"In 2016, Barna's *Talking Jesus* survey reported that 22 percent of people in the UK think Jesus was a mythical figure, while 17 per cent are unsure whether he was real or not. If accurate, this means that nearly 40 percent of people in our society doubt the existence of Jesus, a staggering indication of how pervasive such ideas have become.

In an increasingly skeptical culture, the Christian can no longer assume that their non-Christian friends are on the same page as them when it comes to the existence of Jesus, much less his claims to divinity."

That was a poll in the United Kingdom nine years ago. American religious trends tend to be about five years (+/-) behind Britain, which means that we can safely assume that those figures are in the ballpark for the U.S. Those are staggering numbers, representing actual people who believe that Jesus is just a mythical figure.

Well-known biblical scholar N.T. Wright, when asked for the one thing he would show a sceptic as evidence for Jesus's life, pointed to his death, saying "The crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth is one of the best attested facts in ancient history. If we take Jesus out of the world of first-century Palestinian Judaism, there are a thousand other things that we simply can't explain. All sorts of evidence point back to the certainty of this figure, and particularly his crucifixion."

Of course, as Christians, we can't talk about the death of Jesus without immediately talking about the resurrection of Jesus. The two go together. So, what is the evidence of Christ's life, death, and resurrection? Is there anything outside of the Bible and Christian tradition that provides proof the he lived, died, and was raised?

Join me on Sunday mornings after church as we investigate the *"Evidence for the Resurrection."* We'll draw on Biblical, historical, and archeological material to answer the questions, "Was Jesus as real person?" and "What evidence is there that he died and rose again?" Sunday mornings from 10:15—11:15a.m. beginning April 13th (Palm Sunday); meeting for four weeks.

Meeting Minutes from March 9th Voters' Meeting

Voters' Meeting - 3/9/2025

Meeting opened in prayer led by Pastor Eric

- 1. Transfers In Darlene and Jim Harshman
- 2. Board of Elders Mel Lenig no recent meetings; one scheduled for this week with 7 new Elders
- 3. Board of Outreach/Parish Nurse/Smiles Sharon Krick they cleaned out many things in the Evangelism Room
- 4. Board of Trustees Phil Hamand
 - a. Parsonage Projects: Pastor's bathroom was completed total cost \$29,412 with a budget of \$30,000; a new refrigerator was also purchased as the old one broke down
 - b. Handicap toilet by the preschool needed repair, as it was running too slow and using too much water. Wendy Hopp made repairs
 - c. East entrance doors (by preschool) were replaced. All four doors had hinge replacements, since the old ones were rotted
- 5. Treasurer's Report Char Geisler
 - a. Jan/Feb Expenses = \$60,057.58
 - b. Char pointed out a few things on the Treasurer's Report
- i. Maintenance Expenses of \$52,500 includes parsonage bathroom remodel, from the 2024 budget
- ii. Miscellaneous Expenses: \$665 was from a soil test on Schwartz farm because crop production was down. Brad Hazelton advised that this was normal and a good idea; also included trailer license plate renewal
 - 1. Bruce Zimmerman asked why the church paid for the soil test because it was his understanding that the farmer was responsible for that cost. Dave replied that Brad said it was normal for the ground owner to pay that expense
 - 2. Karen Zimmerman asked if the church has say in what is added to the soil for increased crop production. Dave clarified that the farmer would be required to pay that cost, if he added fertilizer/ etc.
- iii. Building Rental includes the rental of the parking lot, which was pre-paid for the whole year
 - 6. Little Lambs Preschool Elaine Browne
 - a. Registration for next school year opened up 3/1/2025 and there are only 1-2 spots open
 - b. Preschool just had a jungle-themed production and activity centers a bigger event for the winter
 - 7. Pastor's Report
 - a. Worship
- i. All services are planned and written through Easter. The Sunday theme Walking the Hard Road When Faith is Challenged
- ii. New purple paraments are out
- iii. Diane is working with youth for Easter Sunday program, and a special Holy Week family service planned for 4/16 at 5 p.m., an interactive service for the whole family, with a taco bar

