Creation Retelling & The Nature of God

Genesis 1:1–12 (Creation)

Vocabulary:

• **Redemption:** Redemption means being rescued or saved from something bad, and given a chance to start fresh.

Materials:

Retelling

God had a plan. A plan called redemption. When the angels in heaven learned about it, they were puzzled. They didn't understand what the plan meant, though they desperately tried to figure it out. God chose a very unlikely place to begin His plan — a chaotic world, covered in darkness and raging with water. But His Spirit hovered over the water, watching and waiting. Then God spoke. Nature of God

That's the difference between us and God. God didn't have to describe anything He made. He simply spoke — and it became exactly as He imagined. Every time.
