Your Association keeps busy

Speeding traffic is a concern for GMRA residents so Committee members regularly join the Harrow Community Roadwatch held monthly in Sheepcote Road. Supported by Transport for London, members of the public operate a speed gun. Speeding motorists are sent a letter telling them they have been exceeding the speed limit and what could happen if they do it again. Anyone wishing to take part should contact the police. There has been some improvement.

Litter picking has resulted in the area looking better including the Belmont trail link. Hemuna thanked the current volunteers but more volunteers are still needed.

There has been some improvement re **drug dealing**. Anything observed should be reported to the council and the police.

Road representatives continue to **help individual members** with eligible problems.

Harrow's BID

Louise Baxter, the manager of the Business Improvement District, talked to the Annual General Meeting on 15th May. The BID is not the council but brings together the council, the police and local business and many agencies, including homeless charities, in order to improve the central area.

When local businesses join BID, they pay a set percentage of their rateable value, which is used to make Harrow a more vibrant and welcoming location. They benefit from the increased footfall in the town centre [in fact higher than Watford]. All businesses are encouraged to join Harrow Business Against Crime [HBAC]. This gives access to BID's secure DISC database which contains details of known offenders, beggars, and those causing anti-social behaviour. Images help identify individuals who are causing trouble so they can be deterred from entering businesses.

BID also organizes Town Link radios via a sub-contractor Resound, for a small charge. This links businesses with the CCTV control room at Harrow Council, the BID, and the police. This is a useful tool for businesses to warn each other of potential threats.



Working closely with various departments in Harrow Council means BID is our voice and can highlight matters of concern from broken paving or street lights, to highways, cleansing problems, enforcement and car park issues.

Louise is working on two places where businesses overflow on to the pavement and obstruct passersby. This could be referred to the council but things may change since the council is proposing to open more kiosks in St.Anns The BID has staff trained under a scheme supported by government and the drinks industry who inspect licensed premises.

This has helped to ensure our pubs and restaurants offer high standards of care to their customers and meet their legal responsibilities. Venues who pass the various social, welfare and health & safety checks receive accreditation plaques. Harrow town centre is promoted via BID's social media accounts and events are organized to make the centre more attractive, for example, visiting reindeer before Christmas.

What happens to Harrow's Recycling?

We all spend time separating our rubbish. Rinsing out yoghurt pots for recycling, scraping our leftovers into the food bin and generally just doing our best to put the right thing into the right bin.

So, have you ever wondered what happens to your recycling once we collect it?

The council's recycling team has followed the journey of your dry recycled waste from the moment it is collected to when it is processed and recycled into new products.

Our friendly and hard working crews empty your recycling bin, and the lorries drop this at Harrow's Recycling Centre. Each lorry collects up to 11 tonnes of dry recycling. However, it is not sorted here but transferred to a processing plant we use for our recycling.

It is at this processing plant where the sorting and separating takes place. This is an impressive process where the use of technology makes separating household recycling easier. Magnets are used to pick out different types of metals. A trommel, a huge spinning tunnel, is used to separate objects of different sizes, and infra-red sensors are used to detect the different types of plastic that arrive at the site.

However, we can't just rely on technology. There is plenty of hand sorting that takes place, where staff work around the clock removing items that have been incorrectly placed in recycling bins. Once the separation process is complete, it is then shipped to manufacturers who use the materials to make new products so reducing the amount of energy needed to make their products and lowering the environmental impact of sourcing raw materials. For example, it takes 75% less energy to make a plastic bottle from recycled materials than it does to make one from scratch.

Did you know that you can play a role making the recycling process more efficient and cost effective by avoiding contamination? It happens that sometimes we make the mistake of thinking that something is acceptable in the recycling bin. That's why it's so important to check and put the right things in the right bin.

Two of the biggest culprits of contamination found in household recycling are clothes/textiles and food waste. By reducing the amount of these two contaminants in your blue bin, we can improve the quality of Harrow's recycling.

This is why the Recycling Team has been working hard to encourage uptake of weekly food waste collections and to promote the TRAID charity who work in partnership with the council to collect textiles for free from residents' doorsteps. Why Trees are so important for our wellbeing



Air quality: trees absorb pollutants and produce Oxygen

Combat climate change: trees absorb greenhouse gases (Carbon dioxide) and hold storm water

Noise reduction: Absorb sound /reduce traffic noise

Provide Shade: Tree canopies provide sun protection and reduce surface temperatures **Street appearance:** Street trees improve the image of our neighbourhoods

Mood and wellbeing: It's proven that our mental and physical health benefit from trees **Habitat for nature:** Trees provide much needed homes for wildlife

Ideally the young tree should be given a good water at least once a week with the equivalent of two buckets of water during spring and summer months (April

- September).

It's better to give it a good soaking rather than little and often but any watering you can manage will be very Welcome. Water into the plastic irrigation tube (or bag) if there is one provided.

Use rainwater if possible. Washing up water is ok provided no bleach products are present. Ideally it's best to water early morning or evening. Do not over water – if the ground is saturated there is no need.



Keeping Harrow Safe

The Greenhill Safer Neighbourhood Panel (GSNP) meets quarterly and draws together various bodies helping to provide a safer, better environment in Greenhill. Representatives from Greenhill neighbourhoods, Greenhill Councillors, the Police (Greenhill Safer Neighbourhood Team), Harrow BID and the Harrow Safer Neighbourhood Board all attend the meetings.

The GSNT covers the whole of Greenhill. The main focus is on Harrow Town centre. Their patrols in the town centre are there to help and support shoppers as well as to deter criminal and ASB activity. It is backed up by chat sessions, such as Coffee with a Copper or shopping centre meeting points where friendly advice on how to stay safe from the effects of crime is provided. Crime is everchanging and all residents are advised to sign up to OWL for updates on new hazards to avoid.

GSNT reported recently to the Panel that Greenhill Ward, which includes the town centre, has the highest reported anti social behaviour in Harrow and the highest reported theft from person offences. There were 299 theft offences reported in the last six months and 205 violence against the person offences.

In May 2024 the team, both plain clothed and uniformed officers, together with BID, Kingdom Security and the council took part in Operation ECO to tackle key offences such as robberies, retail theft and theft from persons. The results of the operation saw numerous crime reports being generated for Theft offences and arrests for Breach of Criminal Behaviour Order, failure to appear and theft offences as well as stop and searches. The result of this operation highlighted that an increase in police presence reduces the likelihood and opportunity for theft offences to occur which is one of our main priorities.

Harrow Baptist Tennis Club


