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Chapter 1 How to Use This Glossary (and Why It Helps)

If you have ever sat in church, youth group, or a Bible study and thought, “Everyone else understands these words except me,” you are not alone. Christian conversations can sound like a different language: covenant, sanctification, Trinity, atonement. This book is here to translate that language into normal words you can actually use.

This is not a test. You do not need to memorize everything. You just need a way to understand what people mean, find the Bible connection, and know why it matters in your real week, not just on a Sunday.

WHAT THIS GLOSSARY IS

It is a friendly guide to big Christian words, written to feel clear, safe, and practical. Each term includes a one-liner definition, one key Bible verse, one teen-life example, one common confusion to avoid, a short “what Christians agree on” block, and one simple reason it matters this week.

WHAT THIS GLOSSARY IS NOT

It is not a debate manual, a “gotcha” list, or a pressure-filled checklist. It is not trying to make you sound impressive. It is trying to help you understand God better and talk about faith without feeling fake.

THREE WAYS TO USE THIS GLOSSARY

1. Quick scan

Use the one-liner definitions when you need fast clarity. If you are reading your Bible, listening to a message, or scrolling past a Christian post and a word pops up, look it up and read only the one-liner plus “In normal language.” That is enough for most days.

2. Deep read

Pick one section and go slow. Read the section intro, then read the ten term entries. After each entry, pause and answer one question in your own words: “What did I learn about God, about me, or about real life?”

Finish with the mini-quiz to see what stuck, not to grade yourself.

3. Heard-a-word-at-church

When someone uses a term you do not understand, do this:

Read the one-liner.

Read “Common confusion.”

Read “If someone asks you...” for that section.

That gives you a quick, calm answer and helps you avoid repeating a misunderstanding.

IF YOU FEEL NERVOUS ABOUT “GETTING IT WRONG”

It is okay to learn out loud. You are allowed to ask questions. You are allowed to say, “I am still figuring this out.” God is not embarrassed by your learning process.

Also, you do not need to force a term into every conversation. Sometimes the bravest faith is simple: “Jesus, help me.” This glossary is here for the moments when words could help you understand, pray, or speak with kindness and confidence.

SAY IT IN YOUR OWN WORDS

This practice is the fastest way to make a theology word feel like something you can actually use. Do not aim for perfect. Aim for true and simple.

1. Translate

Look at the one-liner and “In normal language.” Then write one sentence that begins with: “This word means...” Use your own vocabulary. Keep it under 15 words if you can.

2. Connect

Look at the key verse. Write one sentence that begins with: “I see this in the Bible when...” You can paraphrase the verse. You do not need to quote it.

3. Apply

Look at “Why it matters this week.” Write one sentence that begins with: “This matters to me because...” Make it specific to your life, like friendships, anxiety, family stress, school pressure, dating, social media, or choices you are facing.

EXAMPLE OF THE PRACTICE IN REAL LIFE

Imagine you hear the word “grace” and you feel unsure. Your three sentences might look like this:

“This word means God gives me kindness I did not earn.”

“I see this in the Bible when it says I am saved by grace, not by works.”

“This matters to me because I do not have to punish myself forever when I mess up.”

HOW TO USE THIS WITH YOUR MAIN THEOLOGY BOOK

When you see a word that slows you down, pause and look it up here. Then go back and keep reading. The goal is not to stop and study every detail. The goal is to keep moving with understanding.

A SIMPLE WEEKLY RHYTHM

- Choose one section per week.
- Read two terms a day for five days.
- Take the quiz on day six.
- On day seven, pick one word that helped you most and pray using it in normal language.

YOU DO NOT NEED TO BE AN EXPERT TO BELONG TO GOD

Faith is not about sounding smart. Faith is about trusting Jesus. Big words can be helpful tools, but they are not the point. The point is knowing God, receiving grace, becoming more free, and learning to love people well.

When you are ready, start with the chapter that matches your current questions. If you are feeling confused, start with Bible and Truth words. If you are feeling anxious about God, start with God and His Character words. If you are trying to understand what Jesus did for you, start with Jesus and Gospel words.

Chapter 2 Bible and Truth Words

Some Bible words sound intimidating, but they are meant to help you see God clearly and live wisely. This chapter makes the words simple, so you can read Scripture with confidence.

These definitions are tools for your week, for what you scroll, what you worry about, and what you call true.

