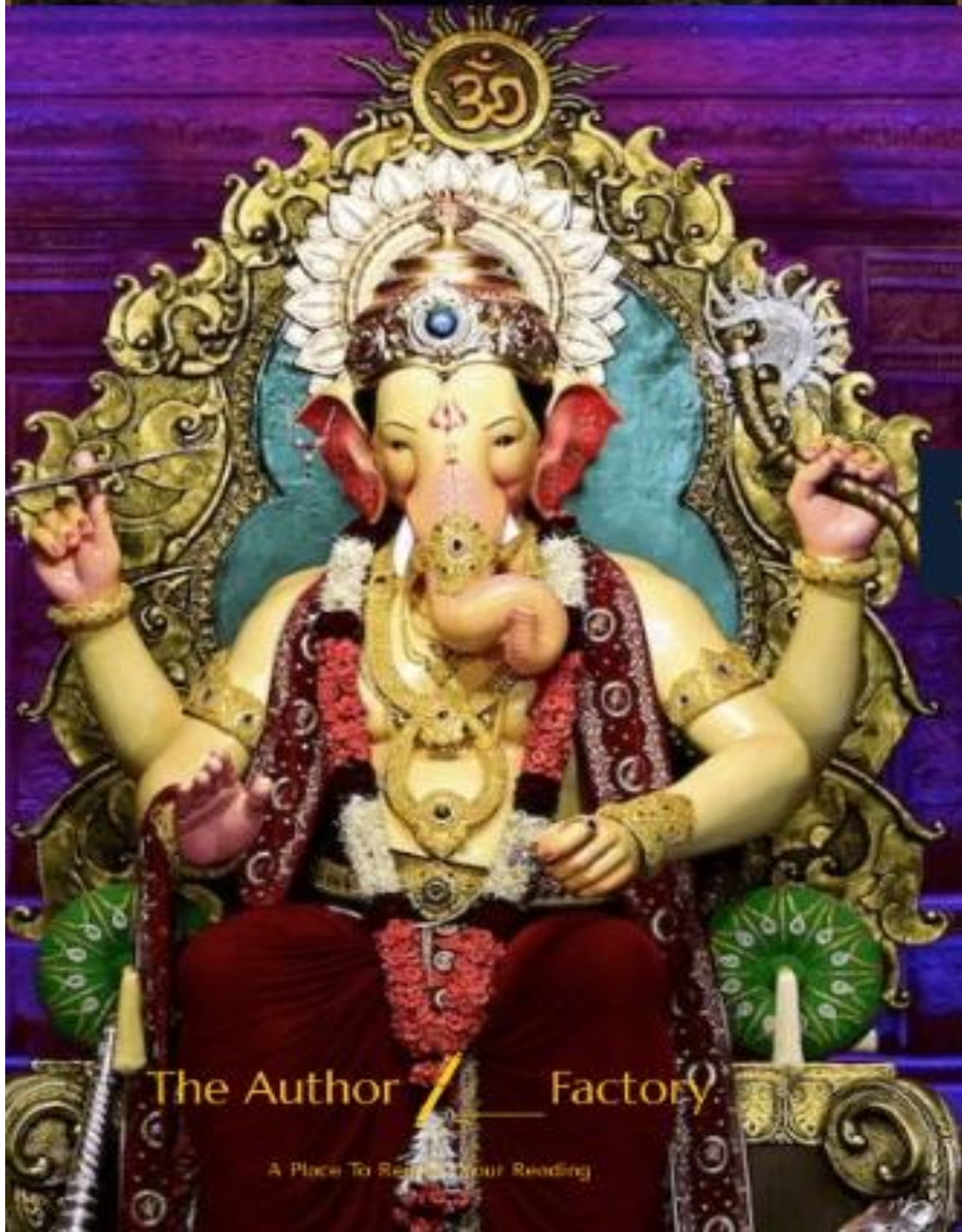

## Ten Notable Ganesh Puja Celebrations in Maharashtra and Karnataka

### 1. Lalbaugcha Raja (Mumbai, Maharashtra)



Arguably the most prominent Ganesh idol in India, Lalbaugcha Raja attracts vast numbers of devotees—often exceeding one million daily during the festival. Established in 1934 by members of the local trading and fishing communities, it has become a focal point for pilgrimage and public devotion.



