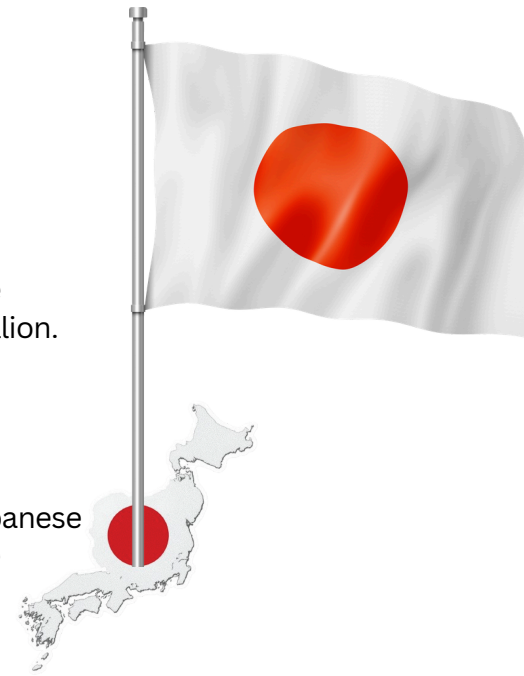

Japan – Key Facts

Basic information

- **Population & Land** : Japan is an island nation in East Asia and one of the world's most advanced economies, with a population of approx. 125 million. Land area: 377,975 sq km. Known for cutting-edge technology, strong discipline, safety, and rich cultural heritage.
- **Climate** : Temperate climate with four distinct seasons – cold winters, pleasant spring and autumn, and warm, humid summers.
- **Religion & Culture** : Shintoism and Buddhism are the main religions. Japanese society is highly disciplined, respectful, and community-oriented. While culturally traditional, Japan is increasingly global and welcoming to international students and skilled workers.

Canada – Immigration, Student & Work Updates

IRCC Enforcement Phase Begins – Study Permit Intake Controls

20 November 2025

- IRCC formally entered the enforcement phase of the 2025–26 international student cap.
- Universities were instructed to limit CAS-equivalent enrolment confirmations strictly to allocated provincial quotas.
- Increased verification of Offer Letters to prevent fraudulent admissions.



Provincial Attestation Letter (PAL) – Full Compliance Mandated

1 December 2025

- PAL requirement became non-negotiable for most public institutions.
- Applications submitted without valid PALs began receiving procedural refusals, not discretionary reviews.

IRCC Processing Transparency Tool Activated

4 December 2025

- IRCC officially launched a personalised Processing time estimator.
- Applicants can now see realistic timelines for :

Study Permit
Work Permit
Express Entry
PNP



Medical Admissibility Rules – Strict Enforcement

16 December 2025

- Updated medical screening rules (announced earlier) entered full enforcement.
- Applies to :
Study Permit
Work Permit
PR Applications
- Incomplete or incorrect medicals now trigger automatic file holds.

Express Entry – Category-Based Selection Continues

29 December 2025

- IRCC confirmed continuation of targeted draws into 2026.
- Priority categories:
 - Healthcare & Social Services
 - French-language proficiency
 - Skilled Trades

Government Position

Canada is transitioning from volume-based intake to labour-aligned immigration, prioritising quality, language skills, and employability.



UK - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

No new published rule-change noted - 20 Nov 2025 to 24 Nov 2025

Within this window, there were no new “Statement of Changes” published by the Home Office specific to this date range. (The next relevant published amendments appear on 25 Nov 2025 in the Immigration Rules update log.)

Immigration Rules “published amendments” (Rules text updated to reflect HC 1333)

The official Immigration Rules update log records 25 Nov 2025 published amendments, including updates to Appendix Student and multiple work-related appendices to reflect the earlier Statement of Changes HC 1333.

What changed (high-impact, relevant to Student + Work routes)

1) New “Part Suitability” / Refusal & Compliance framework reflected across routes

Rules and guidance were updated to reflect that cross-cutting refusal/overstay provisions now sit under Part Suitability (this is referenced across sponsor and work-route materials, and in the HC 1333 rule package).

2) Student – cancellation/curtailment triggers clarified in Rules text

HC 1333 includes explicit cancellation grounds where (examples):

- sponsorship is withdrawn on Student/Child Student routes, including a specific scenario tied to pre-session course completion and English level (B2); and
- a Student/Child Student does not start, course is delayed beyond limits, or they cease studying.

3) Work routes – cancellation/curtailment triggers clarified

HC 1333 also sets out cancellation triggers for work routes where employment does not start or ceases (Skilled Worker and other sponsored routes).