Revelation (God makes Himself known)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God reveals Himself so you do not have to guess, through creation, Scripture, and most clearly through Jesus.

KEY VERSE: Romans 1:20

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A friend finally says what they mean, and the guessing ends.

COMMON CONFUSION: Revelation is not turning every feeling into a secret message.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God initiates, we respond.

WHY IT MATTERS: Return to what God has revealed, not to sign-hunting.

Inspiration (God-breathed Scripture)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God worked through human authors so Scripture teaches what He intends, faithfully and clearly.

KEY VERSE: 2 Timothy 3:16

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A coach speaks through a captain, and the message still counts.

COMMON CONFUSION: Inspiration is not a trance, and it is not fortune-telling.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Scripture is trustworthy because God stands behind it.

WHY IT MATTERS: Read expecting guidance, not just comfort.

Canon (the Bible's recognized books)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Canon is the set of books the church received as Scripture, the Bible's official library.

KEY VERSE: Luke 24:44

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: An official list is different from a random pile of related books.

COMMON CONFUSION: Canon is not "leaders cut books to control people."

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: The canon is authoritative for faith and life.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can ask better questions about “lost gospels.”

Authority (who gets the final say)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Authority is the right to define truth and goodness, and Christians treat Scripture as God’s authority.

KEY VERSE: Matthew 4:4

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: If you are lost, you want directions from someone who knows the way.

COMMON CONFUSION: Authority is not permission to be harsh or controlling.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God has final authority, and Scripture guides His people.

WHY IT MATTERS: When feelings clash with truth, choose a steady anchor.

Context (what surrounds a verse)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Context is the surrounding passage, plus who wrote it, to whom, and why, so you read it as intended.

KEY VERSE: 2 Timothy 2:15

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A screenshot can lie, but the full thread changes the story.

COMMON CONFUSION: Context is not a trick to dodge hard teachings.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Careful reading honors God and protects people.

WHY IT MATTERS: Context can calm fear and correct twisted quotes.

Genre (what kind of writing)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Genre is the type of writing, story, poetry, proverb, letter, prophecy, which shapes how you interpret it.

KEY VERSE: Psalm 119:105

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Lyrics and a contract both use words, but you read them differently.

COMMON CONFUSION: Genre does not mean “not true,” it means “true in this form.”

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God teaches through many forms of writing in Scripture.

WHY IT MATTERS: Ask “What genre is this?”

before you panic.

Wisdom (skill for real life)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Wisdom is living well with God in real situations, using truth, humility, and good judgment.

KEY VERSE: Proverbs 9:10

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You can know the rules and still choose the wrong people.

COMMON CONFUSION: Wisdom is not “whatever feels right today.”

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Wisdom grows through reverence for God, Scripture, and counsel.

WHY IT MATTERS: Wisdom helps you respond instead of react.

Discernment (testing what you hear)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Discernment is checking ideas and voices against God’s truth, especially what is almost true but still harmful.

KEY VERSE: 1 John 4:1

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A confident video can still be wrong, so you check the source and fruit.

COMMON CONFUSION: Discernment is not cynicism, it is careful love of truth.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians test teachings and hold on to what is good.

WHY IT MATTERS: It protects you from being shaped by your feed.

Conviction (loving correction)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Conviction is God exposing sin or patterns so you can repent and heal, leading toward hope and honesty.

KEY VERSE: John 16:8

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A real friend calls you back, not out.

COMMON CONFUSION: Conviction is not shame, shame pushes you into hiding.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God corrects because He loves and frees His people.

WHY IT MATTERS: Ask, “Is this leading me to Jesus, or to self-hate?”

Conscience (your inner moral alarm)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Conscience is your sense of right and wrong, and it needs shaping because it can be loud or quiet.

KEY VERSE: Romans 14:22–23

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You might feel guilty for healthy boundaries, or feel nothing after hurting someone.

COMMON CONFUSION: Conscience is not always correct, and it is not the Holy Spirit.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians seek a clear conscience and keep learning what is good.

WHY IT MATTERS: It helps you confess quickly and stop living for approval.

If Someone Asks You

“HOW DO YOU KNOW GOD IS REAL?”

I believe God has revealed Himself through creation, Scripture, and Jesus.

“WHO DECIDED THE BIBLE’S BOOKS?”

The church received the canon by recognizing the writings earliest Christians used as Scripture.

