1. THE CHURCH THAT R.....

(1 Corinthians 6:9-10; See also Romans 15:7; John 8:1-11)

- Some churches treat certain sins as beyond forgiveness, turning away those who need grace most. Yet Scripture calls us to accept one another just as Christ has accepted us (Romans 15:7). No sin places a person beyond the reach of God's grace — and no sinner should feel unwelcome at the foot of the cross
- Question for Consideration: Is there anyone in your life you may have written off as "too far gone" for God's grace?

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2. THE CHURCH THAT M

(1 Corinthians 6:9-10; see also 1 Corinthians 5:2)

- Some churches, in an effort to be loving, drift into simply affirming people in their sin rather than pointing them toward transformation. True love holds grace and holiness together — receiving the person wholeheartedly while also calling them, as Jesus did, to leave behind what harms them.
- Question for Consideration: How do you personally hold grace and truth together when walking with someone who is struggling with sin?

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(1 Corinthians 6:11; see also Ecclesiastes 4:9-10; Hebrews 10:24-25)

- The church God calls us to be walks alongside people on the journey of sanctification — through prayer, healing, accountability, spiritual mentorship, and genuine community. Transformation is real and possible, because Jesus washes, justifies and sanctifies all who come to him in repentance and faith (1 Corinthians 6:11).
- Question for Consideration: What is one way you could more intentionally invest in someone else's walk of transformation within your church community?

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Application For This Week:

Reflect on someone in your life who may be battling sin and feeling hopeless or alone. Consider one practical way you could come alongside them this week — whether through a kind word, a listening ear, a prayer, or an invitation to community. Ask God to make you an instrument of his transforming grace.

Prayer: *Heavenly Father, thank you that no one is beyond your grace and no sin is beyond your power to forgive. Remind us this week that we too were once in need of your mercy — and that it is only by your washing, your justifying and your sanctifying work that we stand before you today. Make us a people who welcome the broken, speak truth in love, and walk faithfully alongside one another on the road of transformation. Give us the humility to receive grace and the courage to extend it freely to others. In Jesus' Name, Amen.*

And that is what some of you were. But you were washed, you were sanctified, you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and by the Spirit of our God. — 1 Corinthians 6:11

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