Practical implications (for your magazine “What students should do” box):

- Students must maintain sponsor compliance and timely course start/continuation; sponsor withdrawal can directly impact immigration permission. [GOV.UK](https://www.gov.uk)
- Skilled Worker applicants/employers should ensure start dates and employment continuity are properly recorded and followed

Skilled Worker caseworker guidance updated

The official Skilled Worker caseworker guidance shows an update date of 16 Dec 2025.

- “Home Office caseworker guidance for Skilled Worker was updated on 16 Dec 2025; sponsors/applicants should ensure applications align with the latest guidance interpretation.”

Immigration Rules update log shows a minor correction December 2025

The Immigration Rules “Updates” log records 19 Dec 2025 published amendments including an error correction in Appendix Parent of a Child Student (wording correction in PC 2.2).



USA - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

USCIS – Employment Authorization (EAD) tightening

4 December 2025 (Announced) / 5 December 2025 (Effective)

USCIS announced a change affecting Employment Authorization (Form I-765 / EAD):

USCIS stated it is increasing screening/vetting for individuals working in the U.S. and that the change affects certain employment authorization requests pending or filed on/after 5 Dec 2025.

Employer/Applicant relevance:

More frequent renewals and more frequent checks can increase Processing friction for workers dependent on EAD renewals.

No major new federal rule-change published in this window (study/work-specific)

20 Nov 2025 – 02 Dec 2025

During this period, there was no widely published federal “new rule” announcement specifically changing F-1 student visa rules, OPT rules, or employment-based immigration frameworks.



U.S. Department of State – NIV appointments should be in country of nationality/residence

12 December 2025

- Effective immediately, DOS updated instructions: nonimmigrant visa (NIV) applicants should schedule interviews at a U.S. Embassy/Consulate in their country of nationality or residence.
- DOS also published designated processing posts for nationals of certain countries where routine NIV operations are not available.

Impact (Students + Workers) :

Third-country applications can become harder and may face longer waits; applicants must be able to demonstrate residence if applying based on residency.

Department of State – Visa Bulletin for December 2025

Official Visa Bulletin:

DOS published the Visa Bulletin for December 2025, which governs immigrant visa availability and includes Final Action Dates and Dates for Filing across family-sponsored and employment-based categories.

Impact (Employment-based PR planning):

Determines whether employment-based applicants can proceed with consular processing / adjustment timing depending on category and country chargeability.



Australia - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Genuine Student Test (GST) – Full Enforcement Confirmed

Official clarification under Migration Regulations & DHA guidance:

25 November 2025

- The GST (Genuine Student Test) fully replaced the old GTE (Genuine Temporary Entrant).
- Case officers instructed to assess:
 - Long-term career relevance of the chosen course
 - Applicant's personal, academic, and economic circumstances
 - Whether study is a logical step toward employability

Key change in assessment tone: Not temporary intent, but genuine educational and career intent.

Impact:

- SOP quality became decisive.
- Generic or copy-paste statements increasingly resulted in refusals.

English Language Requirement – Strict Application

DHA confirmation of ongoing 2025 rules:

01 December 2025

- Minimum English language requirements strictly applied:
 - IELTS 6.0 (or equivalent) for most Subclass 500 courses
 - Higher bands for postgraduate and professional programs
- Test validity and authenticity checks reinforced.

Impact:

- Conditional Offer Letters without valid English scores faced delays or refusals.
- Pathway students required clear progression logic.

Skilled Migration – State Nomination Selectivity Increases

Official state migration program feedback (NSW, VIC, QLD):

15 December 2025

- **States continued highly selective invitations under:**
 - Subclass 190
 - Subclass 491
- **Priority given to:**
 - Onshore candidates
 - Australian work experience holders
 - Occupations aligned with state labour shortages

Points trend:

- Invitations increasingly issued at 80–90+ points, especially in metro states.



Priority Occupation Confirmation

Government labour market alignment reaffirmed:

20 December 2025

Australia confirmed continued prioritisation of occupations in:

- **Nursing & Aged Care, Construction & Trade Occupations, Engineering, IT & Cyber Security, Education (Teachers)**

Impact for students:

- **Course selection directly affects PR feasibility.**
- **General business programs without skill linkage face limited migration value.**

France - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Ministry of Interior & Ministry of Higher Education – Stable Student Visa Policy Confirmed (20 November 2025)

Official position (France):

- French authorities confirmed continuation of stable student visa processing for genuine international students.
- No quota cap or moratorium announced for non-EU students.
 - Policy emphasis reaffirmed on: Academic relevance, Financial sufficiency, Clear post-study planning

Impact:

- France positioned as a predictable alternative amid tightening policies in other major destinations.

