Community Roadwatch



Speeding cars are a matter of concern to a lot of local people. Many roads are badly affected, for example, motorists can avoid the town centre by driving from Kenton Road to Station Road via Northwick Park Road, Manor Road and Francis Road.

The police set up a team together with local residents to record the speed of passing cars. Those who speed are given a warning but the event serves to remind drivers of their need to observe the limit.

A New Met for London

The Metropolitan police are holding public meetings both to explain the latest plan of the new Commissioner, Sir Mark Rowley, and to find out from local people their views and needs.

The police prioritise things that matter most to people like tackling antisocial behaviour, working on specific types of crime and keeping the community safe.

One goal is to keep serious violence low, prevent violent crime and to respond promptly to incidents.

The plan aims to ensure that victims of crime calling for help are satisfied with the police response, by, for example, better support and assistance for victims of crimes such as burglary, domestic violence and sexual offences. The first public meeting in Harrow was held at Harrow School on July 26th. Some of the people present thought that the police do not publicise their successes enough. If the police response to a call for help

is poor, it is useful to know what else they are working on. OWL, the Online Watch Link, recently reported on a big and successful operation against drug dealers which will have taken a lot of time and effort to set up.

The recruitment of 500 more PCSOs [Police Community Support Officers] should mean that the police are more often seen and linked more closely to their local community.

Communication is key to building trust. The police in Harrow will commit to provide public updates after every police operation that has been completed by explaining what has been done, why that area was the focus and what the result was. There will be regular public meetings open to all where residents can raise any concerns that they have. These concerns and their response will be put out on social media and OWL so residents know where focus is.

Traid

Traid is a charity retailer shaking up high street fashion. In the UK they

collect, sort and sell quality second-hand clothing in their London stores. This practical action gives clothes a new lease of life so drastically reducing waste. Further afield, they fund organic cotton farming and support garment workers to make fashion fairer for everyone.

Traid has recently formed a partnership with Harrow council to provide services for the community in the area that will save good clothing from being thrown away and put it back to good use.



Traid collect from your home. Bags left on the pavement may not be taken by the intended charity or spoilt and the contents spread about. They will collect a bag of clothes and may take small electrical items as well, like toaster or hairdryer. If you have internet access, look up:

Bad news for the fly-tippers

Dear Watch Member,

Harrow Council is installing 15 new CCTV cameras in the borough's top hotspots, according to their website. 10 cameras have been installed already in Harrow. They'll stay in these areas for as long as necessary to address the issue and will be deployed to new locations once instances reduce.

Where there is evidence, fixed penalty notices of £400 will be issued to offenders.




