it; and James Goulart outlined at-home and community safety for seniors.

Board Member Bob McGregor

What do a fascination with airplanes and sugar have in common? Unlike love and marriage, which apparently go together like a horse and carriage, and you can't have one without the other – these two things do indeed have a common denominator. Please, greet, if you haven't already, Bob McGregor, three-time board member and two-time president of ASI.

Bob hails from Fillmore, a small town in Ventura County. He was raised among orange trees and cattle on a farm owned by his family. His move from Southern California to UC Davis to study Agricultural Engineering was a no brainer! He graduated in June 1963 and married his sweetheart, Lynette, the next day. His first job was with the Spreckels Sugar Company in the Fresno/Mendota area. By 1968 he was assigned to Monterey County as the District Engineer for Spreckels.

While at Spreckels he was in charge of receiving stations, railcars, design work, construction projects, trucks, and even seed production. He and Lynette settled in South Salinas and raised three sons (one of whom passed away in 2016). Sixty-two years later they are still enjoying life together. So, Bob ate, slept, and worked daily with sugar, sugar on his mind! He gave twenty-two years of his work life to the sugar industry.

But in the back of his mind, he was still bewitched by the memory of soaring in the skies with his uncle's brother when Bob was only six years old. in 1965 Bob earned his pilot's license for single engine planes. Finally, he resigned when Spreckels ceased operations in the Salinas Valley.

He no longer could resist the captivating lure of all things "airplane". He and Lynette purchased Air Trails, a small aviation business, based at the Salinas Municipal Airport. His mentor, Jack Jella, urged him to get his instrument rating certificate, and a multiple engine rating.

After eleven years operating Air Trails, the McGregors sold that enterprise and Bob flew another eleven years as chief pilot for Tanimura and Antle, with facilities in the Salinas Valley, the Imperial Valley, Arizona and Mexico.

Thus, with twenty-two years of sugar, and twenty-two years of airplanes "this I tell you brother, you can't have one without the other", led Bob to be the valuable ASI member he is today. And we can thank Howard Jones for pushing Bob into the role as president in 2012.

But that call of airplanes has never quite been put to rest. While most of us use our garages for our autos (or stuff), Bob is using his to build a radio-controlled gas engine model PBY Catalina (a historic WWII seaplane) with a thirteen-foot wing he folds up so he can put it in their living room at night.

His current Grumman Duck, an amphibious single engine model pictured on the ASI mural, took four years to build. He has a twelve-foot cargo trailer to transport his planes, of which there are many, to take wing near the Chualar Dump Road. The Salinas Area Modelers, with Bob McGregor at the controls, are regulars. When you see Bob, ask him about this intriguing hobby!

Nametags: Have you noticed the "official" blue name badges many have worn lately. We will soon be placing a second order, possibly the last one of the year. It is not mandated that you to have these name plates (we provide badges for food distribution, etc.), but many members have asked for them. May 23 is the deadline for ordering them. Secondary emergency contact: In the event of an emergency when your first emergency contact is not available, we need a secondary contact, preferably one who does not live with you. It could be a neighbor, a relative, an ASI friend, etc. That person should have or be given information on how to reach other members of your family. We recently had an incident where this information was needed. Please get that to the office as soon as you can so we can have it on our system.

MST Information Meeting restarts once a month on May 13, 1-2pm: The Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST) will hold informational sessions on all their services. Pre-registration required. Food Sources for Monterey County Seniors

There is no need to go hungry in Monterey County! The Food Bank of Monterey County has food distribution sites every month at different locations, and you can use any one; you do not have to wait for ASI's. To find locations near you, go the Food Bank's locator and type in your zip code (https://foodbankformontereycounty.org/food-assistance/). You'll get locations and distribution days/times within a 10-mile radius; or you can scan the list for any city in Monterey County.

There are also many places to lunch Monday through Friday. Here is a list of low-cost/free lunch services. https://www.countyofmonterey.gov/home/showpublisheddocument/138255/638780838997330000

To qualify for in-person lunch services, you just need to be at least 60 years old and live in Monterey County or surrounding areas. All sites require registration that involves ID and paperwork. They all ask you to call to reserve a seat 24 hrs. in advance. Most ask for a \$3-\$4 donation, but no seniors will be turned away if they don't have that. I have tried and loved meals at the three sites below. (I haven't tried the four centers in Salinas yet.) Servings are generous and delicious. Often, there are three nutritious courses--and friendly volunteers!

The Oldemeyer Center, 986 Hilby Ave. in Seaside, offers a sit-down lunch, 10-noon in the Laguna Grande Hall. Call 831-899-6809 by 1 pm the day **before** to reserve. Cost is \$3 *donation*, for seniors only. There is also a once a month third Thursday live-band lunch party for your listening/dancing pleasure (\$4 for that "party"). Many ASI seniors like to attend this venue on band day. Call to confirm band date as it may change—i.e., "Mother's Day lunch" is May 10 instead of the third Thursday.

Meals on Wheels (MOW, formerly the Sally Griffin Center), 700 Jewell Ave in Pacific Grove, has daily community-meal service five days a week *with live music*, 11am-12:30pm. Cost is \$3 *donation* for seniors, \$7.50 for others.

The Thom Cuneo Jazz Band usually plays for seniors on the last Thursday but call ahead as seats "sell" out fast. To reserve a space, call 831-375-4454. https://www.mowmp.org/core-programs/group-dining

The Senior Center at the North County Recreation Center, 11261 Crane, Castroville, serves free hot meals M-F to seniors and their guests. Call 831-633-3084 to reserve a space. There is also a monthly social (with live music—a Mariachi musician when I visited) on the fourth Wed. of the month, 11am-1pm. Services and resources are offered then as well. \$3 donation. May menu: https://www.ncrpd.org/senior-nutrition-program-menu

We are lucky to have such generous services in California—not only for food, but also for a chance to meet others. All these programs are subsidized by your Federal, State, and local tax dollars, so don't be shy! Who says there is no free/low-cost lunch? There is because people care!

Meanwhile, at ASI over 300 bags of food were distributed April 24 in a smooth, team-working environment. Thanks to Gerry Reynolds for directing the effort...and each of you who made it happen. Loretta Salinas and Dwight Freedman have set in place a process and standard that we all uphold. Next month we will be sure to have the music playing.
