjoying the beautiful Punta Uva Beach. While on the beach, we will collect samples of seawater for our microplastics testing project. This beach has been voted one of the 15 most beautiful beaches in the world by Trip Advisor and it is the perfect place to relax and reflect on all that we have seen and learned.

Lodging and Meals: Cabinas Selvin, Puerto Viejo

Day 8- Friday March 27: Microplastics Testing, Egg Sac Collecting, and Travel Back to San José

This morning, we will visit a number of local beaches for additional microplastics testing and acquire fresh fish to collect the egg sacs. Afterwards, we travel over the mountains back to San José.

Lodging: Boutique Hotel Casa Orquideas, San José

Day 9- Saturday March 28: Back Home!

We have an early breakfast and then it is off to the Juan Santamaría International Airport. Have a great trip home!

Fee

The fee for the 9 Day Latin American Service Expedition to Yorkín, Costa Rica is US\$1,795 per participant, with a minimum of 9 students.

What's Included

The fee includes all food (3 healthy meals a day), lodging, transportation, materials, equipment, 24/7 guidance, programmed recreational activities, and a donation to the communities we visit. The fee does not include international airfare, health insurance, airport taxes, personal expenses, or COVID tests.

Reservation and Cancellation Polices

To reserve a service expedition LASE requires a non-refundable deposit of US\$200/person. The deposit is applied to the price of the expedition and the full price of the expedition must be received at least eight weeks in advance of its start. A full refund is given up to six weeks before the start date. 50% is refunded between six weeks and the start date, and no refund is given after the start date.

Terms and Conditions

Conditions for Participation

The goal of Latin American Service Expeditions (LASE) is to offer learning, adventure and a group experience within the boundaries of safety, common sense, and the law. Living within a small group is challenging and students will be expected to actively participate and at times compromise some of their own needs for the common goals of the group. While participating in program activities, students must follow the stated instructional sequence and safety standards. Unsafe actions taken by any participant are grounds for dismissal. Possession or use of tobacco products, weapons, alcohol or unprescribed drugs, as well as sexual activity, exclusive relationships and unauthorized absence from the group are against our rules, and we are inflexible about them. LASE reserves the right to dismiss participants who have violated the Conditions for Participation or the Student Contract, or who we believe have become an overall hindrance to the group process or the stated goals of the program. Participants who are dismissed or who withdraw will be sent home at their own expense, without refund of any fees paid, even in the case of medical conditions. In such instances, accompaniment by a LASE leader on the flight(s) home will be impossible, though at the request of a parent or quardian, LASE will attempt to arrange for the student to be treated as an unaccompanied minor by the airline. In such instances, any additional fees will be borne by the participant's family.

Health Forms

Our health form must be completely filled out and signed by a parent or guardian or by the family physician. The health form must be received by LASE with the enrollment form. Acceptance into an expedition is contingent upon our approval of the health form, and failure to answer all questions accurately or the misrepresentation of the participant's current physical and/or emotional condition may necessitate the dismissal of the participant, even after the expedition has commenced, at the parents'/guardians' expense. All students must be covered by medical insurance. In case of illness or injury, LASE will administer first aid and/or take the injured student to medical services. The cost of these services (including expenses for both the student and accompanying staff person) are the responsibility of the parent or guardian. Students who leave the program for medical reasons are not eligible for a refund.

Transportation

International travel to and from the Juan Santamaria International Airport is the logistical and financial responsibility of the parents/guardians. Travel arrangements must be submitted to LASE.

Risk Management

Safety management is our priority. The physical and emotional well-being of our participants is the primary concern of our leaders. LASE uses care in the selection of our leaders, transportation companies, outfitters, facilities and

services, and takes active steps to identify, analyze and manage risk to all participants and their personal property. Our risk management protocol cannot remove all risk; parents and participants must understand the nature of our expeditions and accept the inherent risks involved in such activities.

Equipment

Latin American Service Expeditions will provide equipment needed for group travel and living and participants are expected to care for equipment. If a participant damages or loses any equipment belonging to or subcontracted to LASE, the student and/or parent/guardian will be held responsible (normal wear and tear excluded). LASE insurance does not cover the personal property and equipment of participants; parents/guardians should check with their own insurance providers to ensure their child's personal property and equipment are covered against loss, theft or damage.
