Meeting Minutes from September 14th Voters Meeting

Our Redeemer Lutheran Church Voters' Meeting 9/14/2025

- 1. Dave Geisler opened the meeting in prayer
- 2. Membership Changes none
- 3. Committee Reports
 - A. DCE/Youth Diane Cruz Diane was at Lutherhaven with the youth, so Megan Hamand read minutes from the Council Meeting
- I. Sunday School started last week with Rally Day. Younger kids will meet during worship. Some of the high school kids are volunteering to help teach.
- II. Confirmation started last week and will be before church every week; junior and senior confirmation will be run together. This year's curriculum will focus on the Bible
- III. Youth Group (5th to 12th grades) will start meeting on Friday nights and watching the TV series "The Chosen."
- IV. National Youth Quake in Louisiana was great. The three kids loved it.
 - B. Treasurer Char Geisler
- I. Offering was up for the third quarter (compared to rest of the year); expenses are down over \$20,000 from last quarter, but that's because we're not paying a pastor; investment accounts are up; savings/ checking are healthy
- II. Total of accounts \$954,273
- III. Pastor Speckhard is getting paid \$150/week
 - C. Board of Trustees Karen
- I. Large outdoor cross was repainted by Jim Brown and Jim Watson; Jim Brown also worked hard on trimming the bushes around the church.
- II. In July, there was a bat in the sanctuary; Varmint Guard Wildlife Service from New Buffalo captured it and released it back outside
- III. There was a leak in the irrigation system when it was turned on in July
- IV. Bill and Jerri Cole have been working hard in the parsonage. Their goal is to make the house appealing for a new pastor and his family to come here. The Friendship Circle donated \$7000 for the remodel. The Trustees have a budget and can spend up to \$5000 without congregational approval. The Coles are not charging the church for their labor and specifically told Karen they wanted to do this as a gift to the church.
 - 1. The congregation asked about doing something to show Coles their appreciation. Karen asked for people to come to her if they have specific ideas.
 - D. Board of Outreach/Parish Nurse/SMILES Sharon Krick

- I. SMILES has been overwhelmed for requests to help people with their NIPSCO bills. She's having to be choosy about who to assist since there aren't funds for everyone.
- II. The new Outreach/Inreach is meeting. Their focus is going to be inreach currently, due to the changes happening within the church. They purchased little Jesus figures for church members to carry with them and hand out to those who need a reminder or gift of love.
 - E. Preschool Elaine Browne
- I. Class is in session now. There are 46 students this year and 2 new teachers, who are very excited to be there
- II. There's an upcoming field trip to Yellow River Farms
 - F. Board of Elders Brad Hazleton filling in for Mel Lenig
- I. Safety and Security Jack Rosa and Brad are working on a church safety project
- II. The board is looking for a new elder to replace Josh Stacy
- III. Mel has a new job, working every other Sunday, so Brad will act as a "co-head" elder, so both are available for questions/needs.
 - G. President's Report Dave
- I. Dave is also going to ask for people to join the nomination committee since church elections are coming up.

 We will wait on the filling the Elder position and opening on Board of Spiritual Growth at that time.
- II. Call Committee Update
- 1. Phil Hamand presented to the Call Committee from the Finance Committee to show what the church can offer as a compensation package
- 2. Committee expects to get a list of potential pastors from the District very soon
- 3. There was an ad-hoc voters meeting to get the Call Committee started, but Dave requested a motion to ratify the committee
 - A. Mel Lenig, Char Geisler, Dave Geisler, Keith Enger, Danielle Franks, Autumn Ferch, Diane Cruz, Phil Hamand, Sharon Krick, and Elaine Browne
- I. Mike Lord made the motion; Bob Duffy seconded. Congregation was in favor.
- III. Bus Report the catalytic converter was stolen off the bus. Diane suggested that the church sell the bus during the Church Council meeting since no one uses it or is willing to take responsibility for its upkeep.
 - 1. Brad made the motion to sell it; Elaine seconded. Congregation was in favor
- IV. Endowment Requests are due at the end of September
- V. Danielle requested that she start work earlier by a half hour, which is 2 more hours a week (a total of 18 hours a week). She's doing more work with the pastor vacancy. Dave requested a vote on increasing her hours

- 1. Brad made the motion; Autumn seconded. Congregation voted in favor
- VI. Pastor Speckhard asked about what special services the church would like. At this point, Dave and Diane said there was no need for a Thanksgiving service, Advent services, or a Christmas Day. They gave him the date for the Christmas Program. North Judson also has a Christmas Eve service and the same time, so our service may need to be at 5:00 p.m. instead of the normal 7 p.m.
- VII. Dave and Karen met with the church's insurance representative. He made recommendations of where the policy can be cut to save money.
 - 1. Coverage on building down to \$5,940,000; garage coverage \$110,000; \$5,000 on theft and security; remove theft of building materials; remove terrorism coverage, \$1M umbrella policy
 - A. These changes will keep the insurance premium the same as last year
 - 2. Bruce Zimmerman asked if Dave received a quote from anyone else, but insurance increases is industry-wide. Dave said he plans to get a bid from an agent in North Judson but has not yet
 - 3. Autumn motioned to accept changes in insurance coverage and to get bid from the North Judson agent; Mike Lord seconded. Passed by congregation

