Youngest Prophets	Jeremiah (called young, Jeremiah 1:6)	Jeremiah was called as a youth, showing God uses all ages.
	Samuel (not in your list but notable)	Traditionally called young as well.
	Jonah (likely younger due to impulsive nature)	Jonah's story suggests youthfulness and rebellion.
	Zechariah (possibly younger at calling)	Ministered post-exile, likely young.
	Hosea (possibly younger)	Early ministry before exile.
Oldest Prophets	Isaiah (ministered over decades)	Long prophetic ministry spanning multiple kings.
	Ezekiel (older age during exile)	Ministered during exile, possibly older when called.

Category	Prophets	Notes
Northern Kingdom Prophets	Hosea, Amos, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Obadiah	Ministered primarily to Israel (Northern Kingdom) before its fall (722 BC).
Southern Kingdom Prophets	Isaiah, Jeremiah, Joel, Habakkuk, Zephaniah	Ministered primarily to Judah (Southern Kingdom) before and during exile.
Prophets to Foreign Nations	Jonah (Nineveh), Obadiah (Edom), Nahum (Nineveh)	Sent or focused on nations outside Israel/Judah, often calling them to repentance or judgment.
Called in Youth	Samuel (not in Major/Minor list, but notable), Jeremiah, Daniel, possibly Hosea	Early calling often involved strong obedience despite youth.
Called Later in Life	Zechariah, Haggai, Ezekiel	Ministry began likely in maturity or older age, often during/post-exile periods.

The Major & Minor Prophets

1. The Call of the Prophet

Theme: God's initiation of relationship with His messengers, revealing His authority and purpose.

Key Passages:

- Isaiah 6 Isaiah's vision of God's glory
- **Jeremiah 1** Called before birth
- **Ezekiel 1–3** Commissioning with divine visions
- Amos 7:14–15 Amos called from shepherding
- Jonah 1:1-3 Jonah flees from God's call

Study Focus: God chooses, equips, and sometimes disciplines His prophets to align with His holy purposes.

2. Covenant Warnings and National Sin

Theme: Repeated warnings to Israel and Judah (and sometimes Gentile nations) to return to covenant faithfulness.

- Isaiah 1-5 Rebellion and social injustice
- Jeremiah 2-6 Idolatry and covenant breaking
- **Micah 1–3** Corruption among leaders
- **Hosea 4–7** Spiritual adultery
- **Zephaniah 1** The Day of the Lord for Judah
- Nahum 1–3 Judgment against Nineveh

Study Focus: God is both just and patient, warning nations repeatedly before bringing judgment.

3. Judgment and the Day of the Lord

Theme: Prophetic warnings of imminent judgment and future reckoning, often described as the "Day of the Lord."

Key Passages:

- Ezekiel 7 The end has come
- **Joel 1–3** The Day of the Lord and restoration
- **Obadiah** Edom's fall and the Lord's Day
- **Zephaniah 1–3** A day of wrath and ultimate hope
- **Daniel 7–8** Apocalyptic judgment and eternal kingdom

Study Focus: God's justice will ultimately be revealed in history and eternity. Sin has consequences.

4. Foreign Nations and Global Justice

Theme: God's sovereignty extends over all nations, not just Israel.

- Isaiah 13–23 Oracles against Babylon, Assyria, Moab, Egypt, etc.
- Jeremiah 46–51 Judgment against Egypt, Philistia, Moab, and Babylon
- Ezekiel 25–32 Judgment on neighboring nations
- Nahum God's judgment against Nineveh
- Jonah God's mercy for Gentile repentance
- Study Focus: God's justice is not partial—He judges all nations and offers mercy to all who repent.

5. God's Holiness and Presence

Theme: Visions of God's glory, purity, and desire to dwell among His people.

Key Passages:

- Isaiah 6 The holiness of God
- **Ezekiel 1 & 43** Glory departing and returning to the temple
- Habakkuk 2:14, 3:3–4 God's glory fills the earth
- Daniel 10 Glorious being and spiritual warfare

Study Focus: God is utterly holy and powerful, yet seeks relationship with His people.

6. Messianic Hope and Redemption

Theme: Prophecies pointing to the coming of Jesus Christ and the hope of redemption.