“IS THE BIBLE REALLY GOD’S WORD?”

Christians believe Scripture is inspired by God and trustworthy for guiding life.

“WHY DO YOU CARE ABOUT CONTEXT?”

Because one verse without context can be twisted and used to harm.

“HOW DO I TEST A MESSAGE?”

Compare it to Scripture, the character of Jesus, and the fruit it produces over time.

Chapter 3 God and His Character Words

When you know what God is like, you stop guessing what He thinks about you. These words help you see God as steady and personal, not a vibe you have to chase.

They also give you language for prayer. Instead of “I don’t know,” you can name what is true, and let that truth shape your week.

Trinity

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: One God, three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

KEY VERSE: Matthew 28:19

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Love is stronger when it is shared, not isolated. God has always been relational.

COMMON CONFUSION: The Trinity is not one God switching masks, and not three gods.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: One God in three Persons is core Christian belief.

WHY IT MATTERS: You are invited into God’s love, not a lonely universe.

Holiness

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God is perfectly good, pure, and set apart from all evil.

KEY VERSE: Isaiah 6:3

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Bright light shows what is on your face, but it can also help you clean it off.

COMMON CONFUSION: Holiness is not God being disgusted by you, it is God being truly good.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God is holy, and His love never contradicts His holiness.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can say no to harm, because God’s goodness is better.

Grace

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God’s kindness and help you did not earn, given through Jesus.

KEY VERSE: Ephesians 2:8

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You bombed something, but someone helps you fix it without humiliating you.

COMMON CONFUSION: Grace is not permission to stay the same, grace trains you to grow.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: We are saved by grace through faith, not by performance.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can confess fast, get up, and keep going.

Mercy

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God's compassion that withholds the punishment we deserve.

KEY VERSE: Lamentations 3:22–23

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A friend does not use your worst moment as gossip, she protects you.

COMMON CONFUSION: Mercy is not pretending wrong is fine, it is choosing a way back.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God is merciful, and His mercy is seen fully in Jesus.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can be gentle with weakness while still choosing what is right.

Justice

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God always does what is right, and He will make wrong things right.

KEY VERSE: Micah 6:8

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: That inner “this is not okay” feeling when someone is mistreated points to justice.

COMMON CONFUSION: Justice is not the opposite of love, it is love protecting what is good.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God is just, and He will judge evil with wisdom.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can care about fairness without becoming bitter.

Sovereignty

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God is King over all things, and nothing is outside His power.

KEY VERSE: Psalm 115:3

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: One grade or one friendship does not hold your whole future together.

COMMON CONFUSION: Sovereignty is not “you are a robot,” your choices still matter.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God reigns with goodness, and His purposes will stand.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can decide with courage instead of panic.

Providence

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God actively cares for, sustains, and guides His creation day by day.

KEY VERSE: Romans 8:28

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A closed door can redirect you toward something better than you planned.

COMMON CONFUSION: Providence is not “everything feels good,” it is “God is present and working.”

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God is involved, wise, and faithful in ordinary life.

WHY IT MATTERS: Look for God’s care in small moments, not only big miracles.

Omnipresent

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God is present everywhere, not limited by place or mood.

KEY VERSE: Psalm 139:7–10

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You can feel alone in a crowded hallway, but God is still near.

COMMON CONFUSION: God being everywhere does not mean everything is God.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God is truly near to His people in every place.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can pray honestly anywhere, even mid-stress.

Omniscient

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God knows everything, including what you cannot explain yet.

KEY VERSE: Psalm 147:5

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You feel misunderstood, but God sees the full story without misreading you.

COMMON CONFUSION: God’s knowledge does not erase your real choices.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God’s knowledge is complete, wise, and never mistaken.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can drop the act, God already knows and still loves you.

Covenant

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: A covenant is a committed promise relationship God makes with His people.

KEY VERSE: Jeremiah 31:33

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Real commitment shows up over time, not just in words. God does that perfectly.

COMMON CONFUSION: A covenant is not you proving yourself so God stays, God initiates and keeps His word.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God's promises are fulfilled in Jesus, and God is faithful.

WHY IT MATTERS: When you feel shaky, anchor in God's commitment, not your emotions.

If Someone Asks You

“Is God one person with three roles?”

No, Father, Son, and Spirit are real Persons, and God is still one.

“If God is holy, why would He want me?”

Because holiness is perfect goodness, and God's love moves toward you in Jesus.

