Welcome to...

FORT SANTIAGO

This is a highlight-packed stop featuring the Rizal Shrine, the Dungeons of Baluarte de Santa Barbara, Rizal's Final Walk, Spanish colonial defense structures, and Riverside Park. It is an iconic citadel first built by Spanish conquistador Miguel López de Legazpi in the late 1500s.

INTRAMUROS

"Intramuros" literally translates from Latin to "within the walls." During the Spanish colonial period, this heavily fortified area was considered the entire City of Manila, and initially, only Spaniards and their servants were permitted to live inside.

CASA MANILA

This site includes the Casa Manila Patio. The museum's façade is not an original Intramuros structure, but rather a reproduction patterned after an 1850s house from the Binondo district; its courtyard is paved with heavy Chinese granite originally used as ballast in trading ships.

BARBARA'S HERITAGE RESTAURANT

Experience Filipino flavors, tradition, and live cultural performances inside a beautifully preserved Spanish-era home. The restaurant originally started as a small family catering business in Olongapo City before becoming an Intramuros icon famous for its cultural shows featuring traditional dances like the Tinikling.

SILAHIS PASALUBONG CENTER

This strong cultural stop offers a curated mix of Filipino crafts, heritage pieces, antiques, artworks, and publications. It goes beyond standard souvenirs to give visitors a museum-like glimpse into the country's craftsmanship and multicultural history.

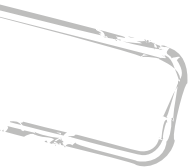
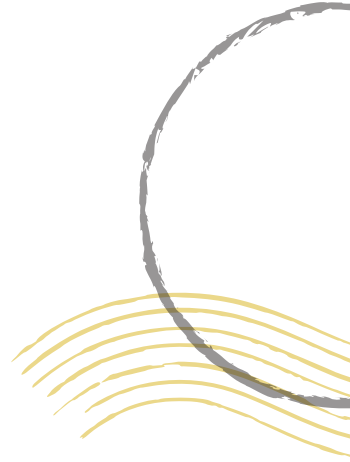

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY

One of the three buildings of the National Museum of the Philippines, it is known for showcasing Philippine biodiversity and the "Tree of Life" architecture. Built in 1940, the building survived heavy American artillery bombardment in 1945, and today it houses the actual skeleton of Lolong, once the world's largest captive saltwater crocodile.

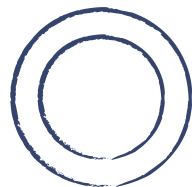

CASA SEGUNDA

Explore the heritage museum showcasing the life and times of Segunda Katigbak, Rizal's first love. Built circa 1880, this traditional bahay na bato (stone house) still retains its original 19th-century black and white zaguan flooring despite taking damage during World War II.

ARCHDIOCESAN SHRINE OF SAINT JOSEPH

Visit the historic parish church in San Jose, a spiritual and architectural landmark. The parish was once administered by Fr. Manuel Blanco, the famous Augustinian friar who authored the renowned botanical compilation Flora de Filipinas.

MUSEO DE SAN JOSE DE MALAQUING TUBIG

Discover San José's roots in a space where heritage, devotion, and the town's story come alive. The town was previously named San José de Malaquing Tubig ("Saint Joseph of the Big River") and became an independent parish in 1765 after Taal Volcano's eruption destroyed its original settlement.

CASA RAP

Enjoy Batangas specialties at this local favorite known for hearty meals. This hidden garden cafe is famous for a unique version of halo-halo that completely replaces regular ice with frozen buko (coconut) sherbet for a ridiculously smooth texture.



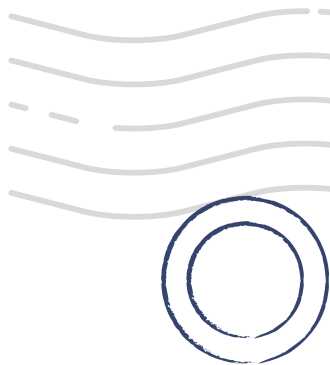
Welcome to...

BAHAY NI RIZAL

Tour the ancestral house of Dr. José Rizal, the national hero, and learn about his childhood, family, and formative years.

The current structure is a faithful reproduction of the original home and features a replica of Francisco Mercado's library, which was the largest private library in Calamba at the time with over 1,000 books.
