Emily Howe presented information about the Hunger Free Garden at the North Central Research Extension Center. It's located in the same area as the grape vines we toured last year. Interesting details included that Master Gardeners harvested 7,000 lbs. of food to donate to food banks, shelters, senior living centers, or other agencies. This year's produce included cucumbers, eggplants, pumpkins, and tomatoes. The garden is funded by gaming donation proceeds and pollinator garden plant sales. Seeds are started around April, with a final cleanup in October.

The next business meeting will be on September 11 at @6:30 with the Outside Fall Plant Auction.

(Note: The 6:30 meeting time was not changed during the August meeting. It was only changed later as a result of needing more time to address agenda items, have the auction, and provide refreshments. The new meeting time is highlighted below for the upcoming meeting.)

## Fresh Ideas for Making Herbs Last Longer

Fresh herbs of all kinds can turn bland dishes into culinary master-pieces, but the key word is "fresh"! All too often, herbs are allowed to wilt away in the fridge before they can work their magic, but that needn't be the case. A little preparation and some simple tips and tricks can rescue herbs from an untimely demise, getting shoppers more bang for their buck. From proper home care to clever storage techniques, here's how to keep those herbs fresh longer in the fridge and ensure their flavors can be savored.

#### How to keep herbs fresh longer in the fridge

Treat fresh herbs like fresh-cut flowers. Much like flowers, herbs are delicate, living plants that require proper care to ensure their vitality. This method works perfectly for leafy herbs including cilantro, mint, parsley and green onion.

To care for herbs:

- Use the bottom leaves on the stems first. Bottom leaves are usually the oldest and least vibrant, so using them first ensures diners can enjoy them at their peak flavor.
- Trim off half an inch from the bottom of the stem. This opens up the herb's vessels, allowing it to take in more water and nutrients, which can delay wilting.
- Store herbs in a small jar of fresh water. Only about an inch of the stems should be submerged.
- Cover the herbs with an empty produce bag or something similar to help retain water.
- Store herbs in the refrigerator.
- Replace the water every few days to keep the herbs fresher for longer.

## More Tips to keep herbs fresh longer

Some herbs require different methods of care to extend their freshness. Here are the proper methods of care and storage for different types of herbs.

- Woody Herbs (Thyme, Rosemary, Oregano, Sage): Wrap the herbs in a damp paper towel, place them inside a resealable plastic bag and store them in the refrigerator's vegetable drawer.
- Basil: Basil is sensitive to cold temperatures. Trim the stems and place them in a glass of water. Cover loosely with a plastic bag. Keep at room temperature away from direct sunlight.
- Chives: Place the chives inside a resealable plastic bag and store them in the refrigerator's vegetable drawer.
- Lemongrass: Trim the tips and wrap the stalks in a damp paper towel. Place them inside a resealable plastic bag and store them in the refrigerator's vegetable drawer.
