## Municipal Alliance Community Assessment

Elsinboro Township has been fortunate to receive grant money annually to form the Elsinboro Municipal Alliance for the Prevention of Substance Abuse (MAPSA). The Elsinboro MAPSA is a community-focused group consisting of volunteers who want to educate the community about the dangers of alcohol, tobacco, and drug use and help with prevention.

MAPSA is directly responsible for several community programs, including: Trip to Cooper University Hospital's Scared Straight Program, MAPSA Awareness at Annual Community Day, After-school Games Club for Kindergarten through Third grade – Spring and Fall, One

week Summer Camp for grades Kindergarten through Fifth, National Night Out Activity, Senior Breakfast, and Community Movie Night.
