DAILY & WEEKLY MAINTENANCE

Regular Vacuuming

Frequency: Every few days to weekly, depending on

foot traffic

Proper Technique:

- Vacuum the backside first to shake loose deeply embedded dust and debris
- Clean up any debris from the floor
- Flip and vacuum the front side
- Vacuum the backside every few months
- Use moderate suction to avoid damaging delicate fibers

Pro Tip: Weekly vacuuming of both sides removes dust and debris that can damage delicate fibers over time

Rotation for Even Wear

Rotate the direction of your rug regularly to ensure even wear patterns, especially in high-traffic areas. This simple step prevents certain areas from becoming more worn than others.





PLACEMENT CONSIDERATIONS

Optimal Positioning

- Avoid direct sunlight: Direct sunlight can cause color fading
- Consider traffic patterns: Avoid placing rugs in the highest-traffic areas when possible
- Use rug pads: Quality rug pads prevent slipping and reduce wear from friction against floors

Environmental Factors

Control humidity and temperature when storing or displaying vintage rugs to prevent fiber damage and maintain structural integrity.





SPOT CLEANING & STAIN MANAGEMENT

Immediate Response Protocol

Get stains while they're wet - once a stain dries, it's much more difficult to remove

Step-by-Step Spot Cleaning:

- 1. Blot, don't rub: Use clean, white cloths to absorb liquid without pushing it deeper
- 2. Work from outside in: Prevent the stain from spreading
- 3.Test first: Always test cleaning solutions on an inconspicuous area
- 4.Use minimal moisture: Excessive water can damage backing and cause shrinkage
- 5.Dry thoroughly: Ensure complete drying to prevent mold and mildew

Safe Cleaning Solutions

Mild dish soap solution: Mix small amount with cool water





Professional Cleaning Schedule Frequency Guidelines

- General recommendation: Professional cleaning every five years
- High-traffic or pet households: Deep cleaning every 12 to 18 months
- Low-traffic areas: Every 5-7 years may be sufficient

Choosing Professional Services

Professional cleaning should be done by someone that specializes in antique rugs - this is an art in itself

What to Look For:

- Specialization in vintage/antique rug cleaning
- Temperature-controlled drying facilities
- Experience with your rug's specific fiber type and weave
- References and portfolio of similar work
- Detailed documentation process





WHEN TO SEEK PROFESSIONAL HELP

Immediate Professional Attention Needed:

- Large or set-in stains
- Water damage or flooding
- Moth damage or other pest issues
- Fraying edges or loose threads
- Color bleeding or dye transfer
- Strong odors that don't resolve with airing

Restoration vs. Cleaning

Some issues require restoration specialists rather than cleaning services. Structural damage, significant moth damage, or color restoration should be handled by certified rug restoration professionals.





LONG-TERM PRESERVATION

Storage Best Practices When storing vintage rugs:

- Control humidity and temperature
- Roll rather than fold when possible
- Use acid-free tissue paper between folds if rolling isn't feasible
- Store in breathable materials, not plastic
- Check periodically for pest activity

Value Protection

Proper care and maintenance is crucial to preserving beauty, value, and structural integrity. Document your rug's condition with photos and maintain records of professional cleanings and any treatments.





RED FLAGS: WHAT NOT TO DO

Cleaning Don'ts

- Never use harsh chemicals or household cleaners not designed for natural fibers
- Don't oversaturate excessive moisture can cause shrinkage, dye bleeding, or mold
- Avoid steam cleaning unless specifically recommended by a professional
- Don't ignore stains the longer they sit, the harder they become to remove
- Never place wet rugs in direct heat for drying

Handling Precautions

- Don't drag or pull rugs across surfaces
- · Lift rather than slide when moving
- Avoid wearing shoes with heels or cleats on valuable rugs
