
Our fall season has started off with a very busy month...

The Meyers Spring Apache Crown Dancer Pictograph

September 5 -7 was a very busy weekend for us. We hosted the leaders of the Lipan Apache Band of Texas into Meyers Spring Ranch to view the pictographs, especially the Apache Crown Dancer pictograph. We had a special evening ceremony at the pictographs on Friday, and then hosted the Witte Museum Rock Art Foundation on Saturday. We even had some of our Apache friends working with us on Friday afternoon at one of the outlying military sites. I'm proud that they all became members of WTAS. From their education of their symbolic heritage I have added a bit more information on another pictograph near the Crown Dancer that ties them directly to this wall and that depiction. Seminole Days 2024

Tom Ashmore returned to Brackettville to speak at Seminole Days on September 21st. This was the third year in a row for the talk on our archeological revelations on the Black Seminole Indian Scout's life at Camp Meyers Spring. Each year has been an update of our continuing work for the year. There has been so much to learn at this location that we can give updates each year. This year we were able to present a few artifacts from Meyers Spring Ranch owner and WTAS member, Thad Steele, to the Seminole Indian Scout Cemetery Association (SISCA) Museum, there in Brackettville. The artifacts are a dropped and intact Spencer Carbine 56-50 cartridge and a Civil War surplus military coat button. These were found in an area that we know only Scouts were working. The Scouts were issued the Spencer carbines, whereas the cavalry they were scouting for at the time were issued the Sharps carbines.





Edwards Plateau Historical Association Annual Meeting

On September 21st C.A. Maedgen spoke to participants of the Edwards Plateau Historical Association annual meeting in Ballinger, TX. This is a return engagement for us. Last year we spoke about the Concho Mail Station; this year's topic was Butterfield Overland Mail's Grape Creek Station. C.A. and Tom Ashmore both worked the Grape Creek Station site for three months back in 2017. Of course, eight years of research went into finding the site. We published our work in a detailed 33-page report, which can be found on the WTAS website. We have already been asked to speak at the 2025 meeting that will take place in San Angelo.

Of the many artifacts we found at the mail station site, there were two specially prized that helped validate the site. One was a Spanish Mule shoe, found at the location of the corral. Spanish Mules were the only mules used by the Butterfield stagecoaches. The second was a piece of stoneware with a maker's mark, made by L.F. Field, Utica, N.Y., produced 1860 - 1870. The station was



active from 1858 to early 1861. This was a project where the research, satellite imagery interpretation, and artifacts all matched up perfectly.



C.A. Maedgen and Edwards Plateau Historical Association Annual Meeting Presenters

Concho Mail Station (41TG427)

On September 28th Tom Ashmore and C.A. Maedgen gave a tour of the Concho Mail Station site to a group of historical interpreters during a memorial march from Fort McKavett to Fort Concho. This was memorializing the 1874 march made before heading out on Red River War Campaign.


We gave a quick overview of the mail station compound in the parking area before heading in to the woods and up on the flat to show where a small detachment of infantry and cavalry troops from Forts McKavett and Concho camped between 1870 and 1873. This detachment was detailed for station protection and escort duty for the stagecoaches between the two forts. As with all our projects, you can find the entire report on our website.
