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### 2. Key Components of Listening Assessment

#### A. Types of Listening Tasks

- **Multiple-Choice Questions (MCQs):** Test comprehension of main ideas and details.
- **Gap-Fill Tasks:** Require learners to fill missing words or phrases from audio.
- **Matching Tasks:** Match speakers, opinions, or information to statements or categories.
- **True/False/Not Given:** Assess understanding of factual information.
- **Note-Taking and Summarizing:** Evaluate the ability to extract key information.

#### B. Scoring Criteria

- **Understanding Main Ideas:** Capturing the gist of spoken texts.
  - **Detail Recognition:** Identifying specific information accurately.
  - **Inference:** Understanding implied meaning beyond explicit words.
  - **Discourse Features:** Recognizing tone, attitude, and purpose.
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### 3. Designing Effective Listening Assessments

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- Use authentic or semi-authentic audio materials.
- Choose task types suitable for the learners' level and assessment goals.
- Clearly state instructions and expected responses.
- Balance task difficulty to avoid frustrating or boring learners.

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#### 4. Benefits of Listening Assessment

- Diagnoses learners' strengths and weaknesses.
- Encourages active listening practice.
- Supports learners' real-life communication skills.
- Provides valuable feedback to guide improvement.