Key Passages:

- Isaiah 7:14; 9:6–7; 53 The virgin birth and suffering servant
- **Jeremiah 23:5–6** The Righteous Branch
- Micah 5:2 Birthplace of the Messiah
- Zechariah 9:9; 12:10; 13:1 The humble king and pierced one
- Daniel 7:13–14 The Son of Man receives eternal dominion

Study Focus: The prophets foretold Jesus' birth, ministry, suffering, and reign. These promises unify Scripture.

7. Spiritual Adultery and God's Jealous Love

Theme: God's faithful love contrasted with Israel's unfaithfulness.

- Hosea 1–3 God's covenant love dramatized
- Jeremiah 3 The unfaithful bride
- Ezekiel 16 & 23 Graphic portrayal of Israel's betrayal
- Study Focus: God is a jealous yet merciful husband who longs for restoration with His people.

8. Repentance and Restoration

Theme: The call to return to God and the promise of healing and hope.

Key Passages:

- **Isaiah 40–66** Comfort and future glory
- Jeremiah 31 The New Covenant
- Ezekiel 36–37 New heart and breath to dry bones
- **Joel 2** "Return to Me with all your heart"
- **Zechariah 8** Restoration of Jerusalem
- Malachi 4:2 "The sun of righteousness will rise with healing"
- Study Focus: God longs to restore, renew, and redeem—even after judgment.

9. Apocalyptic Visions and the End Times

Theme: Symbolic, visionary language about God's ultimate victory and eternal reign.

- Daniel 2, 7–12 Prophetic dreams of world empires and end times
- **Zechariah 12–14** Final battle and new Jerusalem
- Ezekiel 38–39 Gog and Magog

• Isaiah 65–66 – New heavens and new earth

Study Focus: God holds the future. His kingdom is coming, and He will make all things new.

10. Personal Integrity and Prophetic Suffering

Theme: The personal struggles of prophets who spoke unpopular truths.

Key Passages:

- **Jeremiah 20** The cost of speaking truth
- Ezekiel 24 Ezekiel loses his wife as a prophetic sign
- Habakkuk 1–3 Wrestling with God's plan
- **Jonah 4** Struggles with God's mercy

Study Focus: Faithful ministry requires obedience, even in pain or rejection.

1. Prophecies Foretelling the Divine Messiah

OT predictions that point to a divine, eternal Savior.

- Isaiah 7:14 "A virgin shall conceive... Immanuel (God with us)"
- Micah 5:2 "Whose origins are from of old, from everlasting"
- Isaiah 9:6 "Mighty God, Everlasting Father..."
- Daniel 7:13–14 "Son of Man" receives eternal dominion
- Psalm 2, Psalm 110 The Son is enthroned and worshipped
 Theme: The Messiah would not merely be human—He is eternal and divine.

2. Jesus' Own Claims to Divinity

- John 8:58 "Before Abraham was, I AM"
- John 10:30–33 "I and the Father are one"
- John 14:9 "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father"
- Mark 14:61–62 "You will see the Son of Man... coming with the clouds"
- Matthew 28:18–20 "All authority in heaven and earth has been given to me"
- **Theme**: Jesus claimed not only to represent God—but to be God.

3. Titles and Names Reserved for God

- Immanuel (Matt. 1:23) "God with us"
- Alpha and Omega (Rev. 22:13; cf. Isaiah 44:6)
- The Word (John 1:1) "The Word was God"

Daniel

Had visions of the "Son of Man" coming with Daniel 7:13–14; affirmed by Jesus in the clouds—this is a prophetic vision of Jesus.

Matthew 26:64

Additional Notes:

Moses and Elijah, though not classified among the writing prophets (like Isaiah or Jeremiah), did meet Jesus in person during His transfiguration (see Matthew 17:1-3). Elijah is considered a prophet, and Moses a prophet and lawgiver.

"And behold, there appeared to them Moses and Elijah, talking with him [Jesus]." — Matthew 17:3 (ESV)

Many prophets (Isaiah, Micah, Zechariah, etc.) clearly foretold Jesus' birth, mission, death, and resurrection. Though they never met Him, their prophecies were fulfilled in Him.
