## Sustainable Jersey Grant

Sustainable Jersey

representatives announced that Elsinboro Township has been awarded a Sustainable Jersey Capacity-Building Grant. The \$2,000 grants are intended to assist community Green Teams as they lead and coordinate the sustainability activities of their community.

The 2013 Sustainable Jersey Small Grants Program funded by Walmart is providing \$380,000 in grants to local governments for sustainability projects.

A core element of the

Sustainable Jersey program is to direct funding and resources to municipalities to aid them in making progress. Currently, 70 percent of New Jersey's towns and cities (398 towns across all 21 counties) have registered to become Sustainable Jersey certified.

The grant funding will be used to implement several new community initiatives, which will be shared in the near future.

On Saturday, September 28<sup>th</sup>, community groups gathered to participate in the annual clean communities program in Elsinboro Township. The annual event is made possible through New Jersey Clean Communities Grant Funding.

## Cut it and Leave it...

Grass clippings are a major part of New Jersey's municipal solid waste stream. You are already doing your part by recycling. You can do even more by reducing waste at the source. Leave the grass clippings on your lawn when you mow, and let nature do the recycling. Grass clippings provide a natural and healthy fertilizer for a growing lawn. Will thatch be a problem? NO. Thatch is formed from the accumulation of dead roots and stems, not grass clippings. The more you fertilize and water your lawn, the faster it grows and the faster thatch accumulates.

## Garden Drive

Elsinboro Township will receive \$140,000 through the New Jersey Transportation Fund for the reconstruction of Garden Drive. The township will be responsible for covering engineering and miscellaneous costs for the project, estimated at less than \$30,000. The funds will come from capital improvement fund in the municipal budget. According to the township engineer, Garden Drive was originally constructed in 1950, at a cost of \$1500.

Over the last several years, roads in Elsinboro that have gone through construction include Mason Point Road, Riverview Drive, and Slape Avenue. Additionally, the township put in for a new grant to reconstruct South Locust next year.

### Did You Know?

New Jersey has had a no-idling regulation for diesel-fueled commercial vehicles since 1972. This law was updated in 2009 to include a provision that states that, with limited exceptions, *no* motor vehicle (diesel or gasoline fueled) may have its engine running if motionless for more than three consecutive minutes. A car is idling when the engine is turned on but the vehicle is not in motion. This practice is not only unnecessary, but also is harmful to the environment and our health.

### Reminder

Dumping of any items on another property is considered illegal and action can be taken.

Questions about property maintenance should be directed to the township zoning officer.