“Grace or mercy, what's the difference?”

Mercy withholds what you deserve, grace gives what you do not deserve.

“Does sovereignty mean my choices do not matter?”

No, your choices matter, and God's rule means your life is not random.

“What is providence in real life?”

God's steady care and guidance in ordinary days, even when you cannot see the whole story.

Chapter 4 Jesus and Gospel Words

These words answer two big questions: Who is Jesus, and what did He do? They keep Christianity from shrinking into “be nice” or “try harder.” The gospel is news about a real rescue.

You do not have to master everything today. When you feel guilt, fear, or pressure to perform, grab one word, read its verse, and let it point you back to Jesus.

Incarnation (God the Son became fully human.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God came close by taking on real human life, while still being fully God. Jesus understands our weakness and has power to save.

KEY VERSE: John 1:14

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: A friend shows up in person when you are falling apart.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not God pretending. Jesus is truly human.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus is fully God and fully man.

WHY IT MATTERS: You are never praying to a distant God.

Messiah (The promised King and Rescuer.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: “Messiah” means the promised Savior God announced long before Jesus. Jesus is the King who rescues.

KEY VERSE: Luke 4:18

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You need rescue, not another checklist.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not a promise of an easy life.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus fulfills God’s promises.

WHY IT MATTERS: Faith becomes trust, not self-improvement.

Kingdom of God (God’s rule and renewal.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God’s Kingdom is where God is honored as King and His will is done. Jesus brought the Kingdom through truth, forgiveness, healing, and justice.

KEY VERSE: Mark 1:15

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Status games say “earn belonging.” Jesus says “come and be made new.”

COMMON CONFUSION: Not only heaven later. It starts now.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus is King now and forever.

WHY IT MATTERS: Live Jesus' way in small choices.

Gospel (The good news about Jesus.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Jesus lived for us, died for our sins, and rose again, offering forgiveness and new life by grace. It is not “try harder,” it is “come to Jesus.”

KEY VERSE: 1 Corinthians 15:3–4

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You think God likes you more on good days. The gospel says love came first.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not advice, it is news.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus' death and resurrection are central.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can confess without panic.

Atonement (Jesus dealt with sin at the cross.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Jesus made a way for reconciliation with God. He carried our sin and its consequences so we could be forgiven and brought near.

KEY VERSE: Isaiah 53:5

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You broke trust and cannot undo it, but real repair can begin.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not Jesus stopping an angry God. God planned rescue.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: The cross is God's saving love.

WHY IT MATTERS: You do not have to punish yourself forever.

Redemption (Bought back and set free.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Redemption means being rescued and given a new story. Jesus frees us from sin, shame, and fear, and restores what was lost.

KEY VERSE: Ephesians 1:7

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You feel stuck in a pattern, but freedom is possible.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not instant perfection. Growth can be a process.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus redeems and restores.

WHY IT MATTERS: Ask for help with hope.

Mediator (Jesus brings us to God.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: A mediator brings peace between two sides. Jesus connects us to God through His finished work, not our performance.

KEY VERSE: 1 Timothy 2:5

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You help two friends talk again, but Jesus heals deeper.

COMMON CONFUSION: You do not need extra “middle people.” Jesus is enough.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus is the unique mediator.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can pray directly, any time.

Resurrection (Jesus rose, and death is defeated.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Jesus truly rose from the dead. This is God’s victory over death and proof that Jesus is Lord.

KEY VERSE: Luke 24:6

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: When you think nothing can change, resurrection says new life is real.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not “His spirit lived on.” It is real rising.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus rose bodily.

WHY IT MATTERS: Hope is grounded, not wishful.

Ascension (Jesus reigns and still cares.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Jesus returned to the Father and reigns as King. He is in authority and intercedes for His people.

KEY VERSE: Acts 1:9–11

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Someone far away still shows up with real support.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not Jesus leaving and forgetting us.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Jesus reigns and will return.

WHY IT MATTERS: Your life is not random.

Lordship (Jesus leads your life.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Lordship means Jesus has the right to guide your choices. Faith is trusting Him enough to follow.

KEY VERSE: Romans 10:9

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You trust a coach, so you follow the plan.

COMMON CONFUSION: Not control like a puppet. It is love-led leadership.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians confess Jesus as Lord.

WHY IT MATTERS: Ask, “Jesus, what does love look like here?”

