Loved all the Texas Madrones along the trail approaching Monkey Rock. Surprised to see so many new leaves and even berries. Equally surprising was the neon red Carolina Snailseed berries and wine-worthy Spanish Grapes hanging in plain sight not already gobbled by a hungry bird! White Eyed Vireos were heard throughout our walk and we 'ear-birded' many others species. Otherwise, it's been pretty bird-quiet lately. Many birds have or are preparing to leave. Except for the Ruby Throated Hummingbirds, most of the fall migrants are resting during the day for their night time travel. As we headed towards the Grotto, four Black Vultures did grace us with their presence but our binoculars were more for form (fashion accessory) than function. Mother Nature still showed us many of her great creatures.
