Safety Excellence Award

In our first year as a member of the Joint Insurance Fund, Elsinboro Township has received the Safety Excellence Award. In order to qualify for safety incentive monies, a safety committee needs to meet at least four times a year, participate in regional and regulatory training programs, conduct periodic hazard inspection surveys and job site observations.

As a result of the award, Elsinboro will receive \$1,755, which can be spent on safety related items.

For the month of January residents were given the opportunity to participate in a township wide survey to evaluate existing services and provide feedback. Thank you to all who took the time to participate.

The results of the survey highlighted the views of those responding and also gave constructive feedback on areas needing improvement. The township committee has taken the

feedback provided and created action plans to address these areas.

The following ratings were collected as part of the survey. Please note, these ratings are on a scale of 1-4, with 1 being the lowest and 4 being the highest.

Clerks Office, 3.27
Tax Office, 3.09
Police Department, 3.05
Trash Collection, 3.00
Construction Office, 2.38
Planning Board, 2.32

Our goal is to improve upon these areas and have a follow up survey to evaluate our results at the end of 2012.

Recycling Change

After a public informational meeting held on January 16th, the township committee has agreed to change the recycling strategy for the township.

Trash is currently picked up by an automated truck, with the trash mechanically picked up and dumped, but recyclables are picked up traditionally, with a worker on the back of the trash truck manually picking up recyclables and dumping it into the truck.

The change will include each resident receiving a recycling can from the township that is the same as their current trash can, but a different color. This will allow an automated truck to pick up recycling. In changing the way recycling is picked up, the township will see a cost savings in future years.

The change will be further communicated, but is

expected to occur mid 2012

Mayors Book Club/ Read Across America

Elsinboro was one of eight towns selected in South Jersey to be a part of the Mayor's Book Club grant program.

Through the program, mayors are challenging first-graders to read books during a three-month period (February to May). Every child who reaches their goal will receive a book from NJLM this spring.

As an additional incentive, school districts where children read at least 1,000 books will receive \$1,000 to purchase books for first-graders. Mayor Elwell kicked off this program for our first graders. He also promised them a pizza party if they make the goal.

Preliminary reports say that the students are already close to the goal.
