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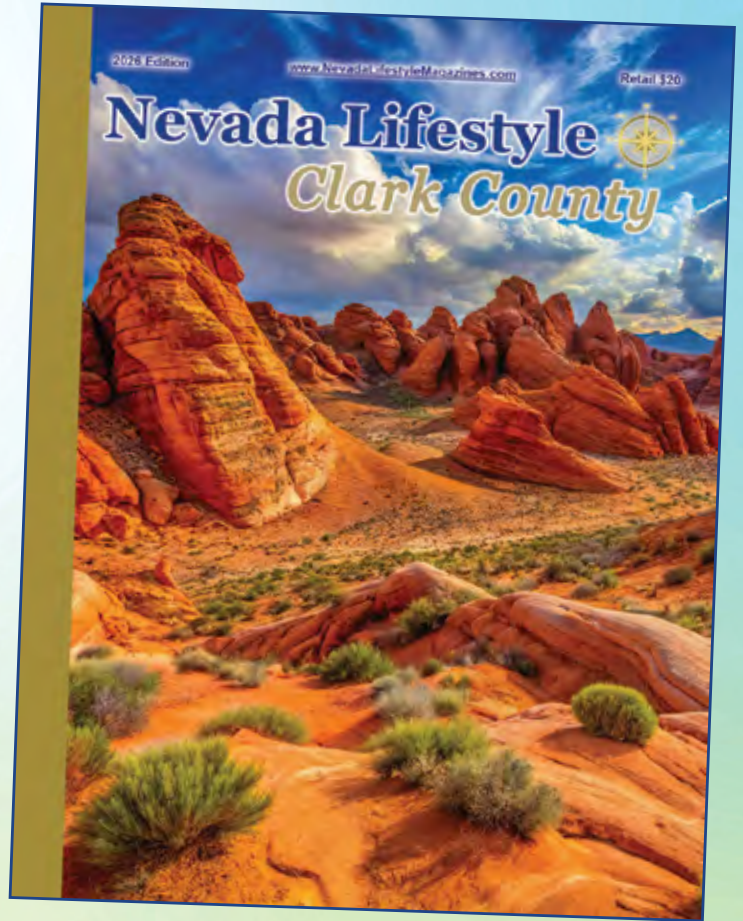

BOULDER CITY - CLARK COUNTY, NV

Boulder City, Nevada is a small city located about 30 miles southeast of Las Vegas. Despite its modest size, Boulder City has a rich and interesting history that dates back to the early 20th century. From its humble beginnings as a construction camp to its development into a thriving community, Boulder City has experienced many changes over the years.

Boulder City has unique origins compared to other cities in the United States. The city was actually created as a direct result of the construction of the Hoover Dam. In the early 1930s, the federal government decided to build a massive dam on the Colorado River to provide electricity and prevent flooding in the surrounding areas. This project required a large number of workers, and a location needed to be chosen for their housing.

The Hoover Dam: A Monument to American Ingenuity and Perseverance



The Hoover Dam, a colossal concrete arch-gravity dam straddling the Colorado River on the border between Nevada and Arizona, stands as a potent symbol of American ingenuity, ambition, and ultimately, perseverance in the face of adversity. Its construction during the height of the Great Depression not only provided much-needed jobs but also tamed a wild river, delivering vital water and power to the arid landscapes of the Southwest.

The story of the Hoover Dam begins long before its physical construction. For decades, the untamed Colorado River was known for its unpredictable floods and droughts, posing constant threats to agricultural communities downstream. The idea of harnessing its power and controlling its flow gained traction in the early 20th century, culminating in the Boulder Canyon Project Act of 1928, authorizing the construction of the dam.

Selecting the site was a challenge. After careful consideration, Black Canyon, a deep gorge carved by the Colorado River, was chosen for its narrow width

and solid rock foundation, ideal for supporting the immense weight of the structure. The project was awarded to a consortium known as Six Companies, Inc., a coalition of experienced construction firms led by Frank Crowe, a pioneer in concrete dam building.

Construction began in 1931 and was a feat of engineering unlike anything seen before. The first task was to divert the mighty Colorado River. This was achieved by drilling four 50-foot diameter tunnels through the canyon walls, diverting the river around the construction site. These tunnels, now tourist attractions themselves, provide a glimpse into the scale of the project and the challenges faced by the workers.

The dam itself was built using a revolutionary method. Rather than pouring the concrete in one massive block, it was poured in interlocking columns, allowing the concrete to cool and shrink evenly, preventing cracking and ensuring its structural integrity. Millions of cubic yards of concrete were used, enough to pave a two-lane highway from Seattle to New York City.



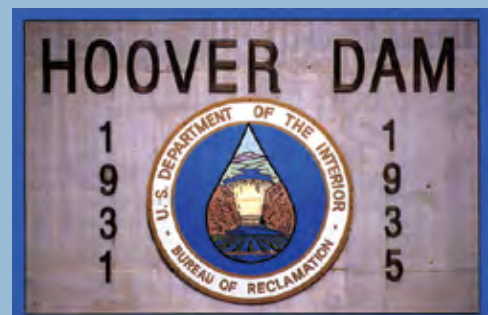
Life for the thousands of workers involved in the project was arduous and dangerous. The extreme heat of the Nevadan desert, coupled with the precarious working conditions, took a heavy toll. Despite the official death toll of 96 (a figure disputed by some who believe it was significantly higher), the dedication and resilience of these men and women are undeniable. They built homes, schools, and a sense of community in the harsh desert landscape, transforming the barren area into a bustling hub of activity.