4. Old Business

- A. Margaret Koch raised the issue that Pastor Eric and Linda left the parsonage damaged. She raised a motion saying that the church send Pastor and Linda a certified letter with a list of the damages.
- I. Christy Enger spoke against the motion, saying it was only the responsibility of the elders or trustees to discuss it; that it was their decision not a vote of the congregation.
- II. Brad spoke for the Elders and said they decided to not push the issue because there was nothing for the church to gain. He also pointed out that there was no legal clause because it wasn't in the contract with Pastor. Phil said that the Finance Committee is planning to put something in place so that the next pastor is clear about the expectations of how the parsonage is to be treated.
- III. Sharon reminded the congregation about what Jesus says about forgiveness
- IV. Char motioned that the congregation to let the Trustees and Elders make the decision on whether to move forward with a certified letter. Keith seconded. Congregation passed the motion.
 - 5. New Business no report
 - 6. Adjournment ended meeting with prayer

Reformation Day: Standing Firm in Christ

Each year on October 31, Lutheran churches around the world celebrate Reformation Day. On that date in 1517, Martin Luther posted his Ninety-Five Theses in Wittenberg, Germany. His goal was not to start a new church, but to call the church back to the truth of God's Word. What followed was the Reformation—a movement that reshaped the church and placed the Gospel of Jesus Christ back at the center of Christian life.

The Reformation gave voice to three enduring truths drawn straight from Scripture: we are saved by **grace alone**, through **faith alone**, in **Christ alone**. These were not new ideas, but eternal truths that had been overshadowed.



Luther and the reformers reminded the world that forgiveness is not something we earn or purchase—it is God's free gift in Jesus, won for us at the cross and confirmed by His resurrection.

For us today, Reformation Day is both history and devotion. It teaches us where we come from as Lutherans and why we believe what we believe. But it also speaks directly to our daily lives. In a world filled with uncertainty, shifting values, and competing voices, the Gospel gives us something unshakable. As the psalmist says, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1)—a verse Luther himself cherished and which inspired the hymn *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*.

When we gather on Reformation Sunday, we do more than remember a moment from 500 years ago. We give thanks for God's faithfulness in preserving His Word, and we confess with joy that Christ alone is our Savior, yesterday, today, and forever.

Soli Deo Gloria—To God alone be the glory.

The youth also participated in sectionals that emphasized the theme through a scavenger hunt, serving through packing things for a pregnancy center, and more.


They played capture the flag, sang around the campfire, worshipped together, and, of course, stopped at Culver's on the way home for lunch.

One of the many local authors that will be at this Saturday's SCPL Beyond the Book Festival is Meg Hamand.

Meg Hamand is the author of the bestselling and award-winning Diamonds in Auschwitz. Readers' Favorite calls it, "a sig-

nificant contribution to Holocaust literature."

Diamonds in Auschwitz, released in March 2025, was an instant Amazon Bestseller and an #1 New Release. It's been awarded second place in Women's Historical Fiction by The BookFest, first place in Historical Fiction by Firebird Book Awards, the June 2025 book award by Literary Titan, and the Prodigy (Best Debut Novel) Award from StoryTrade Awards. It is a historical fiction novel set during the Holocaust and follows a dual timeline following a diamond ring.

"Rachael has found the ring while a prisoner in Auschwitz. This discovery (and the act of defiance to keep the ring) is the catalyst to "waking" her up, helping her realize that even though she's living in a concentration camp, even though she's lost her fami-

then in turn they have to stop and get gas, they stop and get lunch, or they get lunch out here with the local vendors. And then while they're here, they might have to stop by the store or maybe they need to get a haircut or something. They're coming here and putting money back into the town. The biggest thing for this event is trying to give back to the local community and at the same time have something fun for everybody to do," Nichol said.

Chaja wanted to thank the Plymouth Public Library for its support in bringing Bluey to Knox.

"We're excited about that," she said. Come meet Bluey and listen to a story at 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. The first 100 kids to line up to meet Bluey will receive a Bluey treat bag. Kids will also be able to take photos with Bluey. Nichol said they were looking at different ways to bring in families to the festival. That's when Nichol recalled last year's Fourth of July.

Family Fun Day parade. "Behind the library's float was Bluey and Bingo. Boy, I tell you, the kids were running into the street, they all wanted hugs from Bluey."

For those that attended the last two years, there will be new authors along with returning authors. "We have a lot of new local authors this year from Starke County and a lot of people that are in the South Bend, Goshen, Elkhart, Plymouth areas," Nichol said.

"Greg Archer, who writes for USA Today and also worked for Entertainment Tonight," she said. "He was an entertainment reporter, and he would interview people on the red carpet."

When asked what she's most excited about this year's event, Nichol said, "I'm really excited to see how Bluey turns out."

She also said that she was excited for the podcast that will be live at the library. "I am also

excited for the live podcast. Rob Witzell will be interviewing local author Meg Hamand, new authors and brothers Stephen and Aaron Mizell, along with seasoned veteran Ionathan Janz, who just had a book released this past week along with another due out in October. Each year is a learning experience of what people are interested in. After doing the Mini Comicon this year, i saw how much fun the kids were having just being dressed up and seeing all of their favorite characters. I wanted to do something like that for Beyond the Book. I want kids to remember that reading is fun too and that if they come to see Bluey, then they can also meet some really awesome authors that are just as fun. I want people to realize that libraries aren't just books. There is a whole world of activities and it's located right in the very center of their town!"
