

Allison Balls' Audits find Kentucky Gold with Missing and Mismanaged Money in Kentucky

Kentucky State Auditor Allison Ball has made one thing clear since taking office: taxpayers deserve to know where every dollar goes. Through a series of audits and special examinations, Ball's office has uncovered hundreds of millions—and now more than \$1 billion—in waste, financial reporting errors, and questionable government practices that demand accountability.

Among the most significant findings was a special examination of Kentucky's Medicaid program, which identified approximately \$800 million in unnecessary payments caused by duplicate Medicaid coverage across state lines. According to the audit, the

Department for Medicaid Services failed to investigate federal alerts that identified recipients receiving coverage in multiple states, resulting in years of avoidable payments. Ball called the findings a clear example of taxpayer dollars being wasted through bureaucratic negligence rather than benefiting Kentuckians who rely on Medicaid services.

Her office's annual Statewide Single Audit also uncovered more than \$1 billion in financial reporting errors across state government. The report found that Kentucky had underreported more than \$170 million in Medicaid expenditures, potentially putting federal funding at risk. It also revealed that approximately \$33 million in taxes had been overcharged to thousands of Kentucky taxpayers because of problems within the Department of Revenue's tax system.

Beyond the financial mistakes, the audits identified weaknesses in cybersecurity and oversight. Auditors found that Kentucky's tax system remained vulnerable after security testing showed hackers could penetrate it

within minutes. The reports also cited failures to protect sensitive personal information and identified weaknesses in the Transportation Cabinet's internal controls that contributed to driver's license fraud investigations.

Ball has argued that uncovering waste is not about politics but about protecting taxpayers and ensuring government agencies follow the law. She has repeatedly emphasized that her office's mission is to identify waste, fraud, and abuse before they become even more costly to Kentucky families. In testimony before Congress, Ball stated that her office has uncovered more than \$1 billion in waste, fraud,

and abuse within Kentucky's executive branch and advocated for stronger oversight, better data analysis, and the expanded use of technology to detect improper spending.

ensuring those dollars are spent properly remains one of the State Auditor's most important responsibilities.

Not everyone agrees with Ball's conclusions. Governor Andy Beshear's administration has disputed some of the auditor's findings while acknowledging and correcting others. State officials have stated that several issues identified in the audits have already been addressed and argue that Kentucky's overall financial management remains strong.

Regardless of the political debate, the audits have sparked renewed discussion about government accountability in Frankfort. Whether the issue involves Medicaid spending, tax collections, cybersecurity, or financial reporting, Ball's investigations have placed a spotlight on how public money is managed and reinforced the importance of independent oversight in state government.

For Kentucky taxpayers, the message is straightforward: every dollar matters, and
