# Canada – Immigration, Study & Work Updates

## Major Decline in International Student Arrivals

Canada has experienced one of the steepest drops in student arrivals in recent years.

### Key Highlights:

- International student arrivals between January–August 2025 dropped by about 60% compared to 2024.
- Total international students in Canada as of August 2025: 8,02,425, down from 1,020,045 the previous year.
- The decline is linked to the stricter study permit cap, limited intake quotas, and enhanced verification of university acceptance letters.

### Message to Students:

Competition for admission and visas is significantly higher now. Strong documentation, financial proof, and genuine intent are essential.



## Updated IRCC Processing Timelines (Effective October 4, 2025)

IRCC has officially revised timelines for several PR and Temporary Resident categories.

- Spouse / Common-Law Partner (Inland): Reduced from 29 months → 24 months.
- Express Entry, PNP, TRV, and Work Permit categories: Timelines now vary widely; for example:
- Base PNP: ~19 months

CEC/FSW Express Entry: Timeframes depend on CRS pool volume and new category-based draws.

### New IRCC Tool:

Applicants can now check personalized estimated processing times, improving transparency.

### Good for Applicants:

Even if timelines are longer, the accuracy of information has improved.



## New Medical Examination Rules (Effective October 16, 2025)

Canada has introduced stricter medical examination criteria for PR and Temporary Residents.

### Important Points:

- Updated rules cover health admissibility, public safety considerations, enhanced screening for high-risk conditions.
- Applies to PR applicants, Work Permit holders, and Study Permit applicants.
- Students and workers must complete medical exams exactly as per IRCC-approved guidelines to avoid delays.

## Immigration Levels Plan 2026–2028 (Released November 1, 2025)

The Government of Canada has rolled out its three-year strategy for admissions.

### Key Takeaways:

- New annual targets will define the number of PR admissions, family reunification, refugee quotas, and temporary resident pathways.
- The plan focuses on labour market shortages, healthcare, skilled trades, and Francophone immigration.

### Advice for PR Aspirants:

The new targets directly impact your selection chances. Plan your application strategy based on category demand (e.g., healthcare, trades, French-speaking).

## Recent Express Entry Draws (October 2025)

Canada continues targeted draws under category-based selection.

### October 6, 2025:

- Category: French-Language Proficiency
- Invitations: 4,500
- CRS Cut-off: ~432

### October 15, 2025:

- Category: Healthcare & Social Services
- CRS Cut-off: ~472

### Trend:

IRCC is prioritizing French-speaking and healthcare professionals, making these categories the most favourable for PR in 2025.

# UK - Immigration and Student/Work Updates

## Major Policy Shift: UK Tightens Study Visa Rules

The UK government continues implementing strong reforms affecting international students.

### Key November Highlights:

- **Dependants Ban Continues:** Only postgraduate research students can bring dependants.
- **CAS Issuance Under Strict Surveillance:** Universities are issuing fewer CAS letters compared to previous years due to UKVI audits.
- **Higher Financial Proof Required:** Students must now show increased maintenance funds due to rising inflation and accommodation costs.
- **Genuine Student Interviews Increasing:** More students are being called for CAS interviews and credibility assessments.



### Impact on Students:

Competition for admissions is increasing. Maintain strong academic documents and financial transparency.

## Post-Study Work: BIG Opportunity After November 25, 2025

This is the most important update for students planning for PR in the UK.

### Innovator Founder Visa Pathway for Students

From 25 November 2025, students who complete their studies in the UK can apply directly for the Innovator Founder Visa if they plan to start a business.

### Benefits:

- No need to leave the UK; study visa converts directly to Innovator Visa.
- You can run a business and work without restrictions.
- Dependants allowed (spouse + children).
- Eligible for ILR (Permanent Residency) in 3 years.
- No minimum investment required; only a genuine innovative business idea is needed.

### Message for Students:

Your studies can now directly lead to entrepreneurship and PR in the UK.

## UK Job Market Update – November 2025

Despite skill shortages, employers are cautious due to immigration reforms.

### Sectors with High Demand:

- Healthcare (Nurses, Senior Carers, Lab Technicians), IT & Digital Skills (Cyber security, Software developers, AI), Skilled Trades (Electricians, Plumbers, Welders)
- Logistics & Transport, Hospitality (Chefs, Supervisors) – moderate demand
- Agriculture (Seasonal roles)

# USA - Immigration and Student/Work Updates



## Drop in New International Student Enrolment

U.S. universities are reporting a sharp fall in new international student intake for 2025, with an estimated loss of nearly \$1 billion in tuition and related revenue. The decline is linked to tougher visa rules, higher refusals, and political uncertainty.

