TIME AND QUESTION FORMAT

Each General Studies (GS) paper—GS1, GS2, GS3, and GS4—carries 250 marks and must be completed within 3 hours (180 minutes).

Each paper includes:

- 20 questions in total
 - 10 questions of 10 marks each
 - 10 questions of 15 marks each

Candidates are required to answer all 20 questions.

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This leaves an average of approximately 8.5 minutes per question. This time includes reading the question, identifying its demand, mentally structuring the answer, and writing it in a coherent, relevant, and complete form. In practice, this makes answer writing not just a test of knowledge, but a test of planning, clarity, and execution under time pressure.

Discuss

Examine

You are expected to investigate the topic in detail, bringing out its core aspects, causes, and consequences. Go beyond description. Identify internal logic and implications.

Critically Examine

Begin by examining the issue as above, but also highlight limitations, weaknesses, or challenges. A brief, reasoned conclusion is essential. Avoid simply praising or rejecting without nuance.

Evaluate

This demands a judgment. Assess the pros and cons or benefits and limitations, and offer a balanced conclusion based on analysis. Don't merely list points – weigh them.

Critically Evaluate

Same as evaluate, but with an added expectation of deeper scrutiny and a clear, balanced judgment. You must not skip the conclusion.

Analyze

Break down the issue into components and explore relationships between parts. Show logical flow and structured thinking. Avoid vague summaries.

Critically Analyze

Go beyond analysis — highlight underlying issues or contradictions, and conclude thoughtfully. Avoid being overly negative or missing the “critical” aspect.

Comment

Express your opinion backed by facts and logic. You may support or disagree with the statement, but your stance must be reasoned and supported.

Explain

Make something clear by describing in detail with reasons or causes. Ensure clarity. Avoid over-complicating or using excessive jargon.

Elucidate

Clarify by giving examples or illustrations. Go beyond definitions to bring out the concept’s essence.

Elaborate

Expand upon the statement. Break it down into parts and explore implications. Don’t just paraphrase the statement.

Substantiate

You must prove or justify the given assertion with concrete evidence, examples, data, or reasoning. Avoid balancing or opposing the claim — support it.

Justify

Argue in favor of the given statement. Your answer should be one-sided with strong supporting arguments. Avoid counterpoints.

Assess

Examine both benefits and drawbacks and determine the overall value or impact. A clear conclusion is necessary.

Trace

Describe a sequence of events or historical development over time. Maintain chronological clarity.

Differentiate / Distinguish

Highlight the differences between two or more closely related terms. Use clear criteria. Avoid definition-only responses.
