### ### Theme:

## **### Sound and Rhythm:**

**\*\*Syllabic Patterns and Stresses:\*\*** The poem does not adhere to a strict metrical pattern, which reflects the chaotic nature of the writer's thoughts. The line lengths vary, contributing to a sense of erratic pacing. The use of enjambment (where sentences or clauses run over from one line to the next without a pause) creates a flowing rhythm that mirrors the continuous struggle of writing.
