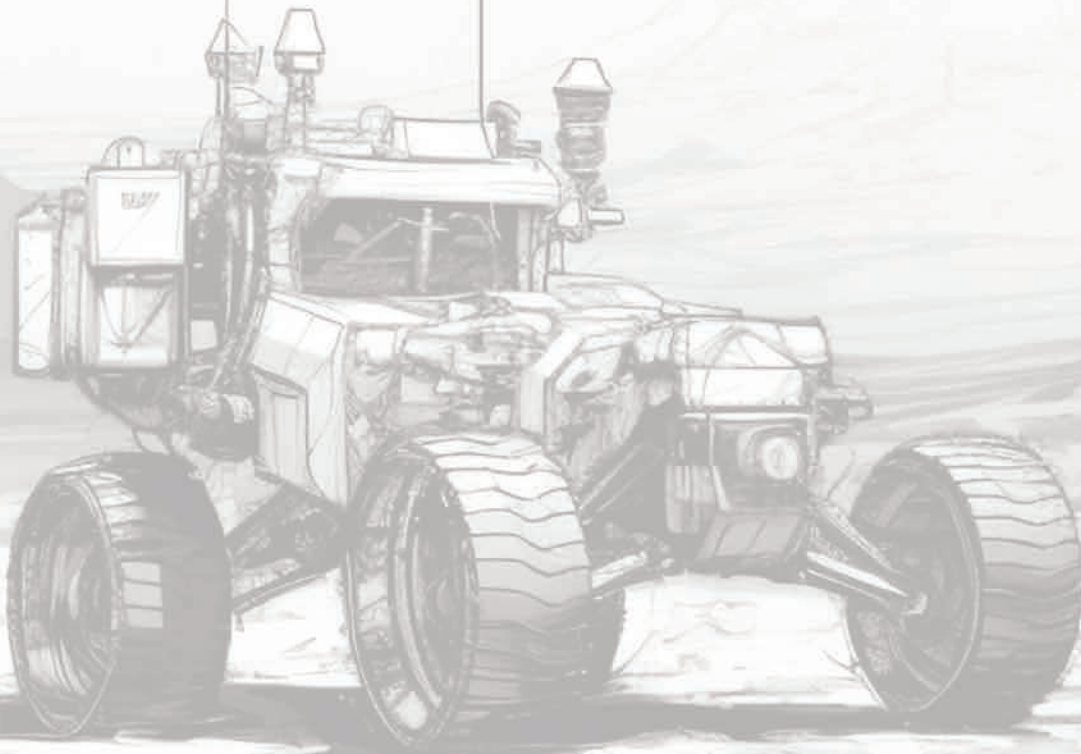

A low, steady sound humming in the air. What am I?

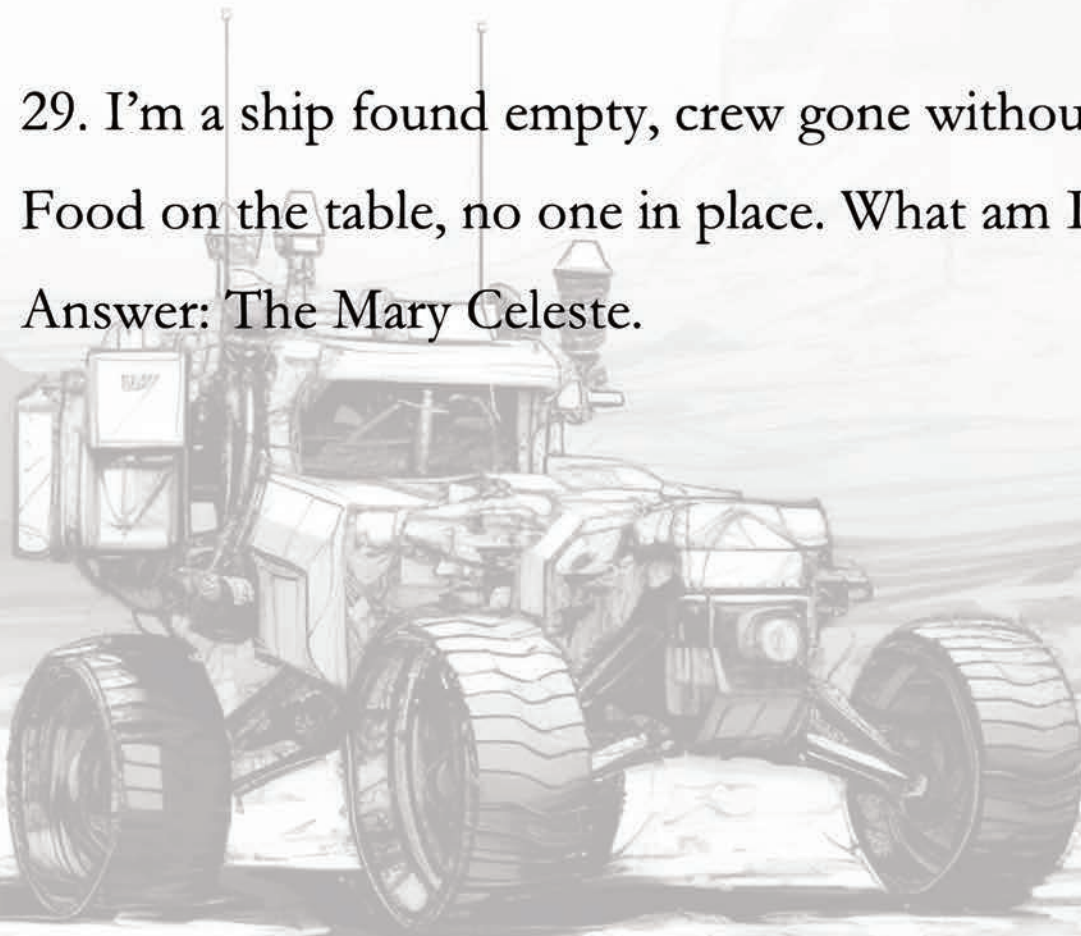
Answer: The Taos Hum (or a mysterious humming