Completed in 1936, two years ahead of schedule, the Hoover Dam was an immediate success. It tamed the Colorado River, creating Lake Mead, the largest reservoir in the United States at the time. The dam provided flood control, irrigation water for agriculture, and generated hydroelectric power for homes and industries across the Southwest.

The Hoover Dam continues to serve its vital purpose today, providing essential resources to millions. More than just a source of water and power, it stands as

a testament to the power of human ingenuity and collaborative effort. A marvel of engineering, a symbol of overcoming adversity, and a window into a pivotal moment in American history, the Hoover Dam remains a must-see destination and a powerful reminder of what we can achieve when we dare to dream big.

“SNOWSHOE” THOMPSON – THE MAILMAN OF THE SIERRA

“Good Luck Snowshoe Thompson!” was the cry as John A. Thompson left Hangtown (or Placerville as it was officially known) that cold winter day in 1856 on homemade snowshoes (skis as we call them today). True to the American West, no person of notoriety lasted very long without having a nickname bestowed upon them. So it was upon this day, the man who would save the Town of Genoa 75 miles away in Utah Territory, was so christened.

Jon Torsteinson-Rue was born in Tinn, Telemark, Norway on a mountainside farm on April 20th of 1827. At the age of 10, he left his homeland with his mother Gro and sailed for America. Later John A. Thompson, as he was now known, longed for the tall pines that reminded him of his birthplace. He eventually followed the California Gold Rush of 1849 and settled at Putah Creek, near Placerville, California.

When his attempts at gold mining failed, he settled into farming and did what came naturally to him. But in the early winter of 1856, when the small town of Genoa located at the base of the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevada, was isolated by the worst winter snows yet seen, the local newspaper featured an ad imploring anyone who had the ability to apply themselves to delivering mail and articles to the tiny Carson Valley community.

In the 20 years that he carried these articles which sometimes weighed as much as 100lbs in the pack upon his back twice a month during the winter, he experienced several adventures that would challenge the heartiest of men. He rescued no less than 3 men on two separate occasions, trapped by winter conditions and who had given up all hope of seeing their loved ones again. Taking three days to reach the Town of Genoa from Placerville and only two days upon return, he was never lost while often traveling at night.

Thompson was a man of his community. He eventually purchased land in Diamond Valley, California at the south end of Carson Valley, Nevada. He helped to design and install many of the irrigation systems throughout the adjoining valleys which are still in use today. He married Genoa resident Agnes Singleton in 1866 and together they had one child, a son Arthur, who was born in 1867 and passed away at the age of 11 in 1878 of diphtheria.

John A. Thompson is reported to have successfully worked a gold mine somewhere above Carson Valley which remains lost to this day. He was involved in the local Genoa community and was even the first person to sign up with the Genoa Rangers during the Pyramid Lake Paiute Uprising of 1860 which ended with more than 75 Rangers dead, Thompson being one of the few survivors. Ironically Snowshoe Thompson was never paid by the U.S. Government for carrying the government mail. While he



was paid privately by individuals, he never formally signed a government contract.

In the early winter of 1872 he traveled to Washington D.C. to plead his case with a sum of what he felt he was owed. The U.S. Government declined to pay him compensation and he returned to his Diamond Valley ranch disappointed. On a mid-May afternoon in 1876 after feeling unwell while working his ranch, Thompson retired to his bed to take a rest before his dinnertime meal. He never left his bed again, passing away a few days later on May 17th from the effects of what was later understood to be appendicitis.

His many contributions and his standing in his community led to a grand funeral which was held at the County Courthouse in Genoa on May 19th. He was laid to rest one-half mile north of town in what is now the Genoa Cemetery. In 1960 the Norwegian Olympic Ski team visited his grave, laying upon it a wreath of recognition. Today Snowshoe Thompson is honored from Placerville to Genoa and beyond, as a pioneer, innovator and beloved citizen of these communities.

Friends of Snowshoe Thompson works to promote and foster the memory of John “Snowshoe” Thompson through events and activities, and to maintain the statue and planter in the Mormon Station State Park.

Exploring the Fiery Beauty of Nevada's Valley of Fire

Located in the arid landscape of Clark County, Nevada, lies a geological wonder that ignites the imagination: the Valley of Fire State Park. Speaking of petroglyphs, Valley of Fire boasts an abundance of these ancient rock carvings, offering a glimpse into the lives and beliefs of the early inhabitants of the region. These intricate symbols, etched into the sandstone by the Ancestral Puebloans, depict animals, hunting scenes, and abstract designs, providing valuable insights into their culture and connection to the land. Keep an eye out for these historical treasures as you explore – respecting their delicate beauty and preserving them for future generations.



While the vibrant rock formations are the main attraction, Valley of Fire also supports a surprising array of desert flora and fauna. Hardy desert plants like creosote bush, brittlebush, and various cacti thrive in the harsh environment, adding pops of green and yellow to the landscape. Keep an eye out for wildlife such as desert bighorn sheep, coyotes, lizards, and various bird species that call the park home.

Planning a trip to Valley of Fire requires some consideration. The best time to visit is during the cooler months, from October to April, as summer temperatures can be scorching. Be sure to bring plenty of water, sunscreen, and a hat, and wear sturdy shoes for hiking. Camping is permitted in designated campgrounds, allowing you to fully immerse yourself in the park's serene beauty under a canopy of stars.

On November 22, 2025, the introduction of a brand-new, \$30 million visitor center opened and the park is poised to enter a new era of exploration and discovery. This state-

of-the-art facility will provide visitors with a wealth of information and resources, enhancing their overall experience and deepening their connection to this incredible natural wonder.

Valley of Fire State Park is more than just a scenic destination; it's a testament to the power of nature and the enduring legacy of the past.
