Prepositions After Nouns

1. Noun + of

Used to show possession, origin, description, or relationship.

- The **end of** the movie was surprising.
- She felt the importance of learning English.
- The **cost of** living is increasing.

2. Noun + to

Often shows connection or direction.

- His attitude to work is very positive.
- The key to success is hard work.
- My invitation to the party arrived yesterday.

3. Noun + for

Used to show purpose or reason.

- There is a **need for** more teachers.
- This is a **reason for** celebration.
- He has a **talent for** languages.

4. Noun + in

Used to show place, situation, or involvement.

- There was an increase in prices last month.
- She has a lot of experience in marketing.
- We saw a **change in** the weather.

5. Noun + with

Shows association or relationship.

- His **connection with** the company is strong.
- She has a problem with her computer.
- He has a good relationship with his coworkers.

6. Noun + on

Often used for topics or focus.

- He gave a lecture on climate change.
- I read an article on healthy eating.
- The **effect on** the environment is worrying.

7. Noun + at

Used for reactions or specific points.

- Her surprise at the news was obvious.
- Their attempt at cooking was a disaster.
- His **shock at** the results was understandable.

8. Noun + about

Shows topic or concern.

- I have a question about the schedule.
- There was a lot of meetings to talk about the project.
- Her worry about the test kept her awake.

9. Noun + from

Used for origin or difference.

- The difference from the original is clear.
- His **escape from** the city was exciting.
- The benefits from exercise are well known.

10. Noun + between

Used for relationships or comparisons.

- The connection between the two ideas is clear.
- There's a **difference between** American and British English.
- The agreement between the countries was signed yesterday.