Consultants in India (especially Gujarat) are reporting student visa refusal rates as low as 15% approvals, pushing many students to look at Canada, UK, Australia, and Europe instead.

## New & Stricter Student Visa Rules

### (F-1 / M-1 / J-1)

**Several important changes are now affecting student visa applicants:**

- In June 2025, the U.S. State Department resumed F-1/M-1/J-1 appointments with stricter security and social-media vetting. Applicants' social media profiles may be reviewed as part of the visa decision.
- New 2025 rules require higher financial proof for tuition and living costs for F-1, M-1 and J-1 students, and more detailed documentation of funding sources.
- U.S. Embassy in India has warned that new student visa appointments are "extremely limited", which means longer wait times and fewer interview slots.

**Practical tips for applicants:**

- Maintain clear bank documentation showing genuine funds.
- Ensure social media content is clean, consistent and truthful.
- Book interview dates as early as possible and be prepared for tougher questioning.

## Work & Employment Authorisation (EAD) Delays

**The USA continues to face serious backlogs for Employment Authorization Documents (EADs):**

As of November 3, 2025, more than 900,000 EAD applications had been pending for over six months. Many renewal cases are taking longer than half a year, putting foreign workers and employers under stress.

**Impact on workers:**

- Workers whose EADs expire may temporarily lose the legal right to work if their renewal is not approved in time.
- Employers are forced to remove or suspend staff, even when the delay is purely bureaucratic.



# Australia - Immigration and Student/Work Updates

## Major Changes in Student Visa Policies (Subclass 500)

Australia continued tightening its international student policies throughout 2025. The November updates confirm several impactful changes:

### Key Points:

- **Higher English Requirements:** Minimum IELTS requirement increased earlier in 2025 (now IELTS 6.0 for most courses, and higher for PG programs).
- **Stricter Genuine Student Test (GST):** The old “GTE – Genuine Temporary Entrant” requirement has been replaced with a more detailed GST, focusing on financial capacity, academic background, and genuine career pathways.
- **Longer Visa Assessments:** Processing times have increased due to higher fraud detection checks and document verification.
- **Higher Financial Capacity Requirement:** Students must show increased living cost funds aligned with Australia’s new Cost of Living Index.



### Impact on Applicants:

Students with weak financials, inconsistent academics, or unclear intentions are seeing higher refusal rates. Strong documentation is now essential.

## Skilled Migration Updates

Australia’s skilled migration pathway remains one of the strongest globally, but it is becoming more competitive.

### Current Trends:

#### New Migration Strategy continues:

The 2024–2025 Migration Strategy is still the foundation for reforms in 2026.

#### Focus on Skill Shortages:

Priority occupations include:  
Nursing & Aged Care, Engineering, Construction & Trade Workers, Teachers  
IT & Cyber Security, Automotive & Mechanical Technicians

#### Points Requirement Increasing:

Most states are inviting candidates with 80+ points, and some popular occupations require 90+.

#### State Nominations More Selective:

States like NSW, VIC, QLD prioritise skilled workers with local Australian work experience.

## Overall Message for Students & Workers

- Australia remains one of the most stable and opportunity-rich destinations for education and skilled migration.
- Visa scrutiny is increasing, but genuine students and skilled workers still receive strong opportunities.
- Selecting the correct course, city, and skill pathway is now more important than ever for PR success.
- Healthcare, construction, trades, and IT continue to provide the fastest employment and PR outcomes.

# France - Immigration and Student/Work Updates

## New Student Visa Trends (VFS / Campus France)

### Positive Trends:

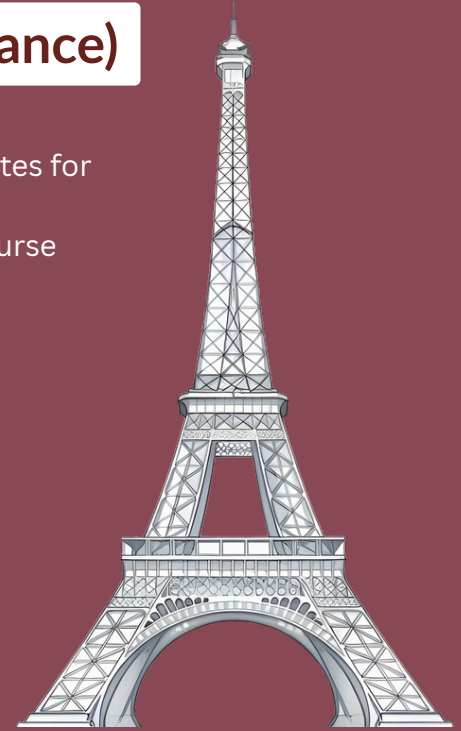
- Smooth visa processing: France is maintaining consistent approval rates for genuine students.
- Campus France interviews simplified: More emphasis on clarity of course selection, financial capacity, and post-study plans.
- Faster appointment system: Many students report shorter wait times compared to previous years.