But in computers I'm still a surprise. What am I?

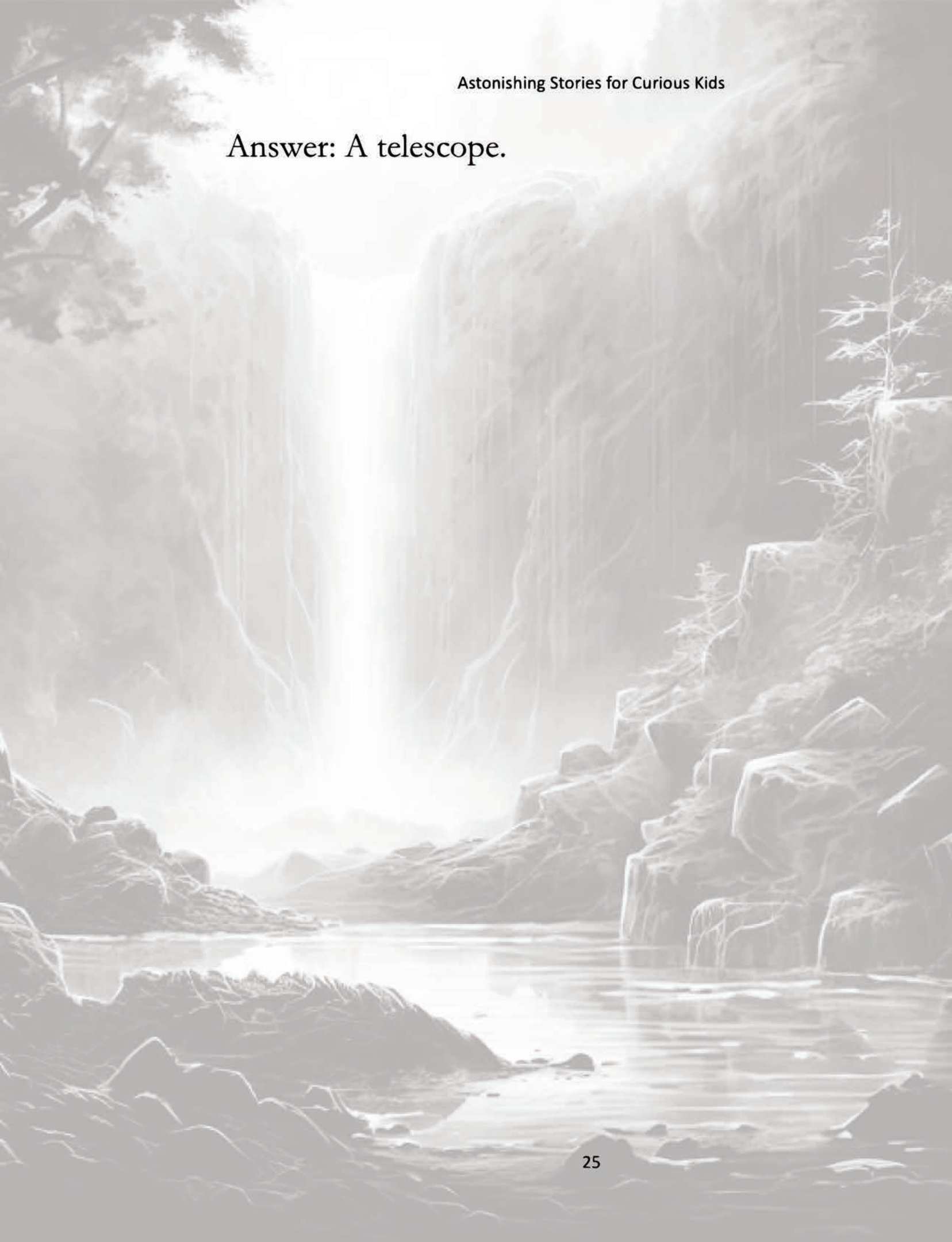
Answer: A computer "bug."

41. Every day, about 17 meteors hit Earth big enough to make it through the atmosphere.


42. The loudest sound ever recorded came from a volcano eruption in 1883—it was heard 3,000 miles away.
