#### January to June 2022



Since 1960, the Ceylon Fellowship of Service Prithipura Home has flourished in tranquil surroundings on four acres of land in the coastal town of Wattala.

The Ceylon Fellowship of Service Prithipura Home was inaugurated in 1962. Under the guidance and dedication of Bikkhu Sumana, the Home initially began as a boys' home. There were three huts with cemented floors, wooden walls and thatch roofs. It had four residents with a few house mothers to care for them.

Today there are 60 residents housed in six cottages on the premises, giving the feeling of an extended family unit. Four cottages - Norad, Canada, Jayewardene and Rosy - house male residents while the females live in Bates and Prithi. Our staff numbers nine house mothers, two kitchen staff, a matron, an office manager, an administration officer, a gate keeper, a gardener and a driver.

Our mission is to care for the residents in a community environment that enables them to live life to the fullest. We offer a safe place for the well-being and rehabilitation of the residents who need special care and attention due to mental, physical, social or economic reasons. At the Home, residents are encouraged to develop their own personalities and identities.

### Rising Prices and Fuel Shortages Impact Home

The CFS Prithipura Home is facing trying times as Sri Lanka's dire economic situation continues to worsen. Donations in cash and kind have dropped dramatically just as costs of food and other goods have risen to alarming levels while many people struggle just to manage their day to day lives.

We have had some generous donations for food and medicines that have helped to tide us over but as costs keep rising, with some basic goods even tripling in price, the strain on our resources is considerable. The residents and staff are doing their bit by growing vegetables, fruits and medicinal plants as well as making bags, cards, pot holders and dusters for sale. However, due to Covid previously and now shortages of fuel, visitors are not coming to the home.

In addition to costs of meals, maintenance and repairs, most residents need regular medicines to keep them healthy; these too have shot up in price. The ones in poor health need frequent visits to the clinic or the hospital and sometimes require carers to stay with them.

We charge Rs. 33,000 for a day's meals – breakfast, lunch, tea and dinner – for our residents and staff. The individual rates are as follows: breakfast Rs 7,000, lunch Rs. 15,000, tea Rs. 5,000 and dinner Rs. 10,000.

Our six cottages need urgent upgrading and refurbishment. The toilets are in disrepair. Renovating one toilet will cost around Rs. 900,000. Annual maintenance of one cottage is about Rs. 120,000 while upgrading one cottage dormitory is about Rs. 500,000.

### January to June at the Home

January: Residents and staff began preparing vegetable gardens on the premises. Renovation began on bathrooms in Bates

Cottage.

February: Students from Cinec Campus cleaned and painted the outside parapet wall. They brought dry rations,

stationary, sweets and toys.

Owner of Tashma International visited the home bringing dry rations, pampers, sweets and fruit.

The booster vaccine was given to staff and residents over the age of 18.

**March:** The drainage pits around the home were cleaned.

Vegetables and yams such as green chilles, manioc, ladies fingers and long beans were planted in prepared beds.

April: Sinhala and Tamil New Year was celebrated with the generous help of Inner Wheel Club of Wattala, which

provided food, drink and gifts for staff and residents. It was an enjoyable day for all who participated with songs

and dances performed by residents and staff.

A wood burning oven was constructed for cooking due to the scarcity of gas.

Bags, dusters, oven gloves, pickles and chutney made by residents and cupcakes, sheets, towels and T shirts

donated to the Home were sold at the Good Market before the New Year holidays.

May: Upon the advice of Agriculture Professor Jayasekera, the ground was prepared with raised beds and natural drains

to plant vegetables in waterlogged parts of the garden.

**June:** There were no special activities in June.

### **Upgrading and Maintenance**

The bathrooms at Bates Cottage were completely renovated with news tiles and fittings with generous donations from Sarinda Unamboowe, Cherine Chandrasoma, Rohitha Peiris, Georgina and Margaret from Australia, Duncan Watts from the US, K. Srikantha, Arundathi Kurukulasuriya, Ruwani Jayewardene, Anoja Karunaratne, Ramani Joshua, Renuka Yoganathan and Lieneke from Holland. The drainage pits around the home were repaired and cleaned with help from the Wattala Municipal Council, which sent three labourers and a backhoe.
