

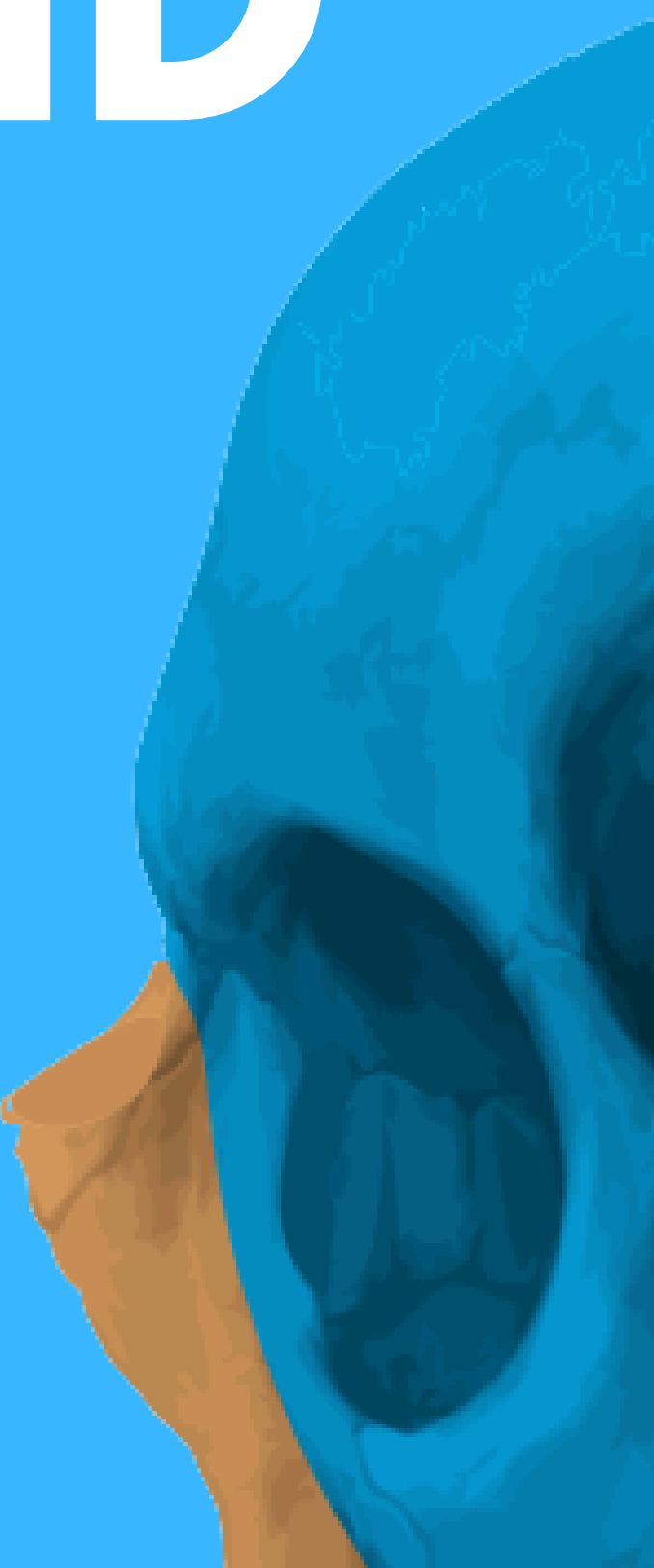

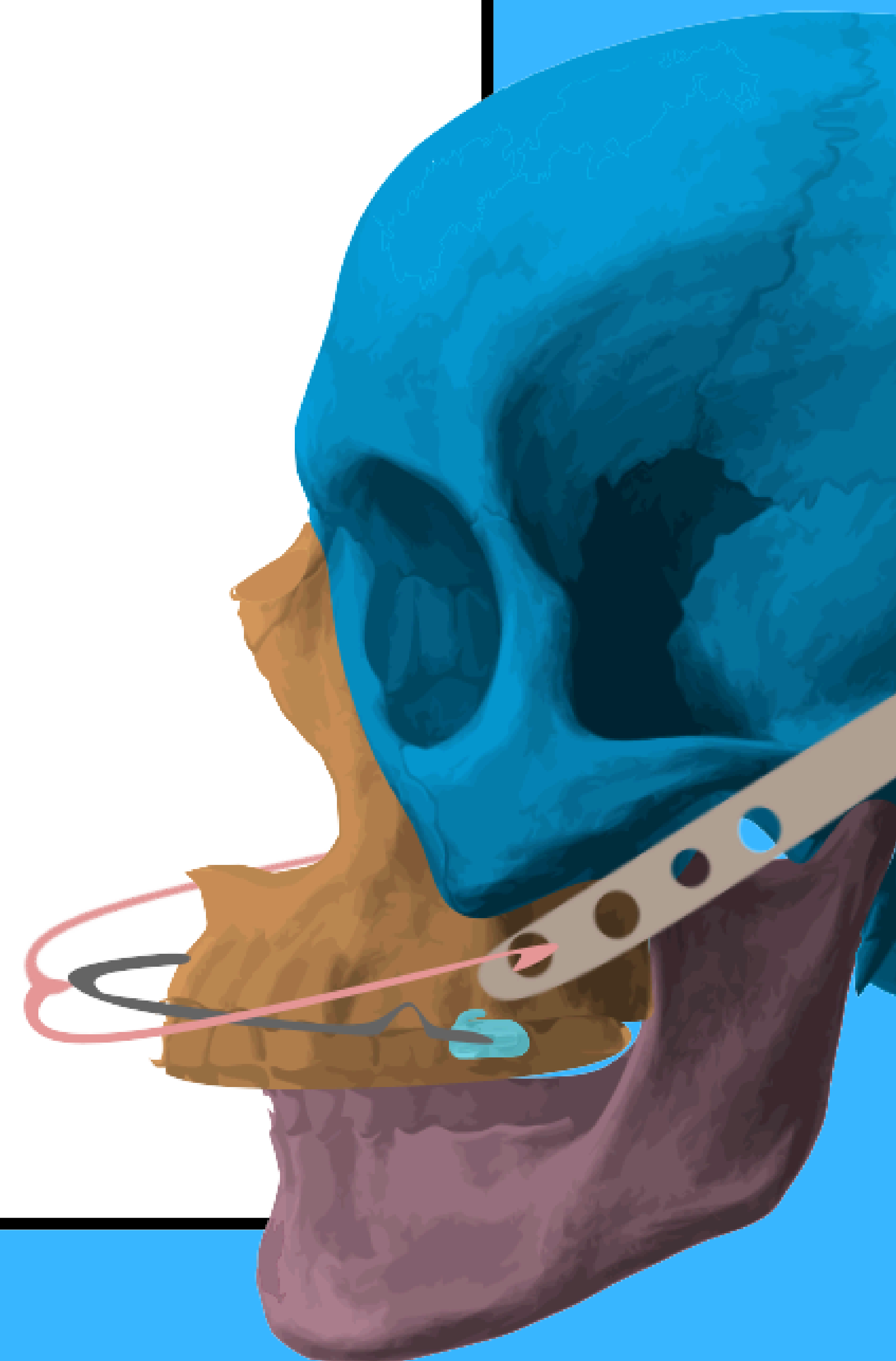

A case report is not necessarily about a successful treatment outcome it can also **highlight complications, unexpected challenges, or even treatment failures**. The purpose of a case report is to share clinical experiences, whether the outcome was positive or not.

Why Report Unsuccessful Cases?

- **Learning from Mistakes** – Complications provide valuable insights for other clinicians, helping them avoid similar issues.
- **Identifying Risks & Limitations** – Some cases show the limitations of certain treatments, guiding better decision-making.
- **Encouraging Discussion** – Complex cases spark discussions that lead to improved clinical protocols.
- **Ethical Transparency** – Medicine and dentistry evolve by learning from both successes and failures.

1. Title

- Clear and descriptive, reflecting the main focus of the case.
- Example: Orthodontic traction of impacted canines using magnets