## 2. Ganesh Galli (Mumbai, Maharashtra)



Renowned for its thematic pandals, Ganesh Galli serves as a showcase for artistic innovation, with annual installations ranging from historical monuments to contemporary social themes.

### 3. Siddhivinayak Temple (Mumbai, Maharashtra)

#### 4. Dagdusheth Halwai Ganpati (Pune, Maharashtra)



Originating in the late 19th century, this idol—adorned with significant gold ornaments—stands as a symbol of Pune’s religious devotion and cultural heritage.

### 5. Chinchpokli Chintamani Ganapati (Mumbai, Maharashtra)



Established in 1920, this celebration is noted for its historical continuity and its reputation as a source of peace and reassurance for devotees.



## 6. Khetwadi Cha Raja (Mumbai, Maharashtra)



Famous for its towering idols and innovative themes, this pandal frequently addresses both mythological and contemporary issues.

### 7. GSB Seva Mandal Ganpati (Mumbai, Maharashtra)



Distinguished by its opulent decoration—featuring gold, silver, and precious stones—this celebration also emphasizes philanthropic activities and community service.

### 8. Tilakwadi Ganesh Puja (Belgaum, Karnataka)



With historical connections to Tilak's expansion of the festival, Tilakwadi's celebration is marked by traditional performances and cultural programs.



### 9. Basavanagudi Ganesh Utsava (Bengaluru, Karnataka)



This event is particularly noted for its emphasis on environmental sustainability and cultural diversity. In 2019, it achieved a Guinness World Record for the largest simultaneous clay idol-making session.



## 10. Hubli-Dharwad Ganesh Mahotsav (Karnataka)



Characterized by folk music, dance, and communal feasting, this festival highlights the rich traditions of North Karnataka.

## **Maharashtra: The Epicenter of Ganesh Chaturthi Celebration in India**

During Ganesh Chaturthi Celebration in India, Maharashtra—especially cities like Mumbai and Pune—transforms into an epicenter of cultural and religious activity. The festival culminates on Anant Chaturdashi, with grand immersion processions and widespread participation. ## **Eco-Friendly Ganesh Idols & Sustainable Trends**

There has been a marked shift towards eco-friendly Ganesh Puja practices, largely prompted by increasing awareness of environmental issues caused by traditional Plaster of Paris (PoP) idols, which have been linked to significant river and marine pollution. Recent data highlights this change: in Mumbai in 2025, out of more than 60,000 Ganesh idols immersed in artificial ponds, over 30,000 were eco-friendly alternatives. This demonstrates a clear preference for sustainable choices over PoP, as reported by The Times of India.

A similar pattern is evident in Nagpur, where an impressive 94% of the immersed idols were crafted from clay, reflecting a strong community commitment to environmentally conscious practices. Hyderabad provides another noteworthy example: the 69-foot Khairatabad idol and numerous home pujas utilized clay idols. The Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation's initiative to distribute 200,000 clay Ganesh idols made exclusively from biodegradable materials further underlines civic support for sustainability.

Other cities, including Kolhapur, Thane, Mysuru, and Bengaluru, are also encouraging the adoption of clay, paper-mâché, mulch, and seed-embedded idols. These initiatives are frequently supported by civic workshops and education programs, indicating institutional as well as grassroots engagement. Innovative approaches have also emerged—some idol makers now employ materials such as chocolate, vegetables, seeds, papier-mâché, and even Ayurvedic pills, blending creativity with ecological responsibility.

Collectively, these developments reveal a growing cultural consciousness: communities seek to preserve religious traditions while minimizing environmental harm.