If Someone Asks You

“Is Jesus just a teacher?”

He is the Messiah, the promised Savior and King.

“What is the gospel in one line?”

Jesus died for our sins and rose again to bring forgiveness and new life.

“Why does the cross matter?”

Atonement means Jesus dealt with sin so we can be reconciled to God.

“Why ‘Kingdom of God’?”

Jesus is King, and His way brings truth, healing, and belonging.

“Can I talk to God directly?”

Yes, Jesus is the mediator, you can pray honestly anytime.

Chapter 5 Salvation and New Life Words

These words explain how God saves, not by handing out points, but by bringing you back to Himself through Jesus.

They also explain growth after you believe, what changes instantly, and what grows slowly, so you can breathe and keep going.

Salvation (God rescues you and brings you to real life.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God saves you from sin and death and brings you into life with Him, starting now and lasting forever.

KEY VERSE: Ephesians 2:8

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Someone stepped in when you were stuck, got you out, and stayed with you while you healed.

COMMON CONFUSION: Salvation is not only “later,” it is also new life with God today.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: We are saved by grace through Jesus, not by earning it.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can run to God after failure, not hide.

Repentance (Turning back to God, not just feeling bad.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: You name the wrong honestly and turn toward God’s way, trusting His help to change.

KEY VERSE: Acts 3:19

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You stop repeating the same apology and choose one concrete new step.

COMMON CONFUSION: Repentance is not shame, it is direction change.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: God invites repentance because He is good, not because He wants to crush you.

WHY IT MATTERS: It turns spirals into repair.

Faith (Trusting Jesus enough to follow Him.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Faith is trust in Jesus, not perfect certainty, and it moves you toward Him.

KEY VERSE: Hebrews 11:1

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You sit in a chair because you trust it will hold you.

COMMON CONFUSION: Faith is not forcing a feeling, it is choosing trust.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Faith receives what God gives, and it can grow.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can pray, “Help me trust You,” and mean it.

Justification (God declares you right with Him in Christ.)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: God forgives you and counts you right with Him because of Jesus, not because you performed well.

KEY VERSE: Romans 5:1

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: Your name is cleared, and you are no longer treated as “the guilty one.”

COMMON CONFUSION: Justification is not instant perfection, it is a new status.

Chapter 9 Hope and the Future Words

Hope is not pretending everything is fine. Hope is choosing to believe God is still good, still present, and still working, even when your feelings are loud and your situation is messy. It is the difference between, “I have to hold it all together,” and, “I can breathe because God is holding me.”

These words are about the future, but they also affect your Tuesday. They shape how you handle anxiety, disappointment, grief, and waiting. They help you talk honestly about hard things without falling into panic or numbness.

Hope (A steady confidence in God’s goodness and promises)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Hope is not wishing. It is trust that God’s story is bigger than your current chapter. You can feel scared or sad and still have hope, because hope is anchored in who God is, not in a perfect mood.

KEY VERSE: Romans 15:13

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You do not get the result you wanted, a tryout, a grade, a friendship, and your brain says, “This ruins everything.” Hope says, “This hurts, but it does not decide my whole future.”

WHY IT MATTERS: You can stop treating faith like a weekend activity and start seeing it as a daily relationship.

New Creation (God’s future world made whole and beautiful)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: New creation means God will not throw His world away. He will renew it. God will heal what sin broke, including bodies, relationships, and everything unjust.

KEY VERSE: Revelation 21:5

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You see so much brokenness online that you feel numb. New creation means brokenness is not the final headline. God is not done.

COMMON CONFUSION: New creation is not “we float away to a totally different place.” It is God renewing and restoring.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians believe God will make all things new. Evil and death will not last forever.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can care about what is broken without losing your mind, because you are not carrying the ending.

Heaven (Being with God after death, safe and joyful)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Heaven is being with God in a way that is fully safe and fully alive. It is not boring. It is not a cloud cartoon. It is real joy, real peace, and no separation from God.

KEY VERSE: Philippians 1:23

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: When someone dies, or you fear losing someone, your chest tightens. Heaven reminds you that death is not the end of your story in Jesus.

COMMON CONFUSION: Heaven is not the same as new creation. Heaven is the “with God” future, and the Bible also promises a renewed world.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians agree that those who belong to Jesus will be with Him after death. This is comfort, not fantasy.

