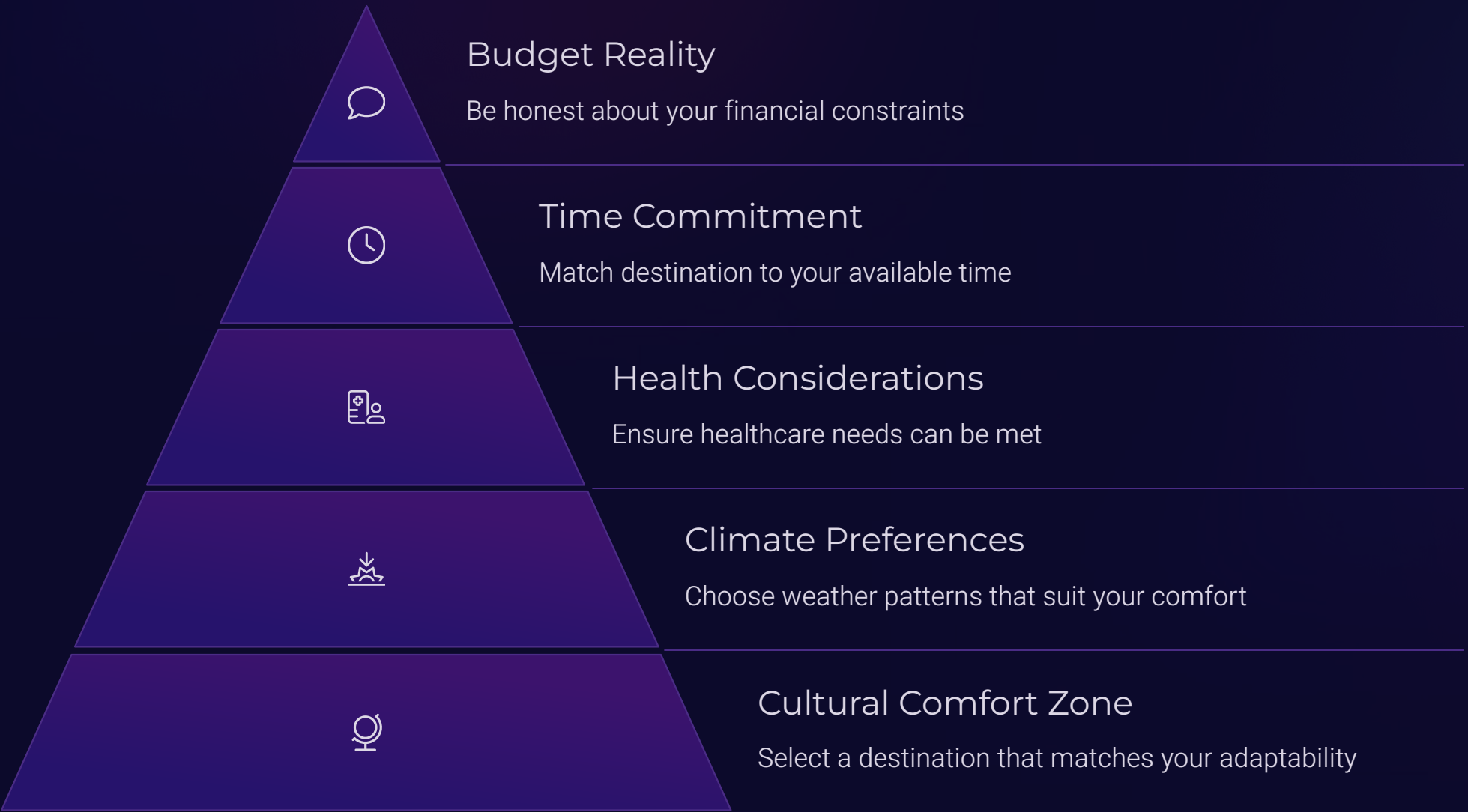
- Hot and humid weather can be challenging
