Nuclear Plant Emergency Preparedness

In May 2017, PSEG, along with state and local emergency management agencies held their annual preparedness drill. In an effort to ensure all communities are prepared, these state and federally graded exercises occur each year. During this year's drill an erroneous message was distributed via the NJ Office of Emergency Management to the general public. While this message was inadvertently sent and there was not a true emergency, we felt this was a good time to review

what to do in an emergency.

1. Listen for 3 to 5 minutes for the emergency siren.

2. Turn on your radio to 97.3, the official station for the Emergency Alert System in NJ.

3. If children are in school do not go to school to pick them up. Children will be moved to a host school and can be picked up there.

4. If you have special needs, contact the Elsinboro Township OEM to be added to the list 935-2200.

5. Monitor the media for emergency information and prepare for possible protective measures, including evacuation, or shelter-in-place,

6. If asked to shelter in place stay in your home, close all doors and windows, turn off fans and air conditioners, and use the phone only for emergencies.

7. If asked to evacuate, do not hurry. You will have time to act. Place the NOTIFIED sign in a front window to notify emergency responders.

During the June Township meeting, the elected class members served as the honorary township committee.




Elsinboro Township received funding for the resurfacing of South Locust Avenue. The funding came in the form of two grants, which means the project will need to be completed in two phases. Phase 1 was completed at the southern end in the Spring.

The engineering for Phase 2 has now been complete and the project is out to bid. While the exact scope of the project is dependent on the contractor's bid, the engineers believe that Phase 2 will complete the remaining portion of South Locust Avenue.

We hope to have Phase 2 completed in the fall, weather permitting. As part of the contract, the contractor will provide information for those residents impacted prior to beginning work. If you have questions please contact the municipal clerk.

Trash Can Lids

Please remember to close your trash and recycle can lids when placing at the curb. Leaving them open can cause damage to the lid when they are picked up.

Branches

Branches are picked up monthly during bulk week. Don't forget to call the municipal clerk to have your pile added to the list. Piles should be no longer than 6 feet in length. Also, remember to not place these branches under power lines.