WHY IT MATTERS: When fear shows up, you can pray honestly and ask God for peace that is deeper than your worst thoughts.

Judgment (God making everything right and exposing evil)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Judgment sounds scary because we picture harsh punishment. In the Bible, God’s judgment is also rescue. It is God saying, “Evil will not win, and what is hidden will be brought into the light.”

KEY VERSE: Romans 2:6

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You watch someone get away with cruelty, gossip, cheating, abuse, and it makes you furious or hopeless. Judgment means God sees, God cares, and God will deal with it.

COMMON CONFUSION: Judgment is not God losing His temper. It is God’s holy justice. It is also a warning to stop playing with sin.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians believe God will judge the world with perfect justice, and Jesus is the only safe place to stand.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can stop fantasizing about revenge. You can pursue truth and safety while trusting God with final justice.

Perseverance (Keeping faith through hard seasons)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Perseverance is staying with Jesus when life is confusing. It is not being strong all the time. It is continuing to return to God, even when you fall, even when you need help.

KEY VERSE: Hebrews 12:1–2

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You start reading the Bible, praying, or going to church, and then you miss a week and feel fake. Perseverance says, “Start again. You are not disqualified.”

COMMON CONFUSION: Perseverance is not pretending you are okay. It can include taking a break, asking for help, and building healthy routines.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians agree that God is faithful and He helps His people endure. Growth is often slow, but God does not quit.

WHY IT MATTERS: When you mess up, you can repent and rebuild instead of disappearing in shame.

Glory (God’s weighty beauty and goodness)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Glory is the “wow” of God, His beauty, power, and goodness that makes everything else feel small in comparison. God’s glory is not about Him being insecure. It is about reality being set in the right order.

KEY VERSE: 2 Corinthians 4:17

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You chase approval, likes, attention, and it never feels like enough. Glory reminds you there is something better than being noticed, knowing God and reflecting Him.

COMMON CONFUSION: Glory is not just bright light or a worship concert vibe. It is God’s real greatness, seen in His character and His ways.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians agree that God is glorious, and we were made to worship Him. One day we will see Him more clearly.

WHY IT MATTERS: When you are tempted to live for applause, you can re-center and ask, “What is actually worth my heart?”

Resurrection (future) (God raising believers to new life with renewed bodies)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Future resurrection means you do not get a forever soul and a disposable body. God cares about your whole self. One day, He will raise His people to a renewed, healed life.

KEY VERSE: 1 Corinthians 15:52

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You feel trapped in body insecurity, chronic stress, or pain. Resurrection says your body is not meaningless, and healing is part of God’s future.

COMMON CONFUSION: Resurrection is not reincarnation. It is God giving new, real life, with continuity and transformation.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians agree Jesus rose bodily and that His resurrection is the pattern and promise for His people.

WHY IT MATTERS: You can treat your body with dignity now, not perfection, dignity, because it matters to God.

Comfort (God's steady presence that strengthens you)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Comfort is not God making everything easy. It is God being with you and giving strength to keep going. Comfort can feel quiet, like steady ground under shaking feet.

KEY VERSE: 2 Corinthians 1:3–4

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You are overwhelmed and cannot explain why. Comfort is texting a trusted adult, praying one honest sentence, and letting God meet you in that moment.

COMMON CONFUSION: Comfort is not the same as numbness. Numbness shuts down; comfort strengthens and reconnects.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians agree God is near to the brokenhearted and gives real comfort through His Spirit and His people.

WHY IT MATTERS: When you are struggling, you can ask for support without shame and stop acting like pain makes you a problem.

Waiting (Living faithfully when answers take time)

IN NORMAL LANGUAGE: Waiting is the space between a promise and its fulfillment. It is hard because you cannot control it. In the Bible, waiting is not wasted, God shapes trust in the waiting.

KEY VERSE: Isaiah 40:31

TEEN-LIFE EXAMPLE: You are waiting for a friendship to heal, a family situation to change, a mental health season to ease, or clarity about your future. Waiting feels like being stuck.

COMMON CONFUSION: Waiting is not doing nothing. Waiting can include wise steps, boundaries, counseling, prayer, and honest conversations.

WHAT CHRISTIANS AGREE ON: Christians agree God's timing is wise, even when it is painful. He does not forget His people.

WHY IT MATTERS: Instead of obsessing over the timeline, you can choose one faithful action today and leave the results with God.
