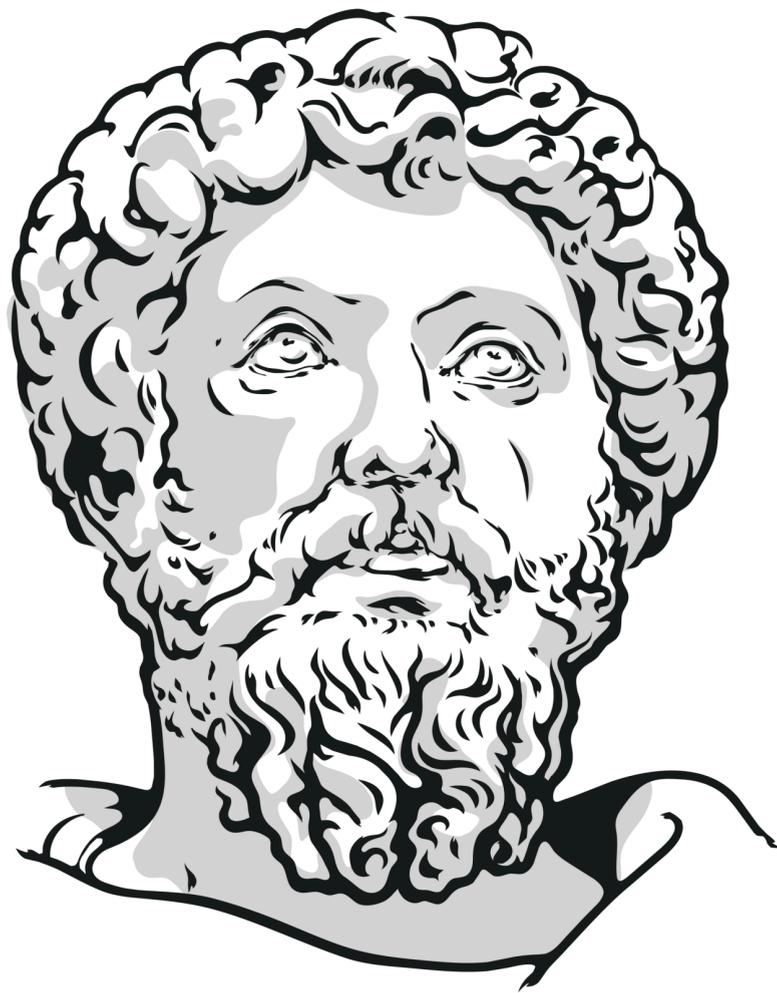

BOOK I

1. STRENGTH IN CALM My grandfather *Verus* taught me something invaluable, how to stay calm no matter what. He never let anger or frustration control him.

My mother showed me that kindness and generosity aren't just things you do, they're a way of thinking. She lived with faith, never entertained the idea of harming anyone, and taught me that a simple life is a good life. You don't need to chase fame, wealth, or empty status symbols.

True success is living in alignment with your values.

4. EDUCATION IS AN INVESTMENT

My great-grandfather drilled this into me: true education isn't about fancy schools; it's about how much effort you put into learning.

Knowledge isn't just about facts; it's about understanding life, people, and yourself. He made sure I understood that **learning is always worth the time, effort, and cost.**

5. AVOID POINTLESS DRAMA

A mentor of mine taught me not to waste my energy on petty rivalries, whether in politics, social circles, or even the digital noise of social media. He made me realize that getting caught up in meaningless arguments solves nothing. Instead, he encouraged me **to focus on what**

people were, he never lost his patience. And despite his brilliance, he never carried himself as if he was better than anyone else.

He taught me something most people never figure out, [the art of accepting help with gratitude, without feeling weak](#), and without ever taking kindness for granted.

9. WISDOM WITH GRACE

The philosopher Sextus taught me the value of good humor and grace. He showed me how a household could be run with care and wisdom. He urged me to live by the principles of nature and reason.

From him, I learned to carry myself with quiet dignity, to pay close attention to the moods and situations of those around me, and to offer help when needed. I saw how he handled ignorance with patience, treating everyone with kindness, making his conversations engaging rather than full of empty flattery.

Yet, despite his easygoing nature, he commanded deep respect. Through my interactions with him, I developed a clear and practical approach to life, never showing signs of anger or distress, staying calm yet compassionate.

He showed me that you don't need to be loud to be strong, that [true knowledge comes without arrogance or the need for show](#).

10. CORRECT OTHERS WITH GRACE

Alexander the Grammarian taught me not to nitpick or embarrass people for how they speak. Instead, he showed me a better way, [leading by example and offering corrections gently and subtly, through actions rather than harsh words](#).

11. THE DANGER OF DECEPTION

From Fronto, I learned a crucial truth: envy, deceit, and manipulation are the tools of tyrants. Those who crave power often lose their sense of duty to others. And those born into privilege frequently forget their responsibility to care for those less fortunate.

