

Lending Out Books By Hal Sirowitz

You're always giving, my therapist said.
You have to learn how to take. Whenever
You meet a woman, the first thing you do
is lend her your books. You think she'll
have to see you again in order to return them.
But what happens is, she doesn't have the time
to read them, & she's afraid if she sees you again
you'll expect her to talk about them, & will
want to lend her even more. So she
cancels the date. You end up losing
a lot of books. You should borrow hers.

What was his therapist getting at, really? Was she saying that he was using the most ridiculous method of securing a date ever invented? Or was she warning him that he was too earnest, too suffocating in his desire to force himself on someone? Probably the latter. He was looking for a "soul mate," someone that he could share his deepest loves and interests with, someone that with whom he could talk about the important things in life, the big ideas, the life of the mind and soul. Books were the key. They supply the grist of a long, intimate conversation that sparks and feeds the fire of *real* intimacy.

Either way, the therapist could tell that he wasn't very practiced or experienced in the ways of romance and wooing. Not to mention the fact that in either scenario his expectations would be let-down. Most people just aren't readers.

I wonder what his therapist would think of Jesus if he was on her counselor's couch. Afterall, Jesus uses a similar approach to securing a relationship with you and me.

Jesus desperately wants to enter into a relationship with us. He's not desperate because he has the need for friendship, but because he knows that we do. He wants to share His thoughts with us, and ours with Him. He wants to unveil Himself to us, to let us see everything that He is and to know everything about Him; He wants to give us His very heart.

For only when we enter into that friendship, only when we get to know Him, are we saved. So what does He do? He not only lends us His Book, He gives it to us. It's a book all about Him in the end. He wants us to read it, to treasure it, to talk with Him about its contents, and then to share our thoughts, fears, joys, interests, worries, and hopes with Him based on that good Book.

Maybe He's a fool. Doesn't He know that most people just aren't readers? They take the book but then just let it lay on the bookshelf collecting dust. So they don't get to know Him.

They miss out. They refuse (politely, of course) the intimacy of His friendship; they stay distant. They may pick it up and give reading it a try every now-and-then, but it's a hard book to understand, as getting to really *know* someone always is. So they give up.

The therapist would probably tell Jesus that He ends up losing a lot of books, that He'd be better off just keeping them.

But what the therapist said about her client is absolutely true of Jesus: He's always giving, and He's just not interested in taking anything from us\* ever. So He keeps forgiving us for our rudeness, and keeps calling us into a deeper and deeper friendship with Him. He keeps lending out and giving out books.

Just this once, let's spend some time enjoying (by reading) His gift. Eternal Life is in its pages!

\*the only thing that Jesus ever takes from a person happens the moment they believe in Him as their personal savior: He takes away their sin, their guilt before God, and their eternal punishment. But He doesn't leave voids. When He takes He gives something in return. In this case He gives forgiveness, peace, and Everlasting Life.

## All the ways God helps us

When young adults land in difficult situations and desperately call home, parents respond in various ways. They might remind their son or daughter of guidelines learned years back — behavior and problem-solving skills to get back on track. Or maybe parents direct their kids to a mentor, expert or resource for assistance. But if the crisis is severe, no doubt these loving parents hop in the car, or even on a plane, and go to their child. They embrace and support them, perhaps even taking initial steps to bring them through the chaos to a new beginning.

When the people of Israel were in the wilderness, exile and countless difficulties in between, God lovingly used each of these strategies. God reminded Israel of the Ten Commandments and other laws he gave to guide their life together. Sometimes he sent prophets and other leaders to direct the people into better ways and times. God does the same today, reminding us of Scripture's guidance and sending us prophetic voices and wise leaders.

Above all, when nothing less would save people, ancient and modern, from the dangers of sin and death, God came to us as Jesus. God's only Son walked with us, lived through our troubles alongside us, taught us new ways directly and brought us out of the problematic place where we were trapped and into a new beginning. —Heidi Hyland Mann

- 1. Draw a flower shape on paper and cut it out.
- 2. Place the flower template on felt and draw around it with the marker.
- 3. Cut out the felt flower. Then cut a small slit or hole through it.
- 4. Cut 8 inches of string. Thread it through the felt flower and tie to form a loop for hanging.

The last of the youth fell asleep around 4 a.m. and we are praising God for the awesome time in faith and fun that was shared by all!