- iv. There are 4 people doing Children's Messages on Sundays, and some of the youth are interested in helping Sharon run the PowerPoint on Sunday mornings
 - b. Baptism planned for 3/16 Sara Ann Downs, a preschool student (Sharon Krick's great-granddaughter)
 - c. Bible Study Thursday group just started Exodus after completing Genesis; Sunday morning group is looking at major denominations with great attendance; Diane leads two per week, as well
 - d. Confirmation The experiment with "homeschooling" wasn't successful. A "classic" confirmation will start Wednesday from 4:30 5:45 p.m. taught by Pastor and Diane
 - e. VBS committee has met to start planning. Registration will be online. Theme will be "superhero faith". Each day will discuss what a superhero needs and how it relates to Jesus
 - f. Ministry Plan Pastor hopes to get back to it now that he has a full board of elders. "A Closer Walk" Bible Plan seems well received and used by many members of the congregation
 - g. Staff is reading "Lasting Impact: 7 Powerful Conversations that will Help Your Congregation Grow". Pastor would like to cover it at a leader's workshop after Easter.
 - h. Pastor is going to meet with the boards individually since the orientation meetings were cancelled due to weather. He will go over the board's job description, expectations, training and planning regular meetings
 - i. Food Pantry Pastor mentioned what a great impact it's having in the community. They've been averaging 100 people visiting per month. Pastor wanted to recognize them to the congregation and thank them. Just the other day, the pantry received a call from a couple who hadn't eaten in four days, and the pantry was able to get food to them.
 - 8. Youth Report Dave Geisler (since Diane was teaching Sunday School)
 - a. Youth Group for middle school/high school is 2nd and 4th Sundays. There are a few good movies coming out with Christian messages, as well as a passion play at Michiana Event Center. Diane is going to try to take the youth to those things to help celebrate the Easter season. They will also serve Easter breakfast to the congregation
 - 9. President's Report Dave Geisler

a. Jeff & Shirley Fosler are requesting easement on property adjacent to the church's farmland to build a new facility for their farm equipment. Because the building is going to be a little larger than zoning allows, they have to ask permission from the church. We see no need to dispute the request

- b. Valpo University College of Engineering Scholarship The Starke County Community Scholarship Foundation sent a report that the balance is a little over \$75,000, with a "spendable value" of \$32,000, but we haven't had an applicant in years
- c. The council agreed to provide written reports prior to meetings to make the meetings more effective/efficient.
- d. New church constitution was approved by the District, but there have been some changes since the approval
- i. Approval is needed for description of Inreach-Outreach Committee
 - 1. Approval motioned by Phil Hamand; seconded by Bruce Zimmerman
 - 2. Motion passed by congregation
- ii. Marcia Olson asked if the constitution allowed for a woman to be congregational president. Dave clarified that it does not



Earth-shaking Victory!


On Ash Wednesday in 2001, a 6.8 magnitude earthquake shook the Seattle area. Charlie and Ann Lewis, co-pastors in Snohomish, Washington, reflected on the timing:

"While most years we prefer to think of Lent as a contemplative journey of faith as we walk with Jesus toward Jerusalem and the cross, this year we are thinking of how God turned the world upside down at Calvary. From the cross, Jesus cried out with a loud voice, and his life was finished. Then the earth shook violently, the curtain in the temple was torn in two and rocks were split apart. The

God who identified with us in our humanity in the incarnation of Jesus Christ demonstrated in that moment the depth of divine love for us - a love that leads God to choose the path of suffering and sacrifice.

"Three days later, the earth shook again — another violent earthquake, and the stone in front of the tomb was rolled away. Then the crucified Christ threw aside the burial cloths, emerging from the darkness of the tomb to walk in the dew of the grass as dawn was breaking across the sky. God had declared victory over sin and death itself. That victory was for us. ... God has given us a glorious life that extends into eternity."





New life defines the season of spring. Make this Easter craft that symbolizes rebirth.

What you need:

- Brown paper lunch bag
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Glue stick
- Jellybeans

What you do:

- From the bag's bottom, cut two
 2-inch circles. Set aside.
- 2. From the sides, cut two 10-inch circles.
- Draw a thin spiral on each large circle and cut along the lines. Crinkle spirals gently.
- 4. Starting at the center, wrap one spiral into a nest. Glue every few inches to hold it.
- 5. Glue one small circle to the bottom of the nest.
- 6. Repeat with the other spiral. Fill nests with jellybeans and give to a friend!


