## The 5 Steps of Your AI Content Audit

### Step 1: Clarity Audit

Ask:

- Can the core point be understood within the first few sentences?
- Does the article delay meaning with excessive storytelling or buildup?
- Would a skim-reader immediately understand the topic and value?

Checklist:

- Core idea appears early
- Headlines communicate value clearly
- Intro paragraphs avoid unnecessary abstraction

### Step 2: Extractable Moments

Review whether sections can stand on their own in AI-generated summaries.

**Look for:**

- Definitions
- Structured lists
- Direct comparisons
- Explicit relationships between ideas

**Checklist:**

- Key sections make sense independently
- Concepts are clearly framed
- Important points are easy to quote or summarize

### Step 3: Terminology Consistency

AI systems struggle with inconsistent terminology.

#### Audit for:

- Product naming consistency
- Consistent audience labels
- Stable feature and category terminology

#### Checklist:

- Similar concepts use consistent labels
- Terminology shifts are intentional and defined
- Metadata/headings align with body language

### Step 4: AI Interpretation Testing

Paste your content into multiple AI tools and ask:

- What is this article about?
- Who is it for?
- What action should the reader take?
- Summarize this page.

Track where summaries become inaccurate, vague, or inconsistent.

### Step 5: Reduce Interpretive Friction

Improve interpretability with:

- Stronger headers
- Shorter paragraphs
- Clear transitions
- Direct statements
- Explicit definitions

#### Goal:

Make meaning easier to accurately interpret and reuse.
