



Terms of Reference for the Panamerican Boxing Medical and Anti-doping Committee

1. Purpose

The Panamerican Boxing Confederation Medical and Anti-Doping Committee (PBC-MADC) is established to Promote the health and safety of boxers, ensure compliance with anti-doping Regulations, and enhance the integrity of the sport.

2. Objectives

- To develop and implement medical protocols for boxing events.
- To establish and maintain anti-doping policies in accordance with international Standards.
- To work with WADA to provide education and resources on health, safety and doping Prevention for boxers, coaches and officials.
- To monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of medical and anti-doping programs to Work with ITA to keep and enforce rules regulations in accordance with WADA Guidelines
- To ensure consistency with the policies and procedures documented and approved by World Boxing's Medical and Anti-Doping Committee

3. Responsibilities

Medical Oversight:

- Review and approve medical guidelines for boxing competitions.
- Monitor health and safety standards at events
- Provide recommendations for medical emergencies and athlete care

Anti-doping Management:

- Support of ITA in the enforcement of anti-doping rules and regulations.
- Coordinate doping control programs in collaboration with relevant authorities
- Review and investigate doping violations and recommend sanctions

Education and Awareness:

- Create educational materials regarding health risks and anti-doping



- Organize workshops and seminars for stakeholders in the boxing community

Reporting and Evaluation:

- Prepare annual reports on medical and anti-doping activities
- Assess the impact and effectiveness of implemented programs.
- Create sub commissions: TUE (Doping), Scientific Studies and Continued education

4. Membership

- The committee shall consist of medical professionals and anti-doping experts.
- Members will be appointed for a term of 4 years with the possibility of renewal.
- The chairperson is elected in the congress, and he/she may appoint a vice-chairperson and secretary from among the members.

5. Meetings

- The committee will meet in person at least once per year to discuss ongoing projects, review policies and address any emerging issues
- The committee shall also meet virtually at least quarterly for the same reasons above.
- Special meetings may be called as necessary
- A quorum of 5 physicians is required for decision-making

6. Reporting Structure

- The chairperson of the medical committee will report to the Panamerican Boxing Executive Board and provide updates on its activities and recommendations for policy changes.

7. Amendments

- These Terms of Reference may be amended as necessary, with the approval of the committee and the Panamerican Boxing Board

8. Effective Date

- These Terms of Reference shall be effective from date of board approval (January 9, 2026)