Campus France – Interview & Evaluation Framework Clarified

(22 November 2025)



Campus France operational guidance:

- Interviews refocused on quality assessment, not formality.
- Officers instructed to prioritise:
 - Logical course progression
 - Career alignment with prior education
 - Clarity of return / settlement plan under French law

Change in practice:

- Less emphasis on rote answers
- More emphasis on reasoned academic choice

Impact:

- Candidates with generic SOPs faced delays or re-interviews.

Student Visa Financial Requirement – Enforcement Phase

Government-aligned benchmark (applied nationwide): (01 December 2025)

- Students required to show €15,000–€20,000 per year (Tuition Fees + living costs).
- Funds must be: Traceable, Legally sourced, Adequately documented

Impact: Weak Finance Evidence increasingly led to refusals despite strong academic profiles.

Post-Study Pathway (APS → Work Permit) – Reinforced

Official clarification: (15 December 2025)

- Graduates holding APS (Autorisation Provisoire de Séjour):
 - Can transition smoothly to full Work Permit
 - No exit from France required if eligible employment is secured

Key point:

- English-speaking roles acceptable in multinational companies, but
- French language proficiency (B1/B2) strongly recommended for career growth.

Germany - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Student Visa Scrutiny – Academic & Course Relevance Emphasised

Consular guidance applied:

(25 November 2025)

- Case officers instructed to closely assess:
 - Academic continuity
 - Logical course progression
 - Alignment between previous studies and chosen program

Impact:

- Random course changes and unrelated Master's selections resulted in refusals or extended Processing.



VFS Germany – Appointment Capacity Expanded

(01 December 2025)

Operational update:

- Germany expanded VFS appointment slots across multiple Indian centres.
- Average waiting time for biometrics reduced significantly compared to early 2025.

Impact:

- Faster movement from admission confirmation to visa filing.
- Reduced backlog pressure for winter and summer intakes.

Germany Skilled Immigration Act 2.0 – Nationwide Operational Phase

Federal Government confirmation:

(05 December 2025)

- The Skilled Immigration Act 2.0 entered full operational mode across all federal states.
- Key provisions applied uniformly.

Key Features Activated:

- Faster recognition of foreign qualifications
- Lower salary thresholds for the EU Blue Card
- Eligibility for skilled professionals without a German degree
- Increased flexibility for Employer sponsorship

Impact: Germany became more accessible for international professionals across STEM and technical trades.

Message to Students & Professionals

Germany offers one of the clearest, rule-based immigration systems in Europe. Success depends on early planning, academic discipline, clean financial documentation, and skill alignment with the labour market.



Spain - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Student Visa Financial Benchmark – Practical Enforcement

Government-aligned requirement (applied nationwide):

(22 November 2025)

- Students required to show living cost proof of approximately €750–€850 per month, in line with updated IPREM calculations.
- Financial documents must be:
 - Traceable
 - Consistent
 - Properly supported by sponsor records

Impact:

- Weak or unexplained funds increasingly led to additional checks or refusals.



Accommodation Proof – Mandatory Compliance

(25 November 2025)

Consular/VFS implementation:

- Submission of confirmed accommodation became strictly mandatory:
 - Registered rental contract, or
 - University / student residence confirmation
- Temporary or informal arrangements were discouraged.

Impact:

- Incomplete accommodation proof caused Application delays.



Health Insurance Rules – Strict Application

Official requirement enforced:

(01 December 2025)

- Students must submit full-coverage Health Insurance:
 - No co-payment
 - No deductible
 - Valid for the entire duration of stay
- Only recognised insurers accepted.

Impact:

- Policies with partial coverage were rejected at the filing stage.



Consulate & VFS Spain – Appointment Availability Improved

(05 December 2025)

Operational update:

- Spain increased appointment slot availability across major Indian cities.
- Faster scheduling compared to earlier months of 2025.

Impact:

- Reduced waiting periods between admission confirmation and biometric submission.



Malaysia - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

EMGS – Student Pass Processing Efficiency Reinforced

Official EMGS operational update:

(22 November 2025)

- Education Malaysia Global Services (EMGS) confirmed improved internal Processing workflows.
- Average Student Pass Processing timeline observed at 4–6 weeks for complete Applications.

Impact:

- Faster approvals for students with clear academic progression and verified Documents.
- Incomplete files increasingly returned for correction rather than prolonged holding.