### Key Requirements:

- Clear academic background
- Strong motivation statement (SOP)
- Verified funding (approx. €15,000–€20,000 per year)
- Proof of accommodation

### Advice:

Students must prepare strong justification for choosing France, connecting studies with long-term career goals.



## Work Permit Pathway Improvements

France has simplified several work-permit processes to attract skilled international talent.

### Key Improvements:

- Faster employer sponsorship approvals for shortage occupations.
- Easier transition from APS to full work permit.
- Employers increasingly open to hiring English-speaking graduates in tech and multinational companies.

### Long-Term Residency Pathway:

- After holding a work permit for several years (typically 5 years of residence), one can apply for Carte de Résident (10-year residence card).
- After this, eligible individuals may apply for French nationality, subject to language and integration requirements.



## Overall Message for Students & Workers

- France is emerging as the best value-for-money destination in Europe for international students.
- Work opportunities are expanding across multiple industries, especially tech, hospitality, engineering, and logistics.
- Visa decisions remain stable for genuine students with complete documents.
- Learning French language (B1/B2) is essential for long-term career and residency success.
- France offers both affordability and long-term settlement potential, making it a smart choice for 2025–2030 planning.

# Germany - Immigration and Student/Work Updates

## New Student Visa Rules & VFS Trends

Germany has implemented several policy updates affecting student visa applicants.

### Key Requirements & Trends:

- Blocked Account Amount Updated:
- New required blocked amount for 2025–26 is approx. €12,000–€12,800 per year depending on the city.
- Stricter Financial Proof:
- Students must show transparent funding sources and a complete set of sponsor documents.
- APS Verification Still Mandatory:
- For Indian students applying to German universities, APS Certificate remains a compulsory document.
- Faster Consulate Appointments:
- Germany has expanded VFS capacity, reducing waiting times for visa slots in many regions.

### Key Advice:

Ensure APS is completed early, prepare strong academic justification, and maintain clean financial documents to avoid delays.



## Germany's Skilled Worker Immigration Act

The Skilled Immigration Act 2.0, fully implemented in 2025, is transforming Germany's labour market.

### Major Benefits:

- Faster recognition of foreign qualifications.
- More flexible work visas even for applicants without German degrees.
- Reduced salary thresholds for the EU Blue Card.
- New "Opportunity Card (Chancenkarte)" allowing skilled applicants to enter Germany for job search.

### Opportunity Card Highlights:

- Points-based system
- Valid for up to one year
- Allows part-time work while job searching
- Open to skilled workers, degree holders, and experienced professionals

## Financial Requirements & Cost of Living - Updated Figures

### For Student Visa:

- Blocked Account: €12,000–€12,800 per year depending on city
- Living cost: €850–€1,100 per month
- Accommodation: €300–€500 per month (depending on region)



# Spain - Immigration and Student/Work Updates

## New Student Visa Updates

Spain continues to simplify procedures for genuine students. The November updates reinforce the following:



### Key Changes & Requirements:

- Financial proof requirement updated: Students must now show approx. €750–€850 per month for living expenses.
- Accommodation documentation required: Students must submit confirmed residence contracts or university accommodation letters.
- Medical insurance rules tightened: Only fully comprehensive (no-deductible) insurance from approved providers is accepted.
- Faster appointments: Many Spanish consulates in India are offering quicker slot availability than in previous years.

### Advice:

Prepare strong SOP, verified financial documents, and clear academic justification for a smooth visa experience.

## Post-Study Work Visa (1-Year Job Search Permit)



Spain's post-study rules remain one of the most flexible in Europe.

### Advantages of the Post-Study Visa:

- Students completing a Bachelor's or Master's degree can apply for a 1-year Job Search Residency Permit.
- During this 1-year period, students can work part-time and search for full-time employment.
- Once a job offer is secured, students can convert their status to Work Residence Permit (Highly Skilled Worker) or Regular Employee Permit.

### Important November Note:

More Spanish companies in sectors like hospitality, IT, tourism, retail, and marketing are now hiring English-speaking international graduates.

## New Work Visa & Immigration Pathways

Spain continues enhancing its labour immigration system due to ongoing workforce shortages.

