As Chairman of Strathclyde Regional Studies Group, Editor of the Regional Studies Bulletin, and Advisory Member of the South West Scotland Economic Planning Group, I was engaged on a number of practical inter-disciplinary research projects in recent years, e.g. on the Solway Barrage, Symposium on Local Government Reorganisation, etc.

In 1967-68 I directed an inter-disciplinary team into an enquiry into the economy of South West Scotland in conjunction with the Scottish Tourist Board, the Scottish Development Department and the Local Authorities, the main results of which were published as "The Galloway Project".

Although details of my current work as Senior Economic Adviser are, of course, confidential, broadly speaking it has four main aspects:-

Briefing of Ministers; analysing the main trends influencing the Welsh economy; servicing the Welsh Planning Board and Welsh Council; and directing and controlling economic and statistical research.

As Head of the Economic Services Division of the Welsh Office, I am also formally responsible for publishing the "Welsh Digest of Statistics", the latest issue of which contains new material on Identifiable Public Expenditure in Wales, and for assisting in the publication of Welsh Council economic papers, e.g. the Finance Panel's Report on the "Availability of Capital for Small Firms in Wales", H.M.S.O. October, 1969.