12. NO EXCUSES FOR NEGLECTING OTHERS Alexander the Platonist taught me a simple but powerful lesson: Never use being busy as an excuse to avoid helping someone, unless it's absolutely necessary. Priorities matter, but so does kindness.

A small act of help, a moment of attention, it can mean the world to someone else.

13. BE OPEN TO FEEDBACK

Catulus taught me a life-changing lesson: even harsh criticism from a friend can be a gift. It's not a reason to cut them off, it's a chance to help them become the best version of themselves again. Real friends grow through tough conversations.

He also showed me the importance of honoring those who've shaped me, mentors, teachers, family.

Gratitude isn't just a fleeting feeling; it's a mindset, a way of moving through life with purpose and connection.

14. THE MEANING OF TRUE LOYALTY

Severus opened my eyes to the depth of loyalty, not just to family or friends, but to higher ideals like justice and truth. He introduced me to the wisdom of powerful thinkers Cato, Brutus, Thrasea, Helvidius, and Dio and helped me understand what a just society looks like. A society where freedom of speech and fairness aren't distant dreams but everyday reality.

He taught me what leadership is really about. Whether in a republic or monarchy, the well-being of the people must always come first.

Leadership isn't about control or status, it's about serving something greater than yourself.

15. THE POWER OF SELF-CONTROL

My adoptive father embodied what true leadership should be calm, disciplined, and never swayed by power or ego. He taught me that a great leader is engaged, open to new ideas, and always working toward the greater good.

He was practical, he knew when to be firm and when to be flexible. He never played favorites, never demanded loyalty through force, and never let his status separate him from the people he led. He was a true friend, loyal without being overbearing, consistent without being clingy. He faced the future with optimism and handled responsibilities without stress or chaos.

By watching him, I learned how to navigate power without arrogance. He kept government finances strong, managed resources wisely, and ignored the criticism of those who didn't understand the long game. He respected traditions but never let them dictate his actions. He enjoyed the luxuries of his position without being attached to them, he was just as comfortable with or without wealth.

He never played politics, never put on a show to win favor, and never let public opinion sway his judgment. He despised flattery and surrounded himself only with people who spoke the truth, not those who told him what he wanted to hear.

He lived simply, he didn't obsess over food, clothes, or appearances. He wore what was practical, ate what was necessary, and never indulged in excess. He was consistent, disciplined, and never let physical discomfort distract him from his duties. Even when sick, he returned to work as soon as possible without complaint.

Above all, he never let himself be consumed by ambition or greed. He stayed focused on what truly mattered, leading with wisdom, serving with integrity, and living with purpose. His life reminded me of one of Socrates' greatest lessons:

True greatness isn't about what you own, it's about what you can live without. **And that's exactly how he lived.**

17. GRATITUDE FOR THE LIFE I'VE LIVED

I am deeply grateful for the people who shaped my life, my grandparents, parents, sister, teachers, friends, and even the people who worked in our household. Almost all of them were good, honest people. And somehow, I never found myself in a position where I was forced to betray their trust or act against them. Maybe I had the potential to, but fate never tested me that way.

I'm grateful that my childhood wasn't left in the wrong hands, that I was protected from harmful influences that could have led me astray. I was fortunate to be raised by my father, the emperor, a man who taught me that power doesn't require extravagance. He showed me that you can live in a palace without drowning in luxury, without needing symbols of status to prove your worth. He taught me that a true leader lives humbly, just like any other person, but still commands authority when it matters most.

I consider it a gift to have had *a brother* whose kindness and character enriched my life in every way. I was lucky that my children were born healthy and capable. I'm also grateful that I never became obsessed with empty pursuits, whether rhetoric, poetry, or other distractions. If I had excelled in them, maybe I would have lost myself chasing shallow praise.

I never had to beg for respect from my mentors, they gave it freely because they saw that I truly valued their wisdom. I never delayed my responsibilities with excuses about being "too young" or "not ready." I embraced my duty when it came. I had the privilege of learning from great men like Apollonius, Rusticus, and Maximus, who constantly reminded

me to live in harmony with nature. With such guidance, I had no excuse to lose my way, unless I chose to ignore the lessons life was teaching me.

I am grateful that my body held up under the weight of hard work and endless responsibility. That I never found myself in desperate financial need. That my wife has been loving, loyal, and free from vanity. That my children had good mentors to guide them. That even in times of illness, the right treatments found me, sometimes even in dreams, like the ointment that cured me at Cajeta.

And I am grateful that when I turned to philosophy, I didn't fall into the trap of hollow intellectualism. I never wasted time in pointless debates, never got lost in abstract theories about the universe. Instead, I focused on what truly matters, living with wisdom, integrity, and purpose.

These things didn't just happen by chance. Call it fate, call it divine guidance, but I know I didn't get here alone.