### Key Pathways:

#### 1. Highly Qualified Professional Visa (HQP)

- Fast-track for IT, engineering, finance, and management professionals.
- Salaries are competitive and allow faster residency approval.

#### 2. Regular Work Permit (General Regime)

- More flexible rules for companies to hire international staff in shortage sectors.

#### 3. Entrepreneur Visa

- Strong option for applicants planning to start a business or invest in Spain.

#### 4. Seasonal Work Visa

- High demand in agriculture, hospitality, and tourism.

# Malaysia - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

## Malaysia Strengthens Position as an Affordable Asian Study Hub

### Key November Highlights:

- A steady rise in enrolments for 2025–26 intake, especially in Business, IT, Engineering, MBBS pathways, Hospitality, and Aviation.
- Affordable tuition fees, safe environment, and multi-cultural lifestyle make Malaysia a top choice for budget-friendly international education.
- Many universities continue offering Twinning Programs (Malaysia → UK/USA/Australia) at significantly lower cost.

### Message for Students:

Malaysia remains one of the most cost-effective destinations offering global-quality degrees and smooth visa processes.



## Student Visa & EMGS Updates

Malaysia's Education Ministry and EMGS (Education Malaysia Global Services) have issued several updates.

### Key Trends This Month:

- **Faster Visa Approval:** Student Pass processing time has improved, with many approvals coming within 4–6 weeks.
- **Strict Medical Check Requirements:** Students must complete EMGS-approved medical screening.
- **Financial Documentation:** Proof of funds between RM 15,000–RM 25,000 depending on course level and duration.
- **Online Application System Updated:** EMGS portal has upgraded its interface for better tracking and quicker document verification.

### Advice for Applicants:

Submit clear academic documents, passport copies, and financial proofs early to avoid delays.

# Japan - Immigration, Student and Work Updates



## Student Visa

Japan has made several policy improvements to support international students.

### Key Updates:

- Faster COE (Certificate of Eligibility) approvals: Processing time has reduced to 6–8 weeks for many students.
- Higher financial documentation requirements: Students must show funds covering minimum JPY 1.2 million (approx.) per year.
- Japanese Language Schools (1–2 Years): Still the most popular entry route to Japan due to high job placement prospects.
- More institutions offering Hybrid Programs (Japanese + Skill Training).

Japan offers several strong work visa routes, especially under recent reforms.

#### “Specified Skilled Worker (SSW)” Visa – SSW-1 & SSW-2

Ideal pathway for Hospitality, Nursing, Construction, Manufacturing, Cleaning, Agriculture.

SSW-1: 5-year visa

SSW-2: Leads to Permanent Residency (PR)

#### Engineer/Specialist in Humanities/International Services (Work Visa)

Best for IT, Engineering, Business, Marketing, Finance.

Requires degree OR relevant work experience.

#### Japan’s New “Start-up Visa” Expansion

More prefectures added in 2025.

Ideal for entrepreneurial students looking to start small or tech-based businesses.



# Dubai - Immigration, Student and Work Updates

## Study Visa (Student Residence Visa)

Dubai is rapidly becoming a preferred study destination due to flexible entry and residency options.

Key Updates:

- **Faster student visa approvals:** Many universities now issue electronic visas within 7–12 days.
- **Flexible Entry Rules:** Students can enter on a tourist visa and convert to a student visa after admission.
- **Family Sponsorship Allowed:**
  - Undergraduate & postgraduate students can bring parents (conditions apply).
- **English-taught programs continue to expand,** especially in Business, IT, Design, Media, Hospitality, and Engineering.

**Financial Requirements:**

- Tuition fees: AED 20,000–60,000 annually (varies by institution).
- Living cost: AED 2,500–4,000 per month.

**Tip:** Dubai's British-curriculum universities offer pathways to UK degrees at lower cost.

## UAE Immigration Reforms

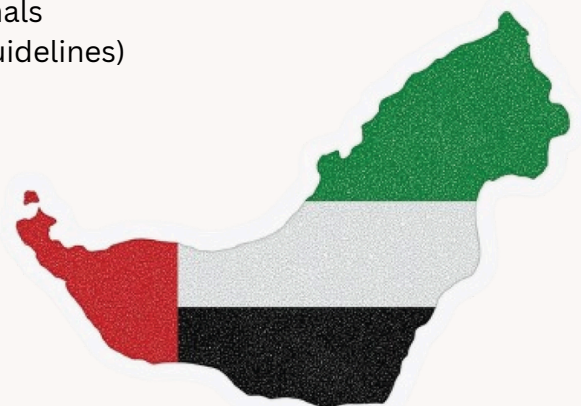
