Q&A Pre-Trip Prep

What can I expect when I arrive at the airport, if I fly there?

Unless otherwise notified, you will be met by *Archivo e Historia CANCEN* commission members holding up a sign with our logo at the airport exit after you have cleared customs and immigration.



What should I take with me on this trip?

Bring comfortable clothes for workdays; comfortable clothes and walking shoes for days you want to tour the city; and something conservative to wear to church on Sundays.



Where will I live?

A small apartment or house located close to the archive.

Should I drink tap water?

It is not recommended that you drink tap water even if the local people do. Bottled water is easily available to be purchased close to the worksite, and anywhere in town.



Do I need to exchange money - dollars for pesos?

Yes. You can do so at the airport before you leave the US for Mexico, or you can exchange dollars for pesos in exchange locations as soon as you drive into Mexico if you will be driving there. Most vendors in Chihuahua accept credits cards such as Visa, MasterCard, and American Express. You are also able to withdraw funds from ATMs found in local banks.



What should I expect the work to be like?

A schedule can certainly be negotiated. Arrival and departure workdays and times can be set to your liking. There is a kitchen at the archive where you can have your lunch or walk to a restaurant close by, if you prefer. Everything you need to accomplish the organization of the archive will be at the worksite and supplies will be replenished as needed.



Do I need vaccines?

Depending on your personal medical history and past travel, vaccinations will vary. Team members are advised to consult with their personal physicians to determine if any vaccines are recommended.

Q&A TRAVEL

Do I need a Visa to go to Mexico?

Yes, you will be required to obtain a tourist visa to travel into Mexico. If driving, a visa can be obtained at the Mexican customs desk as soon as you drive over any of the international bridges into Mexico.

If you will be flying from the interior of the United States, you can apply online by visiting: https://citas.sre.gob.mx/

Alternatively, you can go to a Mexican consulate or embassy and schedule an appointment by calling: 424-309-0009.

What do I need to obtain a Visa?

You are required to have a valid passport and a completed Multiple Digital Migration Form (FMMd). You will also be asked for your destination address so have the archive address at hand:

Calle Valentín Gómez Farias #9, Zona Centro, 31000, Chihuahua, Chih.

How much will the Visa cost?

Mexico will allow you to get a visa at <u>no cost</u> if you are staying 7 days or less. Otherwise, you will be required to pay for your visa if staying for more than 7 days and up to a maximum of 180 days (6 months). The cost is approximately <u>\$50 US Dollars</u> depending on the exchange rate at the time.

What should I not take on this trip?

Do not bring:

- Alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, guns or ammunition.
- Expensive jewelry, clothing, or anything you can't replace if lost or stolen.
- Excessive amounts of cash. Remember, you have the option of using an ATM to withdraw cash or Visa, Mastercard, or American Express credit cards. (*Not everyone accepts AmExp*).

What should I expect from this experience?

• Expect to make new friends and for this whole experience to be satisfying. In spite of the hard work, it will be a blessing for both you and for those you will be serving. You will literally be showing God's love through the hard work you will do for this project.



MEXICAN CULTURE INFORMATION

- Capital and largest city is Mexico City.
- Official language is Spanish.
- Religion is 88.9% Christianity (77.7% Catholicism and 11.2 Protestantism).
- Currency is the Mexican Peso.
- Mexico is a Federal republic with a presidential system of government.
- Mexico is a newly industrialized and developing country.
- Independence day (from the Spanish empire) is the 16th of September (1810).
- Chihuahua is located at the northern part of Mexico about 4 hours south of El Paso, Texas.
- Chihuahua is 1 of 31 states in Mexico.
- Chihuahua is the largest state in Mexico by area having 95,543 square miles of land.



- The Tarahumara are the largest ethnic group of indigenous people in the state of Chihuahua
- They come from the Sierra Madre Occidental.
- They speak Tarahumara and Spanish.
- They sell artisanal goods that they themselves make.
