

LGBTQ+/GENDER & REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE NEWSLETTER



June 24 marked the third anniversary of Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, the Supreme Court decision overturning Roe v. Wade and the constitutional right to abortion. It marked the first time in history that the Supreme Court took away a fundamental right. The Dobbs decision meant the right to abortion would be up to individual states. Currently, 13 states have total abortion bans, with very few exceptions. Twenty-eight additional states ban abortion somewhere between six weeks and "viability," according to a new report from the

Guttmacher Institute and the State Innovation Exchange. In the first six months of this year alone, 14 states have proposed legislation that would criminalize the sale, purchase, or distribution of medication abortion pills. And ten bills were also introduced bills to reclassify medication abortion drugs as controlled substances. FIRST THEY CAME FOR THE T, THEN THEY CAME FOR THE B AT THE STONEWALL MONUMENTS

The Federal Government contines it's march towards erasing queer folk from the history books. In February 2025 the National Parks Service remove the T from the LGBTQ acronym, erasing the pivotal role of trans women Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera from founding the Pride movement as it exists today. However, that was only the first step in the erasure of queer identities. As recently as May of this year there were still references to bisexual people. "Before the 1960s, almost everything about living openly as a lesbian, gay, bisexual (LGB) person was illegal. The Stonewall Uprising on June 28, 1969 is a milestone in the quest for LGB civil rights and provided momentum for a movement." That section has now been updated to remove any reference to bisexuals. Only two letters left y'all!





In the 1930s there was widespread dissatisfaction with Unitarian Sunday school programs and Fah's ideas were seen as a way forward. Starting in 1937, Fahs helped lead a Unitarian religious education revival. For more than 80 years as a professional educator, practical theologian, and author, Fahs strove to create a theology that restored human emotions and human experience to their rightful place as foundational building blocks for an enlightened liberal faith.