Financial Proof Benchmarks – Practical Enforcement

Government-aligned requirement:

(25 November 2025)

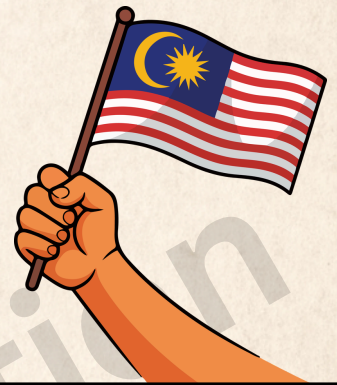
- Students required to demonstrate financial capacity in the range of RM 15,000–RM 25,000, depending on:
 - Course level
 - Duration
 - Institution type

Conditions:

- Funds must be traceable and supported by sponsor relationship evidence.

Impact:

- Sudden unexplained deposits triggered additional scrutiny.
- Clear Bank Statement history became critical.



EMGS Online Portal – System Upgrade Implemented

Operational update:

(05 December 2025)

- EMGS implemented upgrades to its online Application and tracking portal.
- Enhancements included:
 - Faster document verification
 - Improved status visibility for institutions and applicants

Impact:

- Reduced communication gaps between students, universities, and EMGS.
- Faster identification of missing Documents.



Employment Pass (EP) Framework – Government Position Reiterated

Immigration Department clarification:

(10 December 2025)

- Malaysia continues issuing Employment Passes (Category I, II, III) based on:
 - Salary threshold
 - Contract duration
 - Skill level

Key Note:

- Category I remains the most stable long-term route for skilled professionals and managers.

Impact:

- Graduates targeting skilled roles encouraged to align education with EP eligibility.

Japan - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Immigration Services Agency (ISA) — International Student Intake Continuity

Official position (Japan):

(20 November 2025)

- Japan confirmed continued acceptance of international students with no quota caps for language schools, vocational institutions, or universities.
- Policy emphasis remained on:
 - Genuine study intent
 - Financial self-sufficiency
 - Compliance with residence rules

Impact:

- Japan strengthened its appeal as a stable Asian destination amid tighter policies elsewhere.

Certificate of Eligibility (COE) — Faster Processing Cycle Confirmed

ISA operational update:

(22 November 2025)

- Average COE Processing timelines reduced to 6–8 weeks for complete Applications.
- Institutions instructed to submit error-free Documentation to maintain speed.

Impact:

- Early admission confirmation became a key success factor.
- Incomplete COE files returned quickly rather than held.



Financial Proof Requirement — Practical Enforcement

(25 November 2025)

Government-aligned benchmark applied:

- Students required to show funds covering minimum JPY 1.2 million per year (living expenses).
- Financial Evidence must demonstrate:
 - Stable source of income
 - Sponsor relationship clarity
 - Consistent transaction history

Impact:

- Sudden deposits or unclear sponsorship led to additional scrutiny.

(18 December 2025)

Start-up Visa — Prefecture-Level Expansion

Government update:

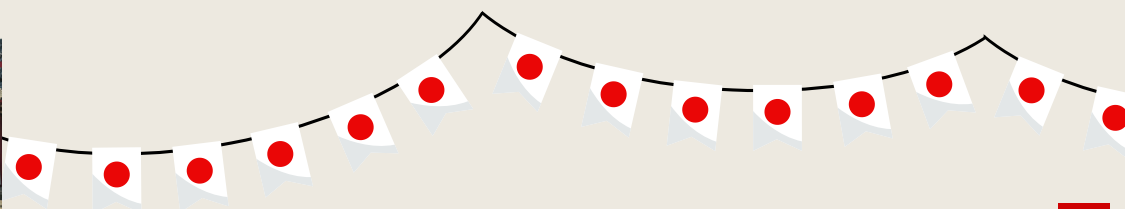
Additional prefectures approved to issue Start-up Visas.

Allows entrepreneurs to:

- Establish business operations
- Transition to Business Manager residence status

Impact:

- Increased opportunities for tech, service, and small-scale entrepreneurs.



Dubai - Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Study Visa Entry Flexibility

Tourist to Student Conversion Reaffirmed

(22 November 2025)

Government-aligned clarification:

- Students may enter Dubai on a tourist visa and convert to a Student Residence after securing Admission.
- Exit from UAE not required, subject to compliance with institutional and Immigration procedures.

Impact:

- Reduced travel cost and faster onboarding for international students.

Golden Visa – Education & Talent Categories Reconfirmed

Official clarification (ICP):

(25 November 2025)

- 10-Year Golden Visa eligibility reiterated for:
 - Outstanding students and graduates
 - High-skill professionals
 - Researchers and innovators
- Academic excellence and institutional recommendation required.



Impact:

- Dubai reinforced its positioning as a long-term talent retention destination.

Employment Residence Visa (Employer Compliance Tightened)

MOHRE & ICP operational update:

(05 December 2025)

- Enhanced scrutiny of Employer sponsorship documents.
- Companies required to maintain:
 - Valid trade licences
 - Wage Protection System (WPS) compliance
 - Contract authenticity

Impact:

- Reduced misuse of employment visas.
- Stronger protection for foreign workers.



Living Cost & Tuition Advisory – Year-End Update

Advisory benchmarks reiterated:

(18 December 2025)

- Tuition Fees: AED 20,000 – 60,000 per year (varies by institution)
- Living cost: AED 2,500 – 4,000 per month
- Health Insurance mandatory for all residents.

Impact:

- Applicants advised to plan Finance Evidence carefully to avoid Processing delays.

Italy – Immigration, Student & Work Updates

Student Visa Documentation – Alignment Check Reinforced

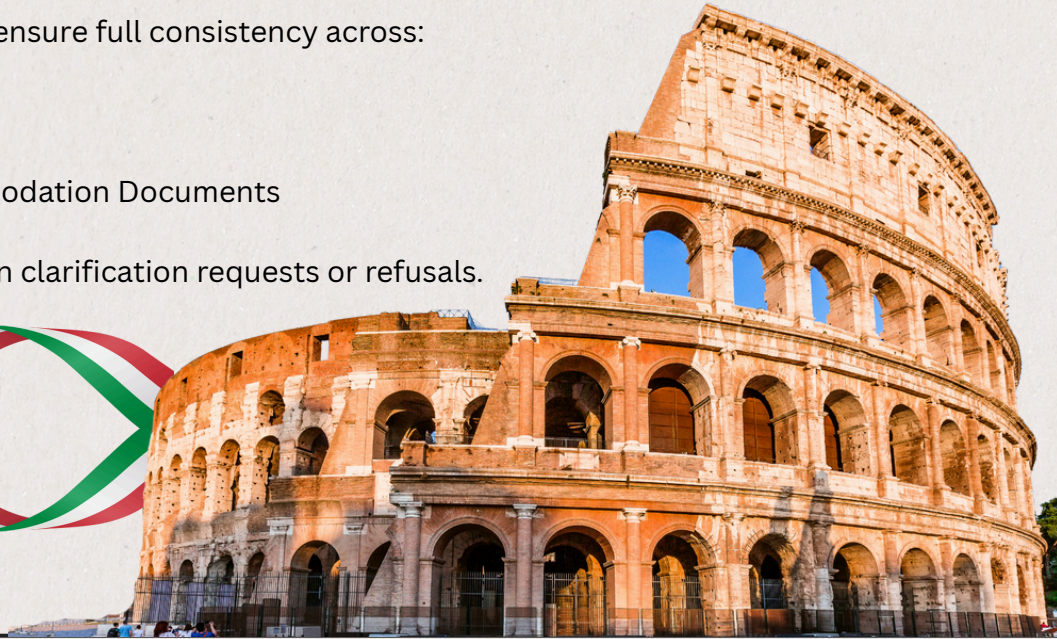
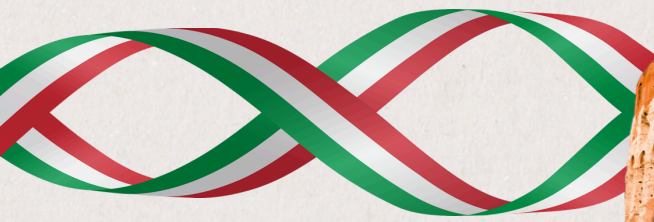
Official practice reinforced:

(01 December 2025)

- Consulates instructed to ensure full consistency across:
 - Admission letter
 - SOP
 - Academic history
 - Financial and accommodation Documents

Impact:

- Inconsistencies resulted in clarification requests or refusals.



Study-to-Work Conversion – Practical Application Encouraged

Official clarification:

(10 December 2025)

- Students completing studies in Italy may convert Student Residence to Work Residence without leaving Italy, subject to:
 - Valid job offer
 - Employer compliance
 - Availability under Decreto Flussi or EU Blue Card

Impact:

- Italy reinforced its education-to-employment pathway.

Scholarships & Financial Support – 2025–26 Cycle Reaffirmed

Government-supported scholarship schemes active:

(15 December 2025)

- DSU Regional Scholarship, EDISU Scholarship, LazioDisco Scholarship, University-specific merit scholarships

Coverage may include:

- Tuition Fees, Accommodation, Food vouchers, Monthly living allowance

Impact:
